

IN SOME subtle fashion. the work of Lucky Sibaya seems to have grown in stature since his recent visit to Europe. Never lacking in confidence, it seems to have acquired a certain sophistication as well and he certainly has become more adventurous in his presentation.

He seems to be breaking new ground for himself in a very satisfactory manner.

His engravings and paintings on the two elephant scapulal and his manner of presenting them almost as items of sculpture is most elegant and arresting. Perhaps the one in the lower gallery is somewhat more delicate in design.

The monotypes, somewhat reminiscent of Skotnes, are also particularly good.
