### OUT OF THE RAIN

I am moved by fancies that are curled Around these images and cling:
The notion of some infinitely gentle
Infinitely suffering thing

magine a scene in which a man is lying on his stomach, his one hand extended and the other crooked with his head placed on it. It is a wonderfully restful pose – a pose such as might be assumed in a municipal park under a noonday sun.

But there is no cushioning turf in this scene and the morning is cold and sunless. Out of the side of the man's mouth has trickled blood that's formed a pool. He has been lying on the paved court since the late afternoon of the previous day. Sometime during the night he has been stripped of his shoes, his windbreaker and his belt.

This man, on whose account the multitude will not lift its collective finger, this ragged-looking man whose congealing blood forms a 'bloody rose' on the white paving is Winston Churchill Masakeng Saoli, whose work, stroke for stroke and colour upon colour, came to match that of Vincent van Gogh's, an artist he so admired.

Like Van Gogh, Winston Saoli died at the relatively young age of 45. Like Van Gogh, he died tragically and without a penny to his name. Like Van Gogh, his adult life was a litany of pain and suffering.

Born on 3 January 1950 at a place called Acornhoek in Mpumalanga, Winston was one of six children: three brothers and three sisters. He attended Arthur's Seat Lower Primary School, where his father, the Reverend Russell Saoli, was principal. It was during this idyllic time of innocence an event occurred that was to make a great and lasting impression on Winston.

Acornhoek, situated in the proximity of the Kruger National Park, occasionally plays host to the odd zebra or two, but one school day a visitor of a


brother, Anthony, ran the gauntlet of the tsotsi element because they owned bicycles and for simply being sons of the moruti (the reverend). Other painful times followed when the budding artist's talent – and the poignancy of his paintings – became like the wag-'n-bietjie thorn on the guilt of white men riding roughshod over the lot of black people.

That Winston (the son of an ebullient father who was an author and an editor of an ecclesiastical journal) possessed a prodigious talent is not in question. In the words of Bill Hart, one of Winston's early mentors, writing in *Artlook* magazine of January 1971, 'Thursday morning, July 1968, was an unpleasant day. Ezrom Legae and I were gazing out of the window at Jubilee Centre. It was raining, pouring down outside – unusual for a Transvaal winter.

'Julian Motau had recently been gunned down in Alexandra – Julian Motau, one of our "young lions", as we thought of him. Sad thoughts for a cold, wet, winter morning. This was the setting for our first meeting with Winston Saoli. From the look of him – wet, bedraggled, trousers two inches above his ankles and jacket cuffs hugging his elbows – just turned 18 and nervous as a kitten, certainly no "young lion" about to burst upon the art scene . . .

'The work Winston brought to show us did not have Ezrom Legae and me doing handstands and frothing at the mouth but in his favour (unlike so many aspiring young black artists) he was not trying to pass off copies from comics, or any other source, as his own work.

'Obviously the talent was there, just waiting to blossom. This blossoming was due to a tremendous amount of hard work on his part. He drew at

more majestic sort paid the hamlet a call. The first inkling the inhabitants had of the lion's presence was the arrival of a stammering and quaking cyclist who'd nearly toppled off his bicycle at the awesome sight. Not long thereafter the lion announced itself with an earth-shattering roar. Great was the people's admiration for the local white priest who bravely went out with his rifle to confront the beast, which had by then feasted on a cow.

When they moved to Mofolo, Soweto, in 1963, Winston and his every possible opportunity – while walking through Soweto, on trains, at home; in fact, everywhere.'

Winston also made a diligent study of other artists. The Michaelis Art Library furnished him with the works of the European masters – the Van Goghs, the Picassos, the Chagalls and the Paul Klees.

Winston's first exhibitions were at the Linda Goodman Gallery from 1969 to 1973. In 1971 he was commissioned to illustrate the front cover of Dollar Brand's (now Abdullah Ibrahim) album *Peace*, the execution and originality of which were such that it was voted best foreign illustration by *Downbeat* magazine, the American 'bible' of jazz.

These were salad days. The Winston Saoli star was on the ascendancy. Speaking of this period, he said, 'When I visited a friend of mine in Natalspruit, he introduced me at his local shebeen as the illustrator of *Peace* and instantly I became a hero. Offers of free drinks were coming from all angles, and some patrons who'd

misunderstood were even telling new arrivals that I was Dollar Brand!'

Unfortunately – and perhaps inevitably – the pervasive vortex of drink that sucks in certain exceptional people began to take hold.

However, what most associates believe was Winston's calvary, and one from which he never recovered, was his 90-day detention in 1976, the year that is now a landmark on the political calendar of South African history.

Sam Bloomberg, whose wife Maylene owns Johannesburg Arts & Picture Framers, which houses a considerable number of Winston's later work and the few sculptures he made, is of the opinion that the solitary confinement was the breaking of Winston.

Others agree. Linda Goodman said, 'It broke my heart to see Winston's mother and father sitting in my offices day after day. I don't know what they expected of me.'

And Winston himself said of the

incident, with naivety and bewilderment coming through in his words, 'I was imprisoned until they were satisfied that I was an artist and not a politician.'

Many people are familiar with the mad 'own affairs' policy of the last government. What they may not be aware of are the lengths to which the apartheid government went to enforce that policy. The arts was one area that proved most troublesome to the architects of apartheid. Rubbing shoulders with genuine connoisseurs and art lovers at exhibitions occasionally would be the thick-necked, crop-headed government agent striving to understand the artistic terminology flowing around him. These agents employed any and every method of entrapment, from outright intimidation to offers of a homosexual kind.

What Winston failed to realise was that the people who detained him knew that he was an artist. Nobody who saw his paintings could doubt that. What he was actually detained for was that his depiction of his milieu

compelled empathy – his paintings had all the quality of incitement.

After the detention, dark cloud after dark cloud shrouded the artist's star. The first of his immediate family to die was the eldest brother, Tankie, who was involved in a head-on collision with a double-decker bus while riding his company's motorcycle. His mother, Esther, of whom Winston was very fond, followed in 1983. Russell Saoli, the man of letters, succumbed three years later. The youngest brother, Anthony – a gifted bassist with the band Drive – died of cancer in 1989.

In my conversations with the artist, it emerged that the death of Tony, as Anthony was popularly known, appeared to be the most devastating event in Winston's life. Even the death of his eldest son, Tshepo, two years ago did not seem as deeply felt as that of Tony's – but by then, perhaps, repeated calamity and years of homelessness had toughened Winston's 'infinitely gentle, infinitely suffering' soul. Then again, no person can know exactly, behind the cast of the daily masks,

what is in the inner sanctum of another person's soul.

These tragic happenings were enough to turn any person's mind. They landed Winston on the streets.

The preceding years had ensured Winston of an unshakeable reputation, which extended beyond South Africa's borders, as an artist of note, despite his increasing dependence on alcohol. His work was of an international standard. He exhibited in Preston, England; in Bonn, West Germany; in Canada and in the USA. His last exhibition was at the Berman Gallery in 1994.

The squabbling and the back stabbing manifest among many art dealers would rival that in a fish market. Winston's work (latterly Winston worked in cafés, parks, beside railway lines and elsewhere) was still very much in demand. However, the eagerness with which some art buyers strove to procure his paintings was contrasted by a marked reluctance to pay him a decent fee, and many of these people took advantage of Winston's vagrancy and his dependence on liquor. They also accused one another of offering the master premises in which to work and stay solely for the purpose of getting his works cheaply while plying him with unlimited quantities of liquor. When he become aware of these tug of wars, Winston, rightly or wrongly, would up and be gone - back into the uncertainty and the danger of the streets. Now that he is dead - and it was a death that sits heavily on the conscience - these same people argue about who is to blame for the master's disgraceful death.

There are those people who honestly chastise themselves for not putting more effort into the rehabilitation of Winston. Mrs Berman of the Berman Gallery is one of them. 'I always felt so helpless,' she says. 'I would ask him, whenever he came in here, what it was that I could do to help, but whatever offer I made, he simply would not take it up. As to talent, he was head and shoulders above other artists, and he influenced quite a number of them although they will not admit it, even to themselves.'

Mrs Berman is not conservative about the late artist's attributes. She speaks of his great vision, of his mastery of colour combinations, of how he broke out early from the patronising constraints of what and how art by blacks should be . . . and of how he never realised his true potential. The perception of himself as a victim was a limiting factor in his creativity,' she says. 'The persecution mania and the tendency for self-destruction affected his ability to rise above himself.'

Despite this view, many prominent and eminent private collectors are in possession of a Saoli painting or two – or not. Some works reached their pre-

sent owners through a subterfuge that has been a feature of the arts since man began carving images on stone. I myself was once a participant, albeit with no premeditation, in something similar. I had just finished a painting one Saturday morning when I met a well-known artist who will (as this is no inquisition) remain nameless. On seeing the painting, he asked, 'Is it a Saoli?'

Looking at the painting, I saw that, as sometimes happens, I'd forgotten to sign it, and for the first time I became aware of the Saoliesque sweeps I'd unconsciously made.

'Yes,' I said, for some indefinable

'How much?' asked the artist.

I was amazed. 'You mean to buy it?' 'Yes. How much?'

'But it's unsigned,' I protested. 'How can you be sure it's a Saoli?'

'I know his work and the signature doesn't matter. How much?'

So be it, I thought, and named my price. Half an hour later, when the banks opened, I was considerably richer. And many has been the time since when my work has been bought solely because of the presence and approval of the master.

t is a few minutes after seven on a cold Sunday morning, 21 May 1995. Homeless men are crowding the bus and taxi-rank toilets in downtown Bree Street where there in a single tap with running water. Among the men is one Enoch Ngwepwe, who is stripped to the waist and whose face is full of soap suds.

A man approaches Enoch and says, 'Did you see your friend, the artist? He's lying next to Going Up and he looks dead.' Enoch rushes into the street with his face still covered with suds and finds Winston. He feels for a pulse and detects a faint flutter. He runs to a pay telephone nearby and calls for an ambulance.

'Those people did not take long, about 10 minutes and they were there,' Enoch says. 'They applied the resuscitation method but after a while they stepped back. One of them turned to me and said, "Your friend is beyond help, I'm afraid."

The official autopsy said Winston Saoli, like his brother Tony, died of cancer. Whether what actually killed him was the disease or being bounced down a steep flight of steps in one of the nearby liquor outlets, as rumour has it, is a moot point.

What is undeniable is that in the words of Peter Sibeko, artist and proprietor of the Soweto Art Gallery, the only black-owned art gallery in town, with the death of Winston Churchill Masakeng Saoli, the nation has been left bereft.

A nightclub named Apocalypse Now and brothels run from the zoo. Mangled helicopter gunships on the side of the highway and tours through Vietcong tunnels. Victims of Agent Orange. Returning Gls and returning boat people, and 'Uncle Ho' staring down from every statue and poster. These are just some of the facets of Vietnam today

he American sitting next to me on Vietnam Airways' dilap-Russian Tupolev burst into tears on seeing the rows of bunkers and bombed-out fighter hangars that still line the runway at the former US air base in Vietnam. Landing at Than Son Nhut Airport in 1995 is probably similar to landing there in 1975. It turned out the American was a war veteran, returning for the first time, on a vigilante mission to find a friend he saw parachute into the jungle near the Cambodian border.


In fact the plane turned out to be full of people returning. Two million Vietnamese boat people abandoned the country when Saigon fell to the communists exactly 20 years ago and those who did not perish in the South China Sea spent years in refugee camps scattered around Asia before ending up in the West. They had decided it was time to go back and they were all crying too.

Vietnam Airways is enough to reduce anyone to tears. In 1988 half its fleet of 12 rust buckets were involved in incidents, including one in which several foreign ambassadors were killed; one of the safety exits was later found bolted shut. Some internal flight travellers arrive at the ticket desk and are asked whether they'd like a seating or standing ticket!

An extremely old Citroën, whose door you had to open to change into one of its two gears, took me into Ho Chi Minh City through wide boulevards of bougainvillea, packed with bicycles and scooters, and let me out at The Rex on Le Loi Boulevard – the hotel from where journalists painted their last dramatic pictures as Vietcong rockets poured into the city.

Nestling on the banks of the legendary Mekong Delta, Ho Chi Minh City – as Saigon is now called – is a typically bustling, hot and overpopulated Asian city. But that is where the similarities end.

Ho Chi Minh City still holds France close to its heart. People say that if you took all the Vietnamese out

of the city you would be left with Paris. The elder generation still speak French, and baguettes, croissants and Chateau Laffite abound in the patisseries. They also hold the USA close. The southerners are extremely forgiving of the Americans – mainly because they own the Vietnamese passion and the dollar. The recent news that the USA wants to play ball again will have brought great joy to the city.

The legacy of the USA occupation is a profusion of neon-lit nightclubs with names such as Apocalypse Now and Crazy Joe's GI Hangout. Many of these nightclubs are exactly the way the GIs left them, except that they have been touched by some famed Vietnamese eccentricity. I went into The Firebase Club in the oncerenowned Snake Alley, paid my 40 000 dong (R15) and was ushered through a curtain into a completely silent and dark room.

I sat for 10 minutes in what felt like a huge room. I decided to light a cigarette. No sooner had the flame ignited than a shadowy figure appeared,

asked me what the hell I was doing and confiscated my matches. After 30 minutes the lights came on, music blared and a waiter finally brought me a formaldehyde-reinforced Mekong beer. Vietnamese youths poured from every corner onto the dance floor, frantically chasing each other around. My second beer was on its way when the club was plunged into darkness again. Dismissing it as yet another Third World power failure, I completed my transaction with the waiter by fumbling in the dark. This process continued all night and it transpired that Saigon's nightclub owners are so concerned about client privacy that they give you 30 minutes of light and music to pick up your date and 30 minutes of darkness to get as far as you can. The rest of us just had to sit and wait patiently for the lights.

Prostitution and Indochina go hand-in-hand and Ho Chi Minh City is no different, except that one of the main brothels is run from, of all places, the zoo.

Rare snowy tigers and black pan-

thers paced up and down in their palatial wrought-iron cages as groups of leather-clad girls wiggled provocatively around. A bizarre young pimp, aged about eight, found me an irresistible target. He sidled over with two pig-tailed girls of about 12 and announced he was their brother and business manager. He offered them both to me for less than the price of the zoo's entry ticket. I looked down at the gap-toothed girls and headed for the reptile house instead. Not content that I had refused his very generous offer, he raced after me and decided that I could have them both for free if I bought him a Coke. A while later I found him picking up cigarette butts, repackaging them in discarded packs and trying to sell them back to tourists.

Many capitalists such as he roam the streets looking for a deal and one gets the impression that if their methods could be a little refined they might be a very successful nation.


The war with America, though, still hangs heavy on the city's mind.

The authorities have only recently started clearing up the carnage left by the war and, near the village of Cu Chi, scores of wrecked helicopter gunships and jet fighters still lie mangled on the side of the highway.

Cu Chi, scene of one of the world's greatest aerial bombardments, is haunted by rolling hills, as far as the eye can see, covered with the white graves of their civilian victims. The defoliant Agent Orange was used in vast quantities in this area because the Vietcong tunnels burrowed under Saigon from here. It is a treeless and grassless moonscape and will probably remain that way for ever because of the dioxins in the ecosystem.

You can be escorted down the tunnels by an old hunchback Vietcong



colonel who gives you an AK47 to carry for authenticity. He lived in the tunnels for 10 years and has many tales of the GI tunnel rats and B-52 carpet bombing.

During the war there were more kilometres of Vietcong tunnels than in the entire London underground system. Each of the multilayered levels were gas and waterproof and had fully functional kitchens, hospitals and, in one case, a theatre. So audacious were their builders that many of them actually burrowed under US air bases on their way into Saigon.

In frustration, the Americans laid thousands of minefields and then forgot to make maps of them. This situation yielded an appalling number of amputees who one moment had been peacefully farming in the delta and the next, blown to smithereens. You are warned very strenuously not to stray from the paths.

In the foyer of The American War Crimes and Misdemeanours Museum, on Vo Van Tan Street, is a sinister reminder of the war: a bell jar containing the fetus of a Cu Chi baby – allegedly the victim of Agent Orange poisoning. On closer inspection the fetus has two pairs of arms and legs. The museum has a prodigious number of interesting torture devices and weaponry.

Later, in the roof bar at The Rex, I heard what turned out to be a fairly typical tale. Nam Troc Llong, now a USA citizen, had left Saigon on a boat made of oil drums and had managed to get to Indonesia. He hadn't seen his family since 1976 and on arriving at their slum dwelling in Cholon - a Chinese suburb of golden pagodas and urban influx - he opted instead for the colonial splendour of The Rex. Wearing an expensive suit and sipping a margarita, he confessed to being confused and a bit embarrassed by his family. Used to Western comforts, he could not understand their culture or their poverty any more and had decided to bring forward his departure date to return to the Big Apple. Judging by numerous similar conversations with the former boat people, I suspected that many of them would be with me on the return flight.

Nam Troc Llong told me the USA veteran I had sat next to on the plane had been thrown out of the country by the secret police for smashing up a bar in a fit of rage. He had been getting nowhere in his attempts to break into the restricted areas where the 3 500 missing GIs are allegedly kept.

It is doubtful whether there is a country that has endured as much hardship as Vietnam has this century, but the economy is now booming and tourists are filling the new hotels.

Cars are replacing the ubiquitous bicycle and tourists have heard about the islands and the kilometres of beaches along the coast.

Thailand started a massive Southeast Asia craze and Vietnam has captured the overspill from its more established neighbour, though through a degree of notoriety.

I wanted to see what had become of the city that produced those emotional pictures of Saigon in flames as the US ambassador took off in his helicopter from the embassy roof with a desperate man clinging to its undercarriage. The answer lay in a man I met in Ben Thanh market. With his Mahican haircut, and punk-style Union Jack outfit for which he was far too large, he proved that the city has advanced - if only by 10 years because he steadfastly believed he would one day join his fellow punks on the Kings Road in Chelsea. I did not have the heart to tell him the last punk disappeared from Chelsea in about 1985. He didn't have time to tell me his name because all he wanted to talk about was Chelsea Football Club.

I'm not sure if 'Uncle Ho', whose image stares down from every statue and street poster, would approve of his new people. The southerners favour a return to the original name of Saigon and would like to dump Ho's name on Hanoi, 2 000 kilometres to the north, where his doctrine is still alive and well.

I quite wanted to cry myself when I left the country, but Vietnam Airways gives you plenty of other things to worry about.



The Ascent (21.00, 05.50) is the story of Italian prisoners of war in Africa during WWII who escape from a British prison camp and must climb Mount Kenya. For most of them it is a matter of national honour, but for one prisoner it is a case of personal rivalry with the camp commander over the woman they both love.



If you enjoyed the first City Slickers, Part II: The Legend of Curly's Gold (16.00) will delight you just as much. Billy Crystal, Jack Palance and Daniel Stern will have you rolling in your seat as they venture from the city in search of lost treasure.

World-renowned physicist Stephen Hawking (right) brought out a book dealing with the beginning of the cosmos, black holes, real and imaginary time and the big-bang theory of creation. And it became an unexpected best seller. In making a film of the book, *A Brief History of Time* (NNTV, 16.00), director Errol Morris has intertwined Hawking's theories with the physicist's own remarkable story, told by friends, family and eminent scientific peers. Hawking is Luccasian Professor of Mathematics at Cambridge University, a post once held by Newton, and he has pioneered a whole field of quantum cosmology. A far cry from the brilliant but bored Oxford student he was before being struck down with motor neuron disease and given two and a half years to live. Hawking, who recently celebrated his 50th birthday, is completely wheelchair-bound and speaks through a computer-linked voice synthesiser.

Look out for *Schindler's List* later this month. In the mean time the documentary, *Schindler* (M-Net, 22.00) will tell more about the real life hero who saved more than a thousand Jews from Hitler's death camps.



Jack Benny (left) and Carole Lombard are brilliant in *To Be or Not to Be* (NNTV, 23.30). This hysterical satire is an anti-Nazi film by Ernest Lubitsch about a theatre couple who manage to outwit the Nazis. Lombard was killed in a plane crash two weeks after completing the film, but her superb performance makes this a memorable finale to her screen career.





When you look at all 52 cards, the play or defence of a hand is easy. Unfortunately, you may look legally only at the 13 cards that are dealt to you. With the sight of dummy that total increases to 26 - still a long way off 52.

achieve is to visualise all the other cards by making assumptions from bids or plays that have occurred. Bridge is not an exact science, but making educated guesses is preferable to hoping to be lucky. How would you play the following hand after you and your partner have bid 1NT-3NT, and the opening lead is the 2♣?

Basically the hand revolves around finding the Q. You have five tricks in the other suits and no more - it's unlikely you can score an extra trick from the club suit after they have been led. So before you read on, decide whether you think East or West is more likely to have that vital card.

Superficially, players may think that East is more likely to have length in diamonds, since West chose a club lead, indicating length in that suit, and, therefore, East is short in that suit, leaving more spaces in his hand for diamond cards.

It is true that the player who holds the most diamonds is more likely to hold the queen and that is, therefore, the area on which we must concentrate. To find this out we must, on the scant evidence presented, try to build up a picture of the opposition hands. To do this let me pose a question. If you were on lead against an auction that had gone 1NT-3NT as was the case here, which suit would you choose to lead? If you are a thinking bridge player, your answer should be a major suit. The fact that the dummy did not investigate playing in a major suit game means that dummy will not appear with length in hearts or spades. Therefore, if you had two suits of equal length to lead from - a major and a minor - you would probably choose the major suit.

West leads the K◆, and continues a diamond to his partner's ace. At this point East returns a low spade. Do you go up with the King or try to run it round to the jack?

This hand requires a slightly different form of visualisation. On the previous hand we were trying to assess the shape of the defenders' hands. Here we concentrate on the points.

Even if we guess the spade position correctly in order to achieve our game we must still find the heart finesse right. So in making that assumption West must hold the K. We already know that West has got the KQ of diamonds, and therefore if he held the A& as well, he would have at least 12 points on which he would have opened the bidding. Therefore, to give yourself a genuine chance to make your contract, you must play East for the A♠, and rise with the K♠ - and pray! O



I did not want to leave and it was the first time that I really felt I could not spend the rest of my life in London or in America as I had planned. I really wanted to be here. I did not want to be responsible for dividing our family the way I saw other South

African families being divided – with children dispersed all over the world. They were living the kind of life I was, which was wonderful in my 20s, but effectively they had destroyed the family unit. Victoria's birth crystallised the future of our family.

I was 28 at the time and working towards the next decade of my life. Victoria was the new generation of our family and I felt very strongly that if at all possible I wanted to come back here. I could have continued to live abroad and would have been perfectly content to do so, but what really matters to me is my family and my friends. For me that was a turning point. I wanted to come back to South Africa and put something back into the family – to see if we could go against the odds and create a continuity in this country where we all belong. I want to be here. I want us to all be together. I am happy to be home!


