licemen, the Government urged warring parties in the Midlands to use the National Peace Accord to resolve differences.

demnation from both the ANC and the Inkatha Freedom Party.

Anglican bishops yesterday condemned political leaders of all persuasions for the growing and. shocking tolerance of corruption, lies and murder in public life.

In a hard-hitting statement following a meeting of the church's Synod of Bishops of the Church of the Province of Southern Africa in KwaZulu last week, they said there was a moral deterioration in South African society.

The bishops said most South Africans were increasingly angry at the face-saving posturing, the bickering and the jockeying for position being indulged in by our politicians as we slide closer to civil war.

The bishops accused Government of depravity and corruption over recent scandals and its failure to take immediate action against General Eddie Webb of the Civil Co-operation Bureau for his admission that he lied under oath about the CCB's murderous activities.

The fact that Cabinet Ministers had not resigned over scandals showed the South African Government has lost all sense of shame at the criminal activities of its officials.

The bishops added: While the ANC's recent exposure of its own human rights abuses is welcome, we remain horrified that any official in an organisation fighting for justice and democracy could have carried out or condoned such dreadful atrocities.

The bishops said they were incensed at the way in which President de Klerk has rammed his Government's amnesty law through undemocratic legislative structures. as if he and his Government have a great deal to hide.

Details were published
yesterday by the Sunday
Times, saying that â\200\234min-
utes of the meeting were
leakedâ\200\235 to the news-
paper, but not saying by
whom they were leaked.

The leadership dispute
within the National Party
began after Mr Botha's
mild stroke in January.
On February 2, 1989. he

resigned as NP leader. Mr
De Klerk was elected NP
leader, over Mr Barend
du Plessis, who was re-
portedly Mr Botha's
choice as successor.

There was a running
battle between Mr Botha,
Mr De Klerk (then NP
leader) and the NPâ\200\231s Fed-
eral Council on the poss-
ible date for an election
and the NPâ\200\231s insistence
that the Head of State

and NP leader should be the same person.

Fisally, Mr Botha called the election in September, 1989 â\200\224 he had wanted it postponed to 1990. Then came a row over a proposed visit by Mr De Klerk and Mr Pik Botha, Minister of Foreign Affairs, to Zambian President Kenneth Kaunda. Mr Botha said he had not consented to the meeting, others said he had been consulted.

With the State President and Cabinet at loggerheads, Mr Botha called an extraordinary meeting of the Cabinet at Tuynhuys on Monday morning, August 14.

Mr Botha waived his right to address the Cabinet first, and left the floor to the NP leader, Mr De

Klerk. m

â\200\234We earnestly desire to ensure that your honour and your dignity are not impaired,â\200\235 said Mr De Klerk.

â\200\234We believe, therefore, that the least painful solution for you, for the National Party and for all of us would be that you move to the Wilderness and say you have decided to appoint an acting state president from now until the election.â\200\235

Each of the other Cabinet Ministers in turn had their say. Each called on Mr Botha to resign.

Struck back

Mr Botha then struck back: â\200\230â\200\234â\200\234You are prepared to sacrifice me for the sake of your chat with Kaunda â\200\224 this Cabinet is prepared to do so.â\200\235

Mr Botha rounded on his Cabinet colleagues, saying they were performing badly on television in the election campaign.

He had special words for Mr De Klerk, who had decided against standing in his long-time Vereeniging constituency, since he would become State President after the September election.
