REPRESENTATION RE: INTERIM BILL OF FUNDAMENTAL EUMAN RIGETS

The Association for Mental Handicap is an organisation of parents of people with a mental haniicap, and some others working in this field. It is & branch of the Witwatersrand Mental Heal th Society, is affiliated to the South African Federation for Mental Heslth, and worke closely with homes and centres on the Witwatersrand, This Association therefore kas a direct interest in protecting the rights cof persons with 2 mental handicap.

Persona with a mental handicap need special protection in a Bill of Rights becsuse $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) +\left(1\right)$

- L Society tends to regard people with a mental handicap as "different" and not in need of fundamental human rights such as the Right to Bducation, Eealth Care and Personal Freedomm.
- 2. Persons with a mental handicap are generally not abie to speak for themselves and therefore reguire protection,
- e Their rights are often cverlooked since it is agreed that they are unable to understand these rights or to exercise them.
- 4. Thay are often confused with persons with a physical disability or meatal illness, and sheir needs are therefore not understood.

In Soutk Africa, about 1 persom in 25, or over 1 million of our pepulation, have a mental handicap and therefore some 5 willion people's lives are probably affected in some way. Te, together with wany tarents, relatives and friends of persons with a mental handicap, feel very strongly that there is a need %o protect tueir intereste in the RBill of Fundamental Rights. In a recent campaign this Association took rart in the collection of appreximately 50 COO signatures in support of =z petition for a Charter of Rights for Persons with a Mental Handicap which we felt should be an Addendum % the Bill of Fundamental Rights in South Africa. These signatures and petition were submitted to Judge P J J Qlivier of the South African Law Commission in March 1993 and are held in custody by that Commission. The petition was received with symputhy and understanding. A copy of the Charter adopted by the United Nations is attached.

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We understand that the Bill of Rights, as presently proposed, has no place for a Charter of Rights as an addendum, or for any special rights for minority groups, and we urge you to give special consideration % the cause of the mentally handicapped for the reasons outlined above.

Ve believe that there will be some legal mechanism, such as a commission,

set up to monitor human rights and we feel that any such body must include 2 person with kmowledge and experience of disability in the area of mental bandicap. That person siould be srecially appointed to sefeguard the fundamental rights of persons with a mental kandicap,

Iz view of these concerns by & large number of people in Soutk Africa, we ask that you take the necessary ateps % build suitable protection for people with & mental hamdicap into the B:11 of Fundamental Rights and its adwinistrative provisions, We would eppreciate it very much if a person representing this Aesociation and the wentally bandicapred could be given an opportunity to address the Technical Committee about tke Rights of people with a mental handicap.

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GENERAL AND SPECIAL RIGHT CENERAL ASSEMBLY 1971

The mentally retarded person has the same basic rights as other citizens of the gage country and the sape age.

The mentally retarded person has a righe to proper medical care and physical restoration and te such education, training, habilitation and guidance as wilj enable him eo develop his ability and potential to the fullest possible extent, no wmatter how severe his degree of disability. No mentally handicapped person ahould be deprived of such gervices by reason of the costs involved.:

The dentally retarded person has a right to economic security acd to a decent standard of living. He has a right to productive work or to other meaningful occupation.

The mentally retarded Person has a right to live vith his own family or with foster parents, to participate in all aspects of compunity life and to be provided with appropriate leisure time activities. If care in an institution becomes necessary, it should be in surroundings and other \hat{A} circumstances ag close to normal living as possible. :

The mentally retarded person has a right top a qualified guardian when this is required to protect his personal well befng and interest. No person rendering direct services to the mentally retarded should serve as hias guardian,

The mentally retarded Person has a right to protection from exploitation, abuse and degrading treatment. If-accused, he hag a right to a fair trial with full recognition being given to his degree of tesponsibility.

Some mentally retarded persons may be unable, due to the severity of their handicap, to exercise for themselves all the rights in a meaningful way. For others, modification of some or all of these rights must contain proper legal safeguards against every possible form of abuse, must be based ¢u ao evaluation of the social capability of the mentally retarded person by qualified experts and must be subject to periodic reviews and

to the right of appeal to higher authorities,
