Dear Rusty,

1. Re: The one year undertaking:

3. Re: Your departure from U.K.:

All arrangements can also be made for Hilda. We hope that you can make the necessary arrangements for your house etc as planned so as to allow you to fly in April/May.

4. Re: Travel arrangements:

I shall discuss the matter with the TreasurerGeneral who will make the necessary arrangements with London re your travel.

5. Re: Educational service:

It is good that you are getting around trying to pick up whatever material, advice, books etc. I have raised the matter of a cash allowance to cover this with comrade Mkobi. I shall be writing to comrade Mkobi to confirm our arrangement, he has promised to sort this out with the London office. He should be passing through London Friday 3rd.

6. Re: Facilities at the Student Orientation Centre:

We have been assured by the Department of Education that there is ample cash to allow for the proper fitting out of the Student Orientation Centre, tape recorder, videos, etc, and we are trying to have a meeting this afternoon

8. Re: Housing in Mazimbu:

You may remember that Tim pointed out the house he had earmarked for you. Again here I shall be confirming this in writing with Treasure General.

9. Re: Methodology:

I am sure we agree with you regarding the methods of conducting education. We welcome your approach: "no old hats and boring repetitions".

10. Re: Teachers, subjects, etc:

We shall send you further notes with a view to keeping you informed.

11. Re: Your role

I am clear, and by now you should be clear that you have been asked to be the principal of the school. Of-course a lot can and must be cleared up when once you arrives, but your functions need not be confused with that of Quintin's as administrator.
