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SA police whip black mourners after funeral

JOHANNESBURG, Thursday: Disabled African National Congress leader Harry Gwala said he and a group of mourners had been attacked by police with plastic whips as they left the funeral of a slain trade unionist.

Mr Gwala, 68, a former political prisoner and confidante of imprisoned ANC leader Nelson Mandela, called the assault "totally unprovoked."

He said he was at the front of a group of mourners singing freedom songs as they walked from the graveside of trade unionist Jabu Ndlovu in the Slangspruit township outside Pietermaritzburg, the provincial capital of Natal. They were about to leave the cemetery, Mr Gwala said, when about 16 white policemen ran at them and started lashing them with "sjamboks" (plastic whips).

The other mourners scattered but Mr Gwala said he could not run because he suffers from a neurological disease that has paralysed both his

arms and weakened his leg muscles.

He said he was struck several times on the shoulders, side, legs and hands. A doctor later treated him for bruises.

"Nobody did anything to provoke the police. They were not even taunted," he said. "They gave us no order to disperse. They just advanced and started attacking us with sjamboks."

The police, reporting the incident in a routine daily bulletin on political unrest, said that they had taken the action after "a group of blacks began acting in a militant fashion and ignored police requests to disperse." They did not mention that Mr

Gwala was among the group.

Mr Gwala, a regional executive member of the ANC, was imprisoned twice in the 1960s and 1970s - the second time for life - for recruiting ANC guerrillas. He served 13 years of the jail terms alongside Mandela in the offshore prison on Robben Island before Mandela was transferred to another prison. Mr Gwala was released last November on humanitarian grounds.

Mrs Ndlovu died after being wounded in a gun attack at her home last month. Her husband and

daughter also were killed in the attack.

The killers have not been arrested. Township residents say they were part of a vigilante group which has been linked to the police. The Baltimore Sun
