REPORT FROM SASPRO: The Director provided an overview of the work of SASPRO. the project had been registered as a company on the 10 October 1988. Its policy objective s

were similar to those of CD8, and like CDS had taken a long time to get established. The histoxy of the project was reviewed: an Interim Committee had been replaced by a Management Council. In turn, a subcommittee of the Management Council (Facilitating Committee) had been created to manage the decision-maldng.

A distinction was drawn between the work done by the AN C Departments and that of SASPRO. SASPRO was not concerned with the immediate ANC priOrities. but we dealing with the question of transition.

The work undertaken to date was primarily in facilitating workshops on Women (two have been held). Land (two have been held), Local Government and Planning, Constitutional Guidelines, Culture, Health and Social Welfare. In addition, seminars organised by the wanton: ANC Departments have been funded by SASPRO. '.

Recommendation: That documentation prepared for. or arising out of. the warkshops be published as soon as possible. In addition, it was noted that wherever possible the work must be translated into the vernacular (Zulu, Xhosa, Vende, Sotho, Afrikaans, etc.) REPORT FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: It was noted the BOT had examined the legal instruments defining the project and it was felt that there were certain lnadequacies in

respect of the question of accountability and ciarity. A new Deed of Trust had been drafted which provides for a Genera! Council of the Community (elected representatives from community organizations). In addition, administrative tasks are removed from the Trustees.

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The BOT felt that a great deal of progress had been made in the project even though the project was developing relatively slowly in view of the changing situation in South Afric a.

Recommendation: All interested parties are to examine the new draft copies of the legal instruments and are to provide suggestions and comment.

DISCUSSION: A number of points were raised in discussion and these related to the general objectives of CDS/SASPRO.Fl1-stly, discussion ensued around what was seen as a tension between rlgoutous research and democratlsing research. It was noted that one needed to find ways of harnessing the skills of those who have them. It was also necessary

to recognise that while not all of our people have access to research skills, there was a need

to ensure an equal distribution of the products of these skills.

Secondly,.lt was noted that CDS/SASPRO are not in the business of formulating policy, as that will be done 'by the relevant institutions of the liberation movement. Rather, CDS/SASPRO were to actively develop networks of researchers who would undertake policy research.

STATE OF OUR NATION AND THE IMPLICATI ONS FOR CDS/SASPRO

An input was provided by members of the NBC on the recent developments and their implications for CDS/SASPRO. It was noted that the ANC NBC had decided to establish . a visible ANC inside our country striving to establish dual power. There was a need to become a broad, mass-based, vanguard organization.

Clearly. this decision had a number of important political spinoffs: what would happen to existing political structures, what form would the ANC structure take, how would the repatriation of ANC cadres occur. Without detailing these political decisions it is . important to recognise the following: .

- (i) That in the next fewmonths all the mador Departments of the ANC would be returning to the country.
- (ti) That at least 14 regional branches would be established Inside the country. (tit) That the UDF, MC. TIC, white political structures, etc. would either dlsband or drastlcally change their form.

After discussion, it was noted that there were a variety of areas where CDS/SASPRO could play an important role in this period of transition:

(t) Addiressing the motementls $\ensuremath{\mathsf{Immediate}}$ needs

Here, a number of important areas In which CDS/SASPRO could play a role We re noted. In particular, the whole question of repatriation requires research in order to make it a

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orderly process and in addition the repatriation of researchers opens up new possibilitie s.

There was a substantial amount of research which was needed in setting up new structures. undertaking demographic analyses. identifying rescuree needs and becoming invotved in addressing the strategic needs of the movement. With regard to the latter. it was noted that

work needed to be undertaken on the middle ground and the whole question of 'ethnic' attitudes.

Recommendation: That the work presently underway at the National Office, and which aims to establish a data base containing information on the CDS/SASPRO network and all commissioned work, be actively supported and encouraged to disseminate the results of the work as soon as possible.

(ii) Undertaking policy research

t was noted that the ANC. Departments themselves would he. requiring a mthsta'ntiat mount of research work to be undertaken in order to prepare for the negotiations process and eonstitution-building. '

In addition, there were a variety of needs on the ground itself which would need to be addressed by the Study Commissions of CDS/SASPRO.

(iii) Development or a mechanism for ensuring research questions are addressed It was noted that CDS/SASPRO needed to become much more efficient in both the commissioning of research and development of research programmes. In addition, there was a need to ensure tesearch found its way to CDS and that when commissioned, the research got done. ,

Recommendation: In this regard it was accepted that CD8 urgently establish a research centre (under the overall supervision of the National Office) consisting of at least a .Recawh Db cuter who would be empowered to ensure research was commissioned . adequately, that the research networks of the Study Commissions continued to function preperly, and that the research actually got underway within CDS.

It was noted that there was a tension between the need for centralisation and the need for r

regionalisation of CD5. It was hoped, however, that with the appointment of a Research Pheshtstmatthettaw mat ???IEHQXGMToWRtBWWNth nmttgtnmttbnao +0:

- (1) x'utlonetise the preject on Study Cemminien lines and ensure the Stu dy COmmissions developed their own working dynamic; and
- (ii) ensured that we developed a scientific research collective which could ensure prompt tum-around times for project creation and implementation.

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(tv) Development of Study commissions and the lmptementation of National Programmes of Action.

It was recognised that there was some vexyjmportant work presently underway. This work was actively trying to ensure that organizations became empowered and that the important educational task of CDS/SASPROtcontinued.

(v) Integration of SASPRO IntolCDS

It was agreed that as a matter of urgency, SASPRO officials would return home. and the project would be integrated into CDS. Given the increased resource needs of CD3 some of the funds allocated to SASPRO could be made available to CD5.

(vi) Ensuring the process of repatriation ls orderly

Concern was expressed that the process of repatriation needed to be orderly otherwise institutions would create dwlsions within the organization. Problems with the way UCI' has exploited the return of cdes. Jack and Ray were noted.

Recommendation: CDS needed to become actively involved in developing a plan for the repatriation of our odes. (from abroad, from the region and from the prisons). FUNDING

It was noted that the funds were now available and would be provided once the necessary documents were signed, Additional scurees of funds would need to be secured. 'DATE OF NEXT MEETING: It was agreed that the next meeting would be held at home.
