They knew they had to 'produce vegetables, eggs, chickens, -pigs, maize, etc. In other words, they did not concretely see the fruits of their labour and .now they, as workers, were being appreciated -er -appraised: i sure, they went about their jobs and diligently submitted reports. But to -what en&?"- In keeping with the issue raised by the A riculture Department, the W. D. C. proposed that each Department, in eonsultation Miih tbsAPinance Office, compile a weekly or monthly cost account of their department. This account- should include wages, incenti.ves, feed-, -Seed, fuei, trans- port, repairs and tooIs.V Such a-nraooount will reveal whether we are working at a loss or at a profit. 51.5 The Project has recently received a major shipment of material for the Building Site from Denmark. These items were purchased with a grant from the Danish International Development Agency (DANIDA) of about 2% million Tanzanian shillings. Additional assistance was given by the Tanganyika Christian Refugee Service. The Shipment consists of items which are difficult or impossible to obtain in Tanzania. Included are: special ceiling boards for the Dining Hall and classrooms, paint, louvre glass, plumbing fixtures, ironmongery, a floor and wall tiles, etc. ' '

2. The question of providing adequate security for Mazimbu is more urgent. The fact that thieves can come into Mazimbu, slaughter eight goats, skin them, and make off with the meat without anyone noticing -- shows just how vulnerable we are. Past thefts of tools and equipment are other examples of our weakness in this area. It is unfortunate that, with so many ANC comrades at Mazimbu, it seems quite impossible to set up a proper guarding system; some people don't turn up, others just refuse altogether. We need to solve this question somehow. Discuss this issue in your Production Units. The Bulletin will welcome your suggestions.

3. Peter Sithole, formerly a driver in the Site Production Unit, has been suspended from driving duties by the Transport Committee. The comrade was guilty of reckless driving, which resulted in an accident injuring two workers who were passengers on the truck. Both men went to hospital: apparently one has broken his arm, and the other has broken both arms. The suspension is in effect until such time as the Production Unit and the W. D. C. discuss the case.
