DEAR SECRETARY,

The success of our previous newsletter last November prompts us to repeat the experiment now this Easter term is drawing to a close. The very hot summer days are over: there were many above 100 degrees this year; cricket is finished; the boys are practising athletics, and football is not far ahead.

The year opened with a record number of pupils. In fact it was rather fortunate that the boys on the overseas tour were late in returning; we had room and time to adjust ourselves. It may also be stated that we welcomed a record number of new teachers: A. F. G. Cotton, of Michael-house and Rhodes; Hubert R. Moore, of Kingswood, Bath and Oxford; Edger Turner, an O.K. of Stellenbosch and London; P. A. Kamfer, of Stellenbosch and Rhodes; K. C. Starck, of Muir and Rhodes, and Miss Pam Slater, of the Grahamstown Training College.

During the vacation School House common room and No. 1 dormitory were completely reconditioned; this is a vast improvement, and it is hoped that similar developments will shortly be seen in the other parts of the building. The most important innovation, however, was the full use of the new block. The bottom floor with its improved shower-baths, lavatories, changing-rooms, lockers and staff-quarters; the second floor with its modern class-rooms, and the top floor with its emergency accommodation for Intermediate House have all proved invaluable. We already wonder how we managed without them.

The boys all returned safely from their two months' overseas holiday, without even a broken bone to show for their skiing. Arriving in London, with their headquarters at Mostyn Hotel, Portman Square, they experienced the joys of London's theatres, Operas and ice-shows, and visited many of the famous show-places, with visits out to Eton College, Windsor Castle and Hampton Court. Crossing to the Continent they spent two days in Holland in the vicinity of Amsterdam, and three in the Rhineland. Then came their most thrilling experience of the winter sports at Melchsee Prutt, about 6,000 feet above Lucerne in Switzerland. They returned to England through France with two days at Kingswood, Bath. Messrs. C. B. Dacum and Stewart Thompson are to be congratulated on their successful organisation and control. This year a small party from Kearsney College accompanied our boys.

With victories over St. Aidan's, Grey, St. Andrew's and Graeme Colleges our first cricket team has been outstanding in school matches. It has not depended on one or two players, but has been a real team down to No. 9, the last two places still being undecided. Schuddin, Purdon, the

Huddy brothers, Crole and Wellington have all made many runs, and Wellington, Crole, Purdon and M. Huddy have taken most of the wickets. The fielding and catching have been first-class. It is significant to note that their scoring has been done at the rate of about 79 runs per hour, as against about 40 per hour by their opponents.

Our rowing section advanced a step further this term by entering the regattas at East London and Kingwilliamstown. Our first crew is rapidly approaching proficiency, and in the second meeting on the Lang Dam was well up with the leaders. Mr. Troward, too, has devoted a great deal of time to the shooting, and he had the satisfaction of seeing his teams doing very well in the recent national shooting competitions.

Swimming and diving, though keen enough, would doubtless further improve with the provision of a new swimming-bath. We are fortunate, it is true, in possessing an unfailing water supply and a splendid filtration plant, but for competitive swimming and diving we really require standard dimensions. In the local gala we came second to St. Andrew's, while the juniors came first in their section.

Foundation Day saw a large number of O.K.s rally to the school in spite of the rival attractions of the Port Elizabeth Agricultural Show and the Port Alfred cricket week. Religious services, meetings, dinners, luncheons and the Church Parade all revived old memories as usual for most of us (but we must remember that for about eighty of our newcomers these celebrations are entirely new, and the impression made by them is perhaps indelible. This year the O.K.s managed to beat the School cricket teams, but one had the feeling that they would not succeed again. The Headmaster has attended Foundation Day celebrations of the Midlands Branch at Bedford and also in Johannesburg and is due at East London at the end of the month. He reports most encouraging keenness and a real interest in the progress of the School everywhere.

Now we are getting ready for the Easter Athletic meeting. Our boys already have had a trial run at the Inter-School competitions at Port Elizabeth, where they won the Schauder Cup for the Under 19 events.

I find I have said nothing about the examinations and the School work; I am afraid we take them for granted. The University examinations were on the whole satisfactory; the Matriculation results were disappointing in some instances, but the Junior Certificate successes exceeded our expectations. Our University students scored many noteworthy successes in the final degree exams.

I think this letter will indicate that the School is going ahead, but is virile in all its aspects. There are still big plans envisaged and developments afoot. We hope to keep you fully informed term by term.

KINGSWOOD BROADCAST â\200\224 CAPT. C. O. RICHâ\200\231S SCRIPT
16th April, 1958

Kingswood, of course, is a Methodist school. The Methodists from earliest times fostered education for all races. The original Kingswood School in England was founded by John Wesley himself in 1748, and all over England, long before the days of popular education, Methodist preachers established primary schools.

When the 1820 British Settlers arrived in South Africa their ministers were instructed to organise teaching for the childrenâ\200\224day-schools as well as Sunday-schools. And in 1861 the Grahamstown Methodists, possibly stimulated by the establishment of St. Andrewâ\200\231s College six years earlier, decided to found a Boarding-school in their own city. The Rev. William Shaw, who had started Salem Academy in 1822, was entrusted with the task of organising the School, and of selecting the staff. He appointed Mr. Peter Macowan, the second master of Huddersfield College, as Principal, and Mr. Theo Schreiner, brother of Olive Schreiner, the novelist, as second master. This school, known as Shaw College, which was opened in 1862, unfortunately only survived for a few years. The severe commercial depression which swept South Africa in the â\200\231sixties forced it to close. Nearly thirty years were to elapse before a permanent Methodist Boarding-school was to be established. The Rev. William Shaw did not live to see this accomplished, but his name will always be honoured as the pioneer of Methodist schools in this country. His two schools, Salem Academy and Shaw College, were the predecessors of Kingswood.

The history of Kingswood really begins with the arrival of Mr. E. G. Gane in 1894, and with his subsequent thirty-four years of Head-ship. Much has been written of this remarkable man, but here it is sufficient to state that he created and consolidated the recognised traditions of the School, which still survive.

His successor, Mr. H. T. Crouch, brought new life and vigour into every feature of the School and safely carried it through a severe crisis in the â\200\230thirties, which threatened the fate of Shaw College seventy years before. So well did Gane and Crouch lay the foundations that Kingswood has never been in serious difficulties since; it has gone steadily ahead and developed in every direction.

The present Head-Master, Mr. J. T. Slater, is a grand-son of one of the original sponsors of Kingswood. He was himself a pupil of the School before going to University, and gaining Springbok Honours at Rugby as a wing-three-quarter. Mr. Slater is still the senior Afrikaans master. He will briefly tell you what he considers Kingswood stands for; how it differs from other schools; how it justifies its existence, since people are

asking today what useful purpose private schools serve in a country like our own.

KINGSWOOD BROADCAST â\200\224 HEADMASTERâ\200\231S SCRIPT
16th April, 1958

As you heard Capt. Rich say previously, the main foundation was laid by Gane and Crouch and the School has never been in serious straits since. With courage and resource the next Headmaster, Mr. R. I. Redfern of Kingswood, Bath, steered it through the difficult years and handed over the reins to Capt. C. O. Rich, whose vision and sagacity firmly consolidated the Schoolâ\200\231s future.

This Kingswood, then, moulded by these men and many other dedicated masters of humbler status, most of whom were happy to give all they could, and to count the giving more important than the cost, is bound to have a spirit of its own. This is evident, even to a casual observer, in the staffâ\200\224as well as the class-room, on the playing fields or among the Old Boys.

It is noteworthy, too. how many teachers and headmaster it has producedâ\200\224among others: Dr. H. Q. Davies of Queenâ\200\231s College, W. G. A. Mears of St. Stithians and S. G. Osler of Kearnsey, and some dozen others, and eight of the present staff are Old Kingswoodians.

Academically, it is noted for the well-balanced and liberal education it provides, but in this respectâ\200\224as in sport, the cadet corps and its various clubs and societiesâ\200\224it does not differ greatly from any of the other well-established schools.

One characteristic, at once its pride and strength, stems from the ideals of its founders; its portals are open to lads of every creed and from every part of Southern Africa and beyond. With nearly 400 boarders accommodated in various Houses, living together for three months at a time and learning to give and take, to lead and to follow, to win and to lose, it will be realized how much more a laboratory of human relations such a school can be than others that do not enjoy these special opportunities to stress in simple, but very real ways, what I must term, for lack of a more helpful phrase, â\200\234the things of the spiritâ\200\235.

Most of us have realised, I fancy, that education must bestir itself to keep abreast of modern scientific progress not only in respect of the technical â\200\234know howâ\200\235 but with regard to the new human stresses and tensions that must inevitably result. The African panorama today can leave us in little doubt that change is in the airâ\200\224and much readjustment will be necessary.

Though Gane of Kingswoodâ\200\231s dictum of equal development of the physique, the intellect and the spirit has always been the guiding principle in our training here, I am persuaded that in the fields of thinking and feeling, particularly the latter, schools like this have an increasingly interesting and urgent role to play, as educational research laboratories, where may be more fully uncovered and more scientifically applied than hitherto has been deemed necessary,â\200\224a technique that will split and break down not the atom, but some at any rate of our little prides and prejudices that seem to sabotage, often unwittingly, even genuine attempts at co-operation, and so in time, maybe, to enable â\200\234Eendragâ\200\235 to make

real â\200\230â\200\234 Magâ\200\235. Who can venture to assess the volume of spiritual power that would be released?

SPEECH BY R. A. BORDERâ\200\224FOUNDATION DAY SERVICE
14th March, 1958

When your Headmaster asked me to say a few words to you on this happy occasion, the celebration of another Kingswood Anniversary, it occurred to me immediately that some of you listening to me would some day stand where I am standing and address a gathering of Kingswoodians on Foundation Day. And it is possible, although you may not think so now, that you will on that distant occasion, express the same sentiments and voice the same hopes that I shall shortly endeavour to convey to you.

The point of this is that in a changing world you will expect of the then generation of Kingswoodians what those of my generation expect of you. The basic principles of living which the Founders of Kingswood College wished to instil in the youth of 1894 have not changed in 1958 and will not have changed in 1998 when you are old men. Because if they did change the idea and the spirit that is Kingswood will have died and there will be occasion to celebrate Foundation Day.

It is almost 42 years since I first entered the gates of Kingswood and walked up through this garden to the front door early one morning. It was the middle of term, some childish illness having prevented my coming in the beginning of term as was intended. And as I walked up this path with the friends who had met me at the station I saw a sturdy, red-cheeked, pyjama-clad figure standing in the window of the first dormitory. My friend said, â\200\234That is Jack Slaterâ\200\235.

I have never forgotten that first sight of your Headmaster. To me, he doesnâ\200\231t seem to have changed much since then. And believe me when he stands up at a meeting of the Kingswood Councilâ\200\224as he has to do from time to time to give an account of his stewardshipâ\200\224he does so with the same audacious attitude and the same twinkle in his eye as he did to those in authority in those days. I can only conclude that because we knew each other then he has honoured me with the invitation to address you, and I assure you that I deeply appreciate the honour.

It is interesting to speculate on the sort of world which will exist in 30/40 yearsâ\200\231 time when it is your turn to stand here and speak to Kingswood. A number of you have recently returned from a tour of Europe. On that occasion in the dim future when you talk to the boys here, a number of them will but recently have returned from a tour of the moon. The current fashion of facetious farewell â\200\234See you soonâ\200\224on the Moonâ\200\235 will no longer be funny.

It will be a commonplace expression of fact.

There have certainly been changes in the world in the past 40 years (there was, for example, no electricity in Grahamstown in my day) but nothing approaching the tremendous changes that will occur in the next 40 years. In this rapidly changing world that lies before you, you will require all the spiritual aids you can cling to if you are to keep a balanced outlook. I suggest that what you gather to yourself during your stay at Kingswood the annealing of your character that takes place in your close association with so many other decent fellows will be of inestimable value to you.

Even though you never visit Grahamstown again, the fact that you are an Old Kingswoodian will serve as a standard to which to measure up your conduct in all circumstances of stress and temptation. In its 64 years of existence Kingswood has stood for something fine and my appeal to you is to preserve that indefinable something for the great benefit of those who follow

you.

There are two subjects which I propose to deal with briefly. The first is
â\200\234What is wrong with the Youth of Today?â\200\235 and the second is â\200\234The
Old School
sini etc.

The Headmaster in introducing me has told you something of my work. In the position which I have held for the past 15 years it has been my lot, as part of my duty, to listen to other people's troubles. In all the very many interviews over all these years I can remember hardly an instance when anyone in speaking of the youth of the day has sung youth's praises.

On the contrary, whether the interviewer has been a farmer or a doctor, an educationist or a butcher, a garage proprietor or a lawyer or even a banker, the complaints have been unvaried, 'The young people of today have no sense of responsibility'. 'All that youth of today can think of is having a good time.' 'You can't get anyone to do an honest day's work.' 'All the young people want is lots of pay and little work.' The actual words used may change from time to time, the burden of the theme remains the same.

You probably know the story of the complaint made that 'Punch is not as good as it used to be', and the answer by Punch, 'No, it never was.'

Kingswoodians, I don't believe a word of it! Although standards of attainment vary from year to year, I believe you fellows play better Rugby than we did, you play better cricket, you're better at Athletics. I think you have a wider grasp of knowledge than we did. I'm sure your characters are no less stable. Your task is certainly more difficult because Society is more complex, but we older ones forget so quickly. Forget how well we deserved the six of the best that so often came our way. We expect so much of you we don't remember how often we failed. In my own calling there are young men and women of 20 who do the work previously performed by men of over 30, and do it well. My appeal to you is not to be misled by talk of this nature. Have faith in yourselves. Show that you can do better than we did at school and that you can make of life something saner and more stable than we did. I have a great admiration for the youth of today. I think they're fine.

As for my second subject. It is a habit to sneer at 'The Old School Tie'.

Don't let anyone fool you into doing the same thing. Not everyone is privileged to come to Kingswood and let it not be held against them. But that privilege has been yours and by honouring The Old School Tie you will be anxious to maintain the traditions of Kingswood and you will conduct yourselves in a seemly manner.

Speaking as an Old Kingswoodian, what do we expect of you? Of course, we're happy when you do well at sport, we are jubilant when you beat St. Andrew's at Rugby, we smile when your examination results are good. But all these things do not mean so much to us as that you should turn out to be men of character and of good repute. Speaking to Mr. Slater the other day I said I had recently met an O.K. and that he seemed such a decent chap. His reply was all Old Kingswoodians are decent chaps.

We expect you to balance the scale against Ducktails and the like, the sort of people who also existed in our day but who received less publicity. We expect you to produce leaders of men, we expect you to be good citizens of the world and to have the moral courage to lift the standards of the people about you.

So my message to you on the 14th March, 1958, is: Keep the faith which Kingswood teaches, have faith in yourselves and honour The Old School Tie. If you do that the generation that follows you will be better men than you are and when it comes to your turn to address a Kingswood gathering on the

14th March, 1998, you will be able to say, as I say to you now, 'We are proud of you.'

At the end of 1957 we said goodbye to all our Senior Matrics. and to 12 other valuable members of the House, including such sporting stalwarts as â\200\234Jitâ\200\235 Meyer, Chris Krog and Charlie Krog. Congratulations are due to Chris Vandoros, 1957 House Captain, for being awarded the Ayliff Memorial Prize as the outstanding boy of the year; to Douglas Kroon for having achieved a first class pass in Matric., and to Nick Frantsis for the most artistic decorations we have yet seen at the Leaving Dance.

Towards the end of term the farewell party was held and on this occasion the Walsh Cup for Good Fellowship was awarded for the first time. It was won by J. Bannister on the vote of all members of the House.

THIRD KINGSWOOD OVERSEAS TOUR

During the Christmas holidays of 1957 the Third Kingswood Overseas Tour embarked on a ten-week tour of England and Europe. The tourists numbered 32, which included three members of staff and eight boys from our brother school Kearsney College, Natal.

We boarded the Cape Town Castle on the 13th December, and I cannot describe how we felt after such a long period of organisation when we heard the 4 o'clock bell which announced our departure. After watching Table Mountain fade into the distance, we all settled down to what proved to be a very enjoyable voyage.

The crowd on board included about 70 N.U.S.A.S. students, and we soon made friends with everyone. We fell into the ship's way of life, and enjoyed the voyage even more when we found our sea legs after a day or two. One or two boys did not agree with the Cape Rollers, but we soon left them behind and were blessed with wonderful weather for a further ten days.

Most of us entered the deck tournaments, but unfortunately we were not too good and were knocked out in the early rounds. I think that the person who furthest was Mr. Thompson, who got through to the semi-finals in the table tennis.

By this time we were about a week out of Cape Town and nearing the equator. We found the tropics very hot, and if any of us was looking for a friend he was nearly always to be found in or around the swimming pool.

On the day that we crossed the equator a party was taken down into the engine room by the Chief Engineer and found it very interesting. They were, however, very pleased when it was over, because the temperature down below was in the region of 120 degrees F. That evening, due to the heat, it was most uncomfortable in the cabins, and this resulted in about 80 per cent. of the younger people sleeping on deck, only to be awakened at 3.30 a.m., when the decks were washed.

On the 23rd we stopped at Madeira for five hours, and most of us went ashore and had a look around the island. Some of us went on the various tour excursions, which were enjoyed. We left Madeira at 7 p.m.

On the 27th December our voyage ended, when we docked at Southampton at 6 a.m. We disembarked at 7.30 and by nine we were on our way to London by boat train. We arrived at Waterloo Station at 12 noon, after which we had a glimpse of London whilst travelling by bus to our hotel in the West End. We stayed at the Mostyn Hotel, Portman Square, near The Marble Arch.

That afternoon Mr. Thompson took us to the Underground and showed us how to use it and how to find our own way back to the hotel. He thought that he was getting on quite well until he realised that he had lost half of the party for a short while.

The next four days in London consisted of organised coach tours. We were introduced to our guide, Freddy, who showed the First Tour around London in 1953.

Included in what we saw were a detailed tour of the West End, which included Whitehall, Westminster Abbey, the Houses of Parliament and Buckingham Palace; another all-day tour consisted of a visit to Hampton Court Palace, Windsor Castle and Eton College. We also went to Greenwich, where we saw the Cutty Sark, the Tower of London and the famous Crown Jewels and the Victoria and Albert Museums. We also went to Madame Tussaud's Wax Works.

We went to the theatre every evening, and the shows included Arthur Askey in Robinson Crusoe, The Follies and Opera at the Covent Garden Opera House. After the latter performance we went to Piccadilly Circus, where we cheered the New Year in.

On New Year's Day, we were taken to see the changing of the guard at St. James's Palace and were free until 6 p.m., when we packed our bags and left for the Continent.

After a fairly rough crossing from Harwich to the Hook of Holland, we arrived at Rotterdam in time for our first Continental breakfast. We were told all the way through Europe that the hotels did not cater for hungry South Africa school boys at breakfast, so we had to be content with our bread rolls and coffee for a further three weeks.

We were taken on an all-day coach tour of Holland with stops at Gouda, The Hague, Haarlem and Amsterdam, where we stopped for lunch. We then went to a small village Muidersloot-on-Zee where we stopped for an hour to do bits of skepping. About half of the boys came back with Philishavers. We got back to our hotel at 6.30, and after dinner we were taken to see the world-famous musician, Kalanaq. The show was once again enjoyed by all.

Our next step was to leave for Cologne in West Germany. We left Holland on the 3rd, and after a train journey arrived at Cologne at 3.30. We found the Continental train very comfortable. Whilst in Cologne Mr. Dacam told us that this would be a very good opportunity of buying photographic equipment, so about ten boys bought cameras here.

Unfortunately we were in Cologne over the week-end, and we were unable to have a look at any of the major iron and steel firms. We were taken to the Town Hall, under which, exposed as a result of bombing during the war, stands a Roman Mosaic and the remnants of a Roman village. In some places one can still see the remains of the Roman wall which surrounded the

old town. We went to the New Opera House, where we saw the opera
â\200\234Carmenâ\200\235. The Opera House itself has just been opened and is really a magnificent building which cost Â£4 million to build.

On the Sunday afternoon we were taken by coach to Bonn, the State Capital of West Germany. We were supposed to go into the Parliament House, but unfortunately it was the Presidentâ\200\231s birthday and it could not be arranged. We went up the Drakenstein by funicular railway, at the top of which we had an excellent view of the Rhine Valley and Bonn. That evening we once again packed our bags, and at 11.30 p.m. left by train for Switzerland.

The next morning we arrived at Basel at 7.30, where we went through Customs and changed trains. We arrived at Sarnen at about 11, and it was at this town that we saw our first snow. From here we went by bus to Stockalp. This trip will be long remembered by most of the boys by the musical sound of the bus hooter. Before getting into the cable car, which was to take us up a further 3,000 feet, we proceeded to have a glorious snow-fight. Everyone was shocked, but as soon as Rosenthal, the only one amongst use who could speak German, explained why, they all thought that it was a great joke.

We arrived at our hotels at 1 p.m., just in time for lunch. That afternoon we tried on our ski-boots and played around in the snow. We came in frozen and were very relieved when we found out that Mr. Dacam had ordered hot chocolate for us.

On the following day we were introduced to our ski-instructors, who proved to be very able men. The first three days went quite well, but unfortunately the weather was very cold and windy.

After that the weather cleared up and we were able to enjoy ourselves even more. We soon learned how to do the various turns and manoeuvres, although I must remark that when Shirlaw was behind you, you had to get out of the way very quickly, otherwise he collided with you, because his breaks were not too good. When he wanted to stop he just sat down.

We had two lessons daily. In the morning we usually went up the ski-lift, and in the afternoon we went down to Stockalp, which was a run of five miles. It took us roughly threequarters-of-an-hour.

On the last day 20 of the boys took the first ski-ing test and they all managed to pass quite easily, with Wal Cawood coming first.

On the day that we left the cable car was officially opened, and we were lucky enough to see the Swiss in their national costumes. As things usually go wrong at a very crucial point, one of the cars jumped off its runners and took an hour to be fixed. This resulted in Mr. Dacam and six boys with all the luggage being left dangling in mid-air for the hour. I must admit, howexer, that it was lovely weather and the scenery was very beautiful. Luckily, Mr. Dacam had allowed extra time for such emergencies, and nothing drastic happened.

I think that this part of the tour was the part which was most enjoyed and it was with great regret that we had to say â\200\234Aufwiedsshnâ\200\235 to Switzerland.

We left Lucerne on Monday 14th and proceeded to Paris and arrived there on the 15th at 7 a.m. Our time there was limited to one and a half days, which included an afternoon at Versailles, a tour of the Louvre, the Arc de Triomphe, the War Memorial where we saw the grave of Napoleon, the Opera House, and about two hours at Notre Dame. In the evening we went to the Mogodor Theatre to see Tino Rossi. We were unfortunately unable to under-

stand the dialogue but enjoyed the singing and changes of scenes very much.

The next morning we left for Dieppe for a rough crossing back to England. We left Dieppe at 12.45, had lunch on board and arrived at Newhaven at 3.30 p.m. where once again we cleared Customs and went to London by train, arriving back at the Mostyn Hotel at 6.30 We were pleased to get back to London but sorry to leave the Continent.

We were given Sunday free, and on Monday said farewell to Mr. Thompson, who flew back to South Africa. After that we went to Kingswood, our Mother School in Bath. We arrived there at about 3 oâ\200\231clock and then split

up into groups of fives and sixes and were taken around the old school. The school itself has very old buildings and is situated on the top of a hill. It has very fine playing fields and is wonderfully equipped.

After a very welcomed tea about 20 of our boys split up into teams of three, and played basketball. They were, however, much too good (and fit) for us and beat us by quite a substantial margin. We were supposed to have played hockey against them, but it was snowing and the fields were unplayable. After talking to a few of the boys in the Prefects' Room, we once again split up into our groups and went to chat with the Housemasters. At about 10 p.m. those of us who were not staying at the school went down to our hotel. The remainder, about 20, slept in the school sanatorium. The latter attended chanel in the morning.

Mr. Dacam then took us around the Roman Baths and we all had a cup of coffee in the 'Pump Room', some of whose furniture is Chippendale (we were previously warned not to sit down too hard!) Some of the boys also had a tumbler of the spring water.

We left Bath at 11.30 and arrived back in London at 4.30. The remainder of the afternoon was free, and in the evening we went to see the Crazy Gang in 'These Foolish Kings' at Victoria Palace.

We were given Wednesday free to do what shopping was necessary and also to have very necessary haircuts. In the evening we did our last theatre when we saw 'Sailors Beware'. On Thursday we made our final move to Southampton, where we arrived at 11.30.

We boarded the Pretoria Castle at 12.15 and sailed at 4 o'clock. We sailed right into a fog which kept us stationary for four hours. At 9.30 we carried on and three days later called at Las Palmas.

Some of us went on a tour of the island and we sailed again at 1 p.m. The voyage out again proved to be very enjoyable and the weather was good all the way. The only prize won in the competitions was for chess by Mr. Dacam.

The evening before we docked at Cape Town, Kingswood were the guests of Kearsney for a small party, a gesture much appreciated by the Kingswood group.

We docked at Cape Town early on the Sth and had a day to ourselves, sailing the following morning at 10 o'clock for Port Elizabeth. The bus trip up from Port Elizabeth was completed, like all our other trips, strictly to programme.

In every respect, I think that the tour was a great success, and I would like to take this opportunity of wishing those who will be lucky enough to go the next trip in December, 1959, 'Bon Voyage'.

Although several games were lost against adult sides, an unusual occurrence, all four matches with Eastern Province Schoolsâ\200\224Graeme, Grey, St. Aidanâ\200\231s and St. Andrewâ\200\231sâ\200\224our most important games, we re won by fairly large margins. Perhaps some Old Kingswoodians of pre-war days can tell us when last this happened.

The strength of the side has lain chiefly in the desire of the middle batsmen to attack the bowling. A sound start has been given pretty consistently by opening batsmen Schuddinh and Wellington, and M. Huddy, N. Purdon and C. Huddy have capitalised on this with forceful batting at Nos. 3, 4:and 5. Whitehead and Crole have occasionally weighed in with useful contributions further down the list, but there are still one or two places going begging for anyone who can field well and not make a complete ass of himself with the bat. I say this because our fielding, especially our catching, leaves much to be desired. We have dropped as many as six catches in an innings, a state of affairs which must be rectified.

A steady attack which, with good catching, would become penetra- tive, has been spearheaded by Arthur Wellington, who has been ably sup- ported by â\200\234Chuckerâ\200\235 Crole, N. Purdon and M. Huddy. J. Canepa, of whom so much was hoped this season, has not yet come to light, but I feel sure that the third term will see him taking wickets for the Ist XI once more.

The captaincy of M. Huddy has been outstanding. He has shown a keen appreciation of changes in field placing for different batsmenâ\200\224some- thing all too rare in schoolboy skippersâ\200\224and has infused the spirit of attack into his side. The success of this policy is seen when one con- sideres the rate of run-getting in Kingswoodâ\200\231s four matches against our chief rivalsâ\200\224the Eastern Province Schools.

In these games Kingswood scored 618 run in 466 minutes, a rate of 79.1 runs per hour. Our opponents scored 440 runs in 648 minutes, a rate of 40.7 runs per hour. 79.1 is almost exactly double 40.7, which amply bears out Mr. Tom Hartzenbergâ\200\231s dictum in Staff matches that, â\200\234Pussyfooting doesnâ\200\231t pay!â\200\235

If only our batsmen will learn to hit straight and with their heads down, I foresee an even brighter season in the third term.

captain, who has spent much of his time helping with the organisation of the game here.

Mr. Cotton, who has most efficiently taken over the bulk of the administration of cricket, wishes to record his appreciation of the work done by A. C. Wellington and A. Peterkin in connection with teas and transport.

A great boost has been given to school cricket in Grahamstown by Peter Mansfield (O.K.) and his most efficient band of umpires. I am sure that every single member of the 1st XI wholeheartedly joins me in voicing our very sincere appreciation of the efforts of the Grahamstown Cricket Umpires' Association on our behalf.

And last, but not least, a big thank you goes to Mesdames Slater and Reid for the very appetising teas they have laid on for us in the library this term.

The 1958 season opened auspiciously for Kingswood when we managed to bring back the Schauder Cup from the E.P. Inter-Schools for the first time since 1948. Some 42 schools, of which 27 were High Schools (including Grey) took part, and so the competition was keen and the team did splendidly. R. Dewberry electrified the Kingswood supporters with a splendid win in the U19 Mile. Taking the lead, he cracked on the pace and won, going away in the very useful time of 4mins. 42.8secs.

Neil Whitehead is a very competent hurdler and ran out winner of the 100 yards Hurdles in 14.5 without being extended. The results will show that in the other divisions there is some talent as well. Certainly in Stephen van Niekerk we have a U13 who is a natural athlete and who will be a force to be reckoned with as the years roll by.

100 Yards: L. Robey ran a magnificent 100 in the heat, despite a groin injury, to register 10.6 and a first place. This effort did not improve the injury and he was unplaced in the final in 11.2secs.

220 Yards: Owing to Robeyâ\200\231s and v. Rensburgâ\200\231s injury, Wood was called upon to do more than was originally expected of him. He gave of his best and his time in the 100 U19 is above. His 220 time set a new record of 23.5. Remembering he is only U16 it shows much promise. In the afternoon the races he had already run and won together with the Long Jump found him too tired to press home the ascendancy

he established in the heats, and he was unplaced.

440 Yards: A. Moore. Inexperience caused him to do what many an experienced man has sometimes done, i.e. cover the first 220 too fast and so he could not maintain his original running and was unplaced in 59secs.
