My dear Nelson

Thanks for calling me, and reporting on the Cape Town meeting.

I do remember your concern over the examination results of the year, 1989, when you were still in prison, and how you contacted various people with the request that they see what could be done to save the children.

What could be done in jail was very little, and the year ended with no results. But the 1990 examination results shocked everybody. You immediately reviewed the contacts of the year before, and added more, bringing together a most successful educational conference chaired by Mr de Klerk. This has been very heartening.

Now, we find ourselves confronted by yet another problem: our greatest artists, who should be contributing to the changing environment in our beloved country as a united force, are divided. Fortunately, they have never come together at a time as rich in change as is happening at the moment. This week, which started with a very successful meeting with de Klerk, deliberating on educational issues, cannot be allowed to end with a failure on the part of our artists.

My sincere request, which I would like you to relay to your meeting with the artists tomorrow, 1 March 1991, is that:

"our country and people, at this hour of need, would greatly benefit from a strong and united South African artists."

To be able to move forward and contribute to the positive environment taking place in South Africa, it is important to work together and bury our differences.

Wishing you all very good and successful discussions, please tell our brothers and sisters that we are full of hope.
