Dear Colleague:

The Hunger Project is privileged to send you a copy of its newest publication, the Arturo Tanco Memorial Lecture. Established by the Hunger Project in 1986, the Annual Arturo Tanco Memorial Lecture is dedicated to the late Arturo Tanco, former president of the World Food Council, minister of agriculture for the Philippines, and member of The Hunger Project Board of Directors.

This year, The Hunger Project was honored to have General Olusegun Obasanjo, former head of state of Nigeria, deliver the lecture on the topic "Issues in Agricultural Development in Africa." Asserting that "the economic future of Africa depends on the future of agriculture," General Obasanjo provides a comprehensive overview of the agricultural problems facing Africa today.

With between 70 and 80 percent of the population and labor force depending upon agriculture for employment and income, General Obasanjo emphasizes the importance of appropriate land tenure policies, price policies, infrastructure and research in agriculture. He also singles out the attitude of Africans toward agriculture as key to its future, noting that young people often opt for non-agricultural occupations.
