

ANC PRESS STATEMENT ON REPRESSION IN BOPHUTATSWANA.

A delegation of the ANC, including three members of the NEC, met today with the ANC Bophutatswana Consultative Forum to discuss the allegations made in the press by Dr. Lucas Mangope. The following facts emerged from the meeting.

The Bophutataswana police have consistently broken-up ANC branch meetings. The police broke up branch meetings in Thaba Nchu on the 1st and the 28th of October. Similarly, meetings were disturbed in Garankua on the 21st and 26th October.

Moreover, the Bophutatswana administration consistently refuses to respond to applications made by ANC branches to hold meetings. The Mafikeng branch sent three applications to hold a meeting on the 20th October- they are still waiting for a response. This has been the experience of other branches as well. The Mafikeng branch has submitted a futher application to hold a meeting on the 17th November. Up to this time, there has been no response from the Bophutatswana authorities.

On Saturday, 10th October, a busload of people, returning from an ANC meeting in Botshabelo, was attacked by Bophutatswana police. Many of the occupants of the bus were seriously hurt.

These facts demontsrate that Dr. Mangope's claim that democracy exists in the bantustan is untrue.

It is surely no coincidence that Dr. Mangope's absurd claim that there is an ANC "plot" to assasinate him comes on the day when thousands of people have stayed away from work in response to a call made by COSATU, the UDF and the Anti-Bophutatswana Co-Ordinating Committee. The stayaway was called to demand trade union rights in the bantustan.

It is clear that Mangope wishes to suppress every visible challenge to his illegitimate regime. He has used the nonsense of an ANC "plot" to further harass the democratic movement.

The ANC demands the immediate and unconditional release of all those who have been arrested and an end to the repression of the democratic movement in that part of our country.

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ANC Statement in Response of the Ministry of Law and Order on the Zonk'izizwe Video-Tape, 3rd December 1990.

The Ministry of Law and Order cannot pretend that this is the first time that evidence of police collusion with vigilantes in perpetrating violence against communities has been presented. The Ministry has called for evidence and then rejected without any investigation all eye-witness accounts, affidavits presented and news stories written, Now that irrefutable visual evidence has been provided the Ministry has resorted to a denial that insults the intelligence of the people of South Africa.

Even more serious, a Ministry supported by the taxes of all the people of South Africa shirked its responsibility of stopping acts of aggression against communities but has the audacity to place the onus of gathering evidence of police collusion in attacks on the very victims - the communities themselves! When such evidence is provided, as in the case of this video-tape, it is treated with contempt and no regard for the truth. The way the Ministry of Law and Order has dealt with the visual evidence produced shows a lack of seriousness on the part of the government regarding the question of violence.

With regard to specific issues raised by the Ministry of Law and Order in relation to the video-tape we wish to state the following:

1. It is clear to anyone who cares to view the video-tape that it has not been edited; it is raw footage presented as it was taken. This was pointed up by a number of Television technicians during the Ministry's Press Conference on Sunday.

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- 2. The explanation that the police had given a lift to leaders of both sides in order to negotiate peace with each of them stretches credulity. The following questions say out for a meaningful response:
- * Why can the police not supply the names or any details concerning this alleged " other side"? The flimsy excuse that "the other side" did not trust them and, thus did not-give them their names, would be laughable if the situation were not so serious.
- * If, as the police claim, the vigilantes were dispersing peacefully why the movement in formation and the war songs?
- * Why did the police leave and not monitor and oversee the dispersal process?
- * Why did the police pretend to be searching for weapons when they could see the prospective attackers carrying weapons as they advanced on the settlement?
- 3. The police interpretation of the songs sung by vigilantes is a scandalous misrepresentation which the Ministry exploited because most of the journalists could not understand Zulu. We defy the Ministry to submit it for translation by any competent Zulu authority.

As a result of Police luaction there is now a vigilante stronghold at Zonk'izizwe from which other communities will be attacked. Now that it seems that the hostels are proving ineffective as a base from which to attack communities a new launch-pad is being sought. The collusion between the Police and vigilantes at Zonk'izizwe as recorded on the video-tape is evidence of that.

The Ministry of Law and Order cannot escape the consequences of its activities by a simple imputation of bad motives on the part of the ANC. The ANC, with the people of South Africa, still awaits a credibile official explanation.

- 1. On 4th February, 1991 a delegation of The African National Congress led by its deputy President and a delegation of the Pan Africanist Congress led by its President, met in Johannesburg.
- 2. The discussions were conducted in a spirit of comradeship and motivated by the commonly felt need for unity amongst the oppressed.
- 3. The following agreements were arrived at:-
- 3.1. That the delegations recommend to their respective N.E.C.'s the creation within 10 days from the date hereof, of a joint liason committee charged with the following tasks:
- 3.1.1.preparations for a future joint meeting of the two N.E.C.'S to exchange views on key strategic questions.
- 3.1.2.to explore and recommend future joint actions by the two organisations.
- 3.1.3.to formulate and recommend measures for the ending of interorganisational conflict.
- 4. We call on all our members and supporters to cease all hostile acts against one another and to practice political tolerance.
