The armorial bearings of the University of Natal were awarded by the College of Arms in London.

The two black wildebeest come from the arms of the Province of Natal. They are shown in full course to symbolise movement and progress. The two open books represent the universal heritage of knowledge and the two centres of the University, Durban and Pietermaritzburg. The five-pointed star refers to the naming of Natal by Portuguese navigators when they landed for the first time at Durban on Christmas Day in 1497. Stella Aurorae, star of the dawn, symbolises the role of the University in bringing to light new knowledge and spreading the enlightening influence of education.

JOHN KNIGHT

John Knight, who was born in 1939, studied at Maritzburg College and at the Maritzburg camp

of this University, where he took a BA degree and then, in 1959, an Honours degree in Economics. He went to the University of Cambridge on a scholarship, and there he distinguis hed

himself in the Economics Tripos.

In 1962 he became an assistant research officer at the Institute of Economics and Statistic s at

Oxford. In due course he became research officer, senior research officer, and professor at the

same Institute. But at the same time he was active in other areas of economics at Oxford. In 1966

he was appointed Managing Editor of the Oxford Bulletin of Economics and Statistics. In the following year he was elected as Fellow and Tutor of St Edmund Hall, one of the Oxford colleges. He was in 1991 a founder member of the Centre for the Study of African Economics. He is also a Professor and the first Head of the newly-established Department of Economics at

the University of Oxford.

His research interests range widely, and he has published several important books and numer ous

influential articles. For many years he has had a special interest in the South African lab our

market. He has also written extensively on the economy of China, and on a number of other developing countries. Another of his research concerns is $a\200\234$ human capital $a\200\234$ human capitalan ca

education on economic activity. As an expert in the field of Third World economics and as a research supervisor he has been of assistance to many South African academics and postgradu ate

students.

His expertise has meant that he has often been used as a consultant $\hat{a}\200\224$ by the World Bank, the

International Labour Organization, the British Overseas Development Administration, the House of

Commons Expenditure Committee, the United Nations Committee for Development Planning, and the African Development Bank. In 1973 and 1974 he advised the British parliament on African wages in South Africa and the employment practices of British-owned firms. His work provided the

framework for the ECC code of conduct. He is also an Economic and Research Adviser to the Ministry of Labour in China, a country that he has visited on very many occasions.

The University of Natal honours John Knight for the distinction that he has achieved in the world

of economics, for the pioneering research work that he has done in various areas, particula rly that

of developing economies, and for the consistently analytical and generous concern that he h as shown

for the condition of the South African economy.

A Brief History of the University of Natal

Natal University College - The forerunner of the University of Natal - opened its doors in Pietermaritzburg in 1910 with

eight professors and 57 students, eight of whom were women. Lectures in Classics, English a nd Philosophy, Law,

Modern Languages, Botany and Geology, Chemistry and Physics, Mathematics and Zoology were s pread over various

venues, including Maritzburg College, the Natal Museum building and at the City Hall.

It was not until August 1912 that Old Main Building - built on 40 acres of land donated by the Pietermaritzburg

Corporation - was opened by the then Minister of Education, F.S. Malan and the core of the present-day

Pietermaritzburg campus was established. The following year, Natal University College (NUC) ceased to be a state

institution, becoming instead a state-aided body.

In 1923, NUC extended its tuition to Durban with university level courses in Commerce and ${\tt E}$ ngineering at the

Technical College, but it was not until 1928 that Durban agreed that NUC take over full responsibility for university

classes in Durban, thereby establishing the characteristic dual nature of the University of Natal. A generous donation by

T B Davis, whose son, Howard Davis had been killed during the battle of the Somme in World War I, facilitated the

building of Howard College on the Berea which formed the core of a separate campus in Durba ${\tt n.}$ Howard College was

formally opened in 1931.

Largely through the efforts of Fabian Socialist Dr Mabel Palmer, separate classes for 19 $^{\text{N}}$ on-Europeanâ\200\235 teaching

students at NUC were introduced in Durban in 1936. This number, reflecting an obvious need for training of this

nature, grew to nearly 900 by 1960. However, like the University's Medical School, founded in 1951 for black students,

classes still reflected the segregated nature of South Africa under apartheid. The governme nt's Extension of University

Act of 1959 limited new enrolments, other than those at Medical School, to whites and thwar ted the University's

aspirations to serve the educational needs of broader society. This act also restricted the autonomy achieved when $\hbox{\scriptsize NUC}$

was granted full university status in 1949. It was not until 1983 when the University circu mvented the government's

racial admission "quotas \hat{a} 200\235 by an appeal to the High Court, that the University could fully resume its role of serving the

educational needs of the broader community. Today, about 20 000 students, representing all sectors of South African

society, are enrolled at the University of Natal.

In 1953, the administrative control for the University was shifted from Pietermaritzburg to Durban. In response to

mounting travelling costs, the two centres were academically separated in 1973, with each c entre having parallel

faculties of Law, Humanities, Commerce, Science, and Social Science. Recent restructuring h as meant the merging of

some faculties across both campuses, with Faculties of Education, Engineering, and Law bein g shared by both

campuses. Unique to Durban are the Faculties of Community and Development Disciplines, Mana gement Studies,

Science and Medicine. Unique to Pietermaritzburg is the Science and Agriculture Faculty. There are separate Faculties

of Human Sciences on each campus.

The University of Natal is fortunate to boast among its past vice-chancellors and principal s some exceptional leaders. Its

first principal, John Bews (1930-38), was a world-renowned botanist while Dr E G Malherbe (1945-65) was known

internationally as an educationalist. In 1993, the University of Natal was the first South

African University to appoint a

woman as its principal. Brenda Gourley is the present incumbent. Chancellors have also been distinguished figures, not

least the present Chancellor, Judge Pius Langa, and the recently retired Archbishop Denis H urley OMIL. Students

include Alan Paton, Steve Biko, Alec Erwin and J M Coetzee. From the Medical School, come i llustrious alumni such

as Dr Ben Ngubane, Dr Mamphela Ramphele, Dr Zweli Mkhize and Professor Ronnie Green-Thompso n. Honorary

graduates include Nelson Mandela, Roy Campbell, Abdullah Ebrahim, Fatima Meer and Selby Bag wa.

The University of Natal is committed to service through excellence in teaching and research and is opposed to

discrimination on the grounds of race, colour, nationality, religion or gender. It is known as a centre for excellence in

Aftica, is one of South Africa's top research institutions, and has links with almost 260 i nternational institutions. Alive

to the demands of a rapidly changing global environment, the University has embarked on a thorough reform of curricula

and university structures and is currently a leader in multi-disciplinary studies and is en gaged in significant HIV/Aids

research. In recognition of its role in society, the University of Natal is also committed to greater emphasis on

community-based education and service learning.

THE CHANCELLOR

"Chancellor" is an office that goes back to antiquity; the original cancellarius regulated access to the Roman Tribune. In medieval times, the office became associated with the heads of the writing departments of early kings. Because so few people were literate, a chancellor was automatically learned. This explains why heads and spokesmen of the early universities were also accorded the title. More recently, the office has become largely symbolic. The executive head of a university is its vice-chancellor.

Justice Pius Langa is the sixth Chancellor of the University of Natal. His predecessors were: The Honourable D G Shepstone (1949-1966), Dr G G Campbell (1967-1973), Dr B A Armitage (1973-1983), the Honourable R N Leon QC (1983-1992) and Archbishop D E Hurley (1993-1998)

THE MACE

The Chancellor's Mace, generally referred to as "The Mace", is used on ceremonial occasions presided over by the Chancellor and is regarded as the Chancellor's staff of "officeâ\200\235. It symbolises the University's protection of its Chancellor.

The use of the mace as a symbol of authority has a long history. The head of a copper mace, which apparently dates back to the 12th century before Christ, has been excavated at Beyce Sultan in Asia. In the early centuries, churchmen who went to war often carried a mace in preference to a sword. One side of the mace-head was beautifully decorated with the owner's emblem and on the other side was a large knob which served as a weapon, and was always round so that the church law never to shed blood was always carefully observed! In the early centuries the mace was a symbol of the king's authority. During the power struggle between the king and the Commons in the 13th century, the king gave the speaker the mace as a symbol of his indemnity against arrest.

The Mace was designed by Mr G H Atkins, senior lecturer in sculpture in the University's Department of Fine Arts, was made in England and was first used at the 1970 graduation ceremonies.
