Interview on an "Educational Policy for a future South Africa" (Interview with Eric Molobi or someone else from the NECC)

- . Supposing you are the Minister for Education in a united, non-racial South Africa, what would be your priority given the actual situation in Education in South Africa ?
- . Which fields of research would you describe as priorities to be examined in order to define a future educational policy ?
- . What can be the role of the existing universities in your future policy? What do they have to change in their policy in order to be acceptable to the MDM?
- . Many organizations (enterprises, foregn governments, nongovernmental organizations) run bursary programmes at this moment. What is the difference between their programme and your EAP programme ?
- . What exactly is the role of the community organizations in defining the educational policy ? How can they play this role ?
- . It was thought that within the existing "African Education" there is still a big gap in quality of education between the education in "farm schools" and the education in urban areas. How do you think to redress this urban-rural gap? (The most recent figures on the matriculation results show however that rural youth are performing better but this is due to the violence in many urban areas)
- . Since there is a big shortage of schooling opportunities in the South African education system, "independent schools" and "street academies" spring up and try to fulfill the existing gap. How do you look at these alternatives?
- . The official failure rate for matric of black children for 1989 was 58 % What is a more realistic estimate? Causes? What about re-admission possibilities of failed scholars? Which opportunities for the others?

- . Can you describe the life of the South African African youths in rural areas, in urban areas? (What are they doing? How do they see the future? What are their expectations?)
- . Education is an important foundation for a society. In South Africa this is a problem because of "Apartheid" education. How does the African youth look at education nowadays?
- . In South Africa there are vast numbers of youths that don't get education. Who are they? What are their perspectives for the future?
- . Are these youths, that are not participating in the education system, organized? Are they reached by the existing youth organizations?
- . The MDM and community organizations try to persuade youths to go back to schools. Has this been successful ?
- . Which community organizations have been set up to deal with these kind of situations ? How do they function ?

Recently, when the end examination results were published, it was stated that rural youth are performing better than their colleagues in violence stricken urban areas. Is there a link between the lack of education facilities and the high degree of violence in the South African society?

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
