"We deeply regret the inability of employer organisations to transcend longstanding prejudice and to cross the democratic threshold."

The alliance handed out copies of the draft Charter on Peace Democracy and Economic Reconstruction to the media.

"The failure of this initiative means that the 'ANC.' WW: 1" SAC?

proceed with the campaign for peace, justice and democracy as originally outlined with the aim of uniting the widest spectrum of forces to end the violence and ensure a speedy transition to democracy." Mr Ramaphosa said.

"The ball remains squarely in the government's court.

"The crisis can only be resolved if the National Party Government responds to our efforts to break the negotiations deadlock and takes practical steps to meet the package of 14 demands put before the De Klerk regime by the ANC on June 23 without delay." The alliance leaders warned business not to dismiss workers who participated in the general strike and other mass action.

Mr Naidoo said if employers dismissed workers. "then Cosatu has other programmes it will put into action including (further) general strikes".

Mr Ramaphosa said he wanted to make it clear to companies which dismissed workers that the ANC-led alliance "is not just going to stand by.

"The ANC will launch a massive campaign to enlist them: they are instigated to take action against workers."

Mr Ramaphosa said there was only one option left to business, and that was to join the ANC-led campaign aimed at forcing the government to accept 'genuine majority rule in South Africa.

BRITISH investigators
have sharply criticised
the SA Police's hand-
ling of the Boipatong
massacre. saying the
SAP suffered from
"serious organisational
problems".

But there had been no
evidence of direct police
complicity in the June 17
massacre. according to
Reading University
Criminal Justice Studies
director Dr P A 1 Wed-
dington and two British
Metropolitan Police offi-
CCI'S.

They were appointed
by Mr Justice Richard
Goldstone to evaluate the
police response to. and
investigation of the
massacre. Their 50-page
report was officially re-
leased yesterday morn-
ing.

report. they could ap-
proach the Goldstone
Committee investigating
the massacre.

He said the inquiry
would commence at the
Vereeniging Civic Centre
at 9am on August 5.

According to the ex-
ecutive summary of the
report the inquiry had
identified a number of
(flaws and mistakes of
both police procedure
and judgment.

This suggested that the
SAP suffered from "se-
rious organisational prob-
lems".

These could be summa-
rised under four head-
ings: inadequate com-
mand and control. inef-
fective intelligence and
contingency planning.
unstructured investiga-
tion. and insufficient
awareness of community
relations.

Under the first heading
of Inadequate Command
and Control. the report
noted: "The unevaluated

ty of mlhpower and the deployment of those that were available iilowed this massacre to be perpetrated unhindered."

It added: "SeniOt officers showed a lack of basic strategic pllnning and tactical implementationf'

Regarding the SAP's ttineffective intelligence and contingency planning". the report nid the routine assessment of va-ttaitons In tenitc'th! in sensitive men was undet-developed.

The police lacked adequate comingency plans tu deal with the KwaMadata Hostel situation. that had been a source of policin' problems for some ttnte. or any mhet possible. De Klerk tnot advised against Boipatong visit, THE State Presidents 0(-face has strongly denied thlt Mr De Klerk wee edvised not to visit Boipatong last month after the massacre there.

Mr De Klerkis olfice wns respendtng last night . to reports on a British expert investigation into police hendhng of the rnnmcre.

t'tt :l not correct that the State President was advised not to visit Boipalong. the office satd. adding that he had consulted Ltf/W' ft, the Minister of Law and Ordet. Mt Hernus Kriel. who advised him - after he. in turn had consulted senior SA Police officers - that the visit was "in order".

"The State President was accompanied during - the visit by the Minister of Law and Order as weil as senior SAP ofl'tcerst The Commissioner O! Police, Gen John van der Merwe. yesterday said: "The South African Police entegoriutly denice that my senior officer or member of the force ever advised President De Klerk not to visit Boipltonl."

Earlier a news miete on the Waddington inquiry. hed said Mr De Klerk disregarded advice

not to visit the township.

"The President was advised against visiting. However (he) decided to go ahead. It said the inquiry, headed by British university professor Dr P A J Weddington, put the date of the State President's visit to Boipetong as June 19, when in fact it was June 20.

Quoting the Weddington report further, the newspaper said police had described the township as reasonably quiet. The report went on to describe that once stones and missiles were thrown at Mr De Klerk's convoy in the township, Mr De Klerk was safely protected within his armoured limousine.

Nevertheless, the decision was taken to make an "emergency withdrawal".

"Escorted by a Njah (batlutiennly-protected vehicle) that burst through the crowd (erected by the crowd), the convoy left the township speedily.

"It is worth mentioning that police vehicles were not present at each of the junctions through which the State President's convoy passed and at which barriers were erected."

The report put the date of this incident at June 19, but Mr De Klerk in fact visited Boipetong on Saturday June 20. -

"The debate that has so far taken place has been grossly inadequate and lessons seem not to have been learned," the report said.

It continued, "Indeed, to judge from Boipetong, the SAP lack adequate mechanisms for internal and external accountability since they seem unable or unwilling to establish what action was taken by whom with what result."

Discussing the police's "unstructured investigation", the report said superficial scenes at crime investigation seemed endemic, since there were

few grossly overburdened officers to do this work in the area. and they lacked adequate management.

The SAP's "case docket" approach to investigation was inadequate for an Inquiry of this complexity.

Under the final "insufficient awareness of community relations" section of the report. the investigation said the police seemed to take a "more accommodating approach" towards hostel dwellers than township residents.

This might create an understandable suspicion of favoritism in that direction. however false. They found that the police investigation had concentrated on the Kwa-Madala Hostel. Weapons had been seized. but cannot be linked to individual hostel-dwellers because of the decision to allow weapons to be piled on a pile".

The report said that while detectives were aware of the basic components of an adequate investigation. their systems undermined evidence gathering. _

W0 prison officials have claimed that while waders who belong to an Afrikaner Weerstandsbeweging cell at Leeuw-kup Prison, near Johannesburg, are forging black armvics to make spears and pangas for use in township violence

The officials have not been named for their own safety. Their evidence is corroborated by eight prisoners who have told The Weekly Mail of convicteds being used to manufacture "traditional weapons".

"These weapons are hidden inside a disused cell near the engineering works 31 Leeuw-kup Medium A prison. Some of the weapons are stockpiled in the veld near the cells where members of the AWE hold meetings at night," said one of the prison officials.

The Department of Correctional Services has rejected all allegations as being "malicious and devoid of all truth".

Prison authorities have rejected allegations that members at Leeuw-kup shout slogans and flaunt the insignia of the AWB and asked for names of the members involved so that these can be fully investigated.

The Weekly Mail says while sergeant employed at the prison workshop was accused earlier this year with a load of "traditional weapons". The AWB uses prison as arms factory, claim warders guns and explosives in the hunt of his car.

This sergeant, named as Vermaak, is said to be heavily involved in AW activities at the prison. This claim was also rejected by the Department of Correctional Services.

Tipped off by the eight convicts of the far-reaching activity, the Weekly Mail made contact with the two officials who separately corroborated the details.

One said he personally witnessed waders displaying AWB insignia on prison premises in violation of departmental regulations: The officer was interviewed while he was doing guard duty at a lecture session of Leeuw-kup's prison farm. He provided a detailed account of where the engineering shop and cell alleged to store arms was.
