LETTER OF RECOMMENDATION - VUSI MAHLASELA:

Vusi Mahlasela is an extremely talented poet, musician and grassroots cultural activist. His work for grassroots cultural organisations, through workshops and performance, has elevated him to the position of one of our most committed and progressive artists in this country.

Battling against extreme odds - the threat of detention during the state of emergency, sporadic employment, the legacies of apartheid education - Vusi Mahlasela has persevered. His poems, and especially his songs, have rejuvenated flagging spirits and bolstered the struggle for freedom in this country. He has been honoured by being one of the few performers to participate in the historic rallies, particularly the release of Nelson Mandela, and the other Rivonia trialists.

Mr Mahlasela has been a stalwart in our organisation, the Congress Of South African Writers, which represents writers from our disadvantaged communities. He has always been ready to participate in our various programmes, and has imparted valuable skills to our members. He has enhanced our understanding and appreciation of vital issues through his thought-provoking lyrics - issues of underdevelopment, rural isolation, gender, unemployment, devastation of township life etc.

Vusi's skill as a musician/composer has ensured his popularity not only in South Africa, but internationally as well. During the latter part of 1990, he took England by storm, performing in such prestigious venues as the Institute of Contemporary Arts(ICA), Riverside Studios and Battersea Arts Centre.

The invitation to Vusi Mahlasela, by Karin Vadfors (President of the Africa Group in Falun), to perform at the Falun Folk Music Festival, increasingly shows his popularity as a legitimate voice of the oppressed in South Africa. Besides the opportunity to perform (and thereby give Swedes an understanding and appreciation of powerful, grassroots protest music), Vusi will have the incredible opportunity to link up with Nordic, Asian and African musicians at the Festival. Our artists have been so insulated, that such an opportunity to experience a blend of music forms at the Festival can only enhance and enrich Vusi's musical expertise.

It is fitting to note that Mr Mahlasela has been accorded the honour of opening the Festival. He has also been asked to speak about the importance of culture, especially in the struggle against apartheid.

The National Committee of COSAW, comprising of illustrious writers such as Nadine Gordimer and Professor Njabulo Ndebele, have complete faith in Mr Mahlasela being a great ambassador of the democratic movement to more than adequately fulfill these important and significant tasks.
