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LETTER TO ALL PARTICIPATING EMPLOYER GROUPS
OF THE PRO SANO MEDICAL AID SCHEME
The Chairman of the Pro Sano Medical Aid Scheme was presented with a letter from the Unio
n of Teachefs
Associations of South Africa (UTASA) dated the 10 February 1992. The letter was signed by
Mr J S G
Strauss, in his capacity as Utasals Representative.
In this letter, an allegation was made that the Chairman had instructed that certain paym
ents be made in
respect of the attendance of the Bi-Annual Congress of the International Federation of He
alth Funds held
in Hong Kong during 1990 and that this instruction had not been authorised by the Managem
ent Council. It
was also requested that the matter be tabled at a special meeting of the Management Counc
il.
A Special Meeting was subsequently called at short notice and held on the 13 February 199
2. .
As the Chairman was personally involved in this matter, he vacated the Chair in favour of
 the
Vice-Chairman of the Scheme, Mr L Kearns. A full discussion followed during which all the
 members of the
Management Council, including the Representative from UTASA, were asked to express their
views on the allegation After a protracted discussion, during which all members actively
participated ._
and which lasted for approximately- three hours, the Council concluded that the Chairman
had beyond all
doubt, acted within his powers and according to the decisions made by the Management Coun
cil prior to
1990, which were minuted.
In the light of the evidence submitted, the Council concluded that the allegation was unf
ounded and that
the matter was therefore regarded as closed.
The Council wishes to emphasise that the attendance of Pro Sano delegates at Congresses s
uch as the
International Federation of Health Funds 15 in no manner whatsoever, a holiday. These Con
gresses are
very demanding and delegates have to participate actively 1n discussions and share experi
ences related to
the healthcare movement in other countries with other delegates. Experience is gained by
this exposure
and expertise developed. Study visits to other health funding systems in other countries
is incorporated
with the bi-annual overseas study trips. '
The value to the Pro Sano Medical Aid Scheme of the overseas study trip in 1990, can be s
een in the fact
that the implementation of fundamental changes to address the ever-increasing cost escala
healthcare In the scheme, were the direct outcome of this fact finding mission by the Cou
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Members of the scheme will recall that during 1991, certain changes to the Rules of the S cheme were

implemented and the overall cost containment measures which were introduced and implement ed by the

Council resulted in strikingly positive results.

The Pro Sano Medical Aid Scheme increased its reserves during 1991 by R19.2M to a percent age reserve

level of 16%. Compared to the previous year, which was well below 10% this was a major po sitive trend,

considering that the fund was for the first time in many years reaching the required leve ${\bf l}$ of reserves of

25% as recommended by the Registrar of Medical Aid Schemes.

Because of the success of the cost savings campaign. of the scheme during 1991, the Counc il unlike all

other schemes in South Africa was able to delay mid-year increases to accommodate general cost

escalations and the implementation of Value Added Tax, towards the end of last year. Thes e additional

costs were funded from the surplusses of the scheme.

The Management Council is also very proud that as a result of the success of these cost c ontainment

measures and the resulting surplusses, funds available for investments had increased substantially and

consequently, income from effective investment strategies amounted to R3.18M during 1991. , The outcome was that the overall investments of the Pro Sano Fund increased to R60M during 1991. Pro

Sano therefore prides itself on this achievement under the leadership of the Chairman and with the

dedication of the members serving on the Council.

Any allegation or referral to misconduct against the Management Council is therefore cate gorically

refuted. All expenditures incurred during the overseas programme were duly authorised and minuted as

such in the Management Council records and endorsed by their auditors.

The tremendous time and effort that goes into the attendance of Council meetings very oft en goes

unnoticed. It is a fact that the activity of the Pro Sano Management Council is extremely demanding and

requires on average, in excess of 100 days p.a. of members own time to meet formally and to promote the

interests and the welfare of the scheme for which no honorarium is paid. Only travelling expenses

incurred are met.

Apart, from the Management Council itself, four committees have been formed which special ise in the

various areas and research projects in order to at all times meet the demands of members as

far as possible.

The members of the Pro Sano Management Council therefore continue to sacrifice their own time for the

benefit of all the members of the scheme, which is reflected in the very sound financial position that

the fund finds itself today.

The Pro Sano Council also prides itself on the fact that it has always conducted the busi ness of the

scheme in a very "open-book" fashion and as in the past, a comprehensive annual report was circulated to

all members of the scheme during 1991 reflecting the financial position of the fund at th e end of 1990.

Contained therein were all expenditures as well as the costs incurred for the attendance of the

International Federation of Health Funds, s meeting in Hong Kong.

This matter was also raised and discussed and ratified by the members attending the Annua ${\tt l}$ General

Meeting of the Scheme which was held on the 18 July 1991. In fact, those costs were authorised, minuted

and accepted without qualification by the auditors.

The Pro Sano Medical Aid Scheme is today without doubt, one of the most financially stable funds in the

country with an extremely successful track record. Under the leadership of the Chairman of the Fund,

with the able assistance of the Council members representing various employer groups, Ass ociations" and

members, the Fund has been successfully administered by Medscheme Administrators (Pty) Lt d since its

inception during the 1970s.
