EDITOR'S NOTES.

The editorial "box" seems to be more than usually empty this time, and this first "Chronicle" of a new year must consist almost entirely of school news. Perhaps the tirst object of a "Chronicle" is to fulfil the purpose its name indicates, but we cannot forego the immemorial privilege of a school editor, to growl at the lack of interest and the lack of literary imagination, and the lack, generally speaking, of all those estimable qualities, the possession of which would so lighten the Editor's task and render his office almost a sinecure.

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We wonder whether a kind of eisteddfodic contest with cur friends of other schools could ever call forth the spirit of emulation which our athletic contests evoke. It might be a happy thought, side by side with the Midlands District Cricket Union, to have an inter-School Literary Union, superiority in which might be decided by a number of "events," e.g., the production of the best short story on

a South African subject, or on any subject without limitation, the best essay on a given subject, the best poem, the best collection of photographs, the best description, illustrated by photographs or sketches, of a historic scene such as a battlefield, or of farm-life, or town-life. It should not be difficult to suggest some half-dozen '-events" of this description, which should set brains and hands and eye? to work, and why should not competition be used here just as much as in games? There would seem to be almost

more reason for using it, seeing that we play games readily

enough, but we do not quite so readily sit down to write essays.

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The last number of the "Chronicle" contained a notice and review of Th. Van Beek's volume "Poems and a

Drama/ which had been recently published. We are now

able to cong;atulate Van Beek upon the production of his drama "The Two Kingdoms" at the Standard Theatre, Johannesburg. It was produced b}^ a company of amateurs in aid of the funds of the S.P.O.A., and at the conclusion the author was called before the curtain and afterwards presented to Lord Selborne, who occupied one of the boxes.

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In view of the difficulty which is sometimes felt by boys in appreciating the value of Latin, it is interesting to note that the English Board of Education recently issued a circular upon the teaching of Latin in Secondary Schools, in which they insist upon the fact that "a study of Latin is an essential part of a complete modern education." "A knowledge of the structure of the Latin language," says the circular, "is the most valuable help to understanding the general principles of the European languages, and its regular and formal syntax is a valuable corrective to the loose phrasing which easily arises from the syntactical freedom of modern English." They recommend that boys "should not be allowed to begin Latin till they have received a thorough grounding in English; nor will it be desirable to begin it before the age of ten. . . Assuming that the

instruction in Latin will begin when the boys are from eleven to thirteen years of age, which will give a course of from four to five years, the minimum time assigned to the subject should be four lessons a week, but wherever possible there should be a lesson every day, and two periods of home-work in each week."

A new departure lias been taken at Michaelhouse this •quarter in:he substitution of Dutch for French as the modern language studied in the school. Anyone who has observed the trend of events during the last twelve months in South Africa must have made the reflection that in the immediate future a knowledge- of Dutch would be almost essential for anyone who wished to practise either as a professional or a business man in any part of the sub-continent other than a small portion of Natal. It would seem, moreover, that the only hope for a prosperous future for these Colonies lies in some sort of federation, and a drawing together of the English and Dutch races, and the schools can do much to break clown any barriers between them, including the barrier of language. There is no doubt that the change is popular at Michaelhouse. The fact that a g<od many fellows have already some acquaintance with Dutch, and •still more have opportunities of hearing it spoken around them during the hojiclays will no doubt in part account for this, while the feeling that it is aging to count for something in after life is another consideration on the same side.

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We have many changes on the staff to record since our last issue. We said good-bye with regret to the de-« parting members, but we are glad to extend a very hearty welcome to their successors. Mr. Lawlor and Mr. Childe left in December, the former to take up the post of Senior Mathematical Master at Pietermaritzburg College, and the latter to take a post at Dundee Government Boys* School. Their places on the staff here have been taken by Mr. II. Y. Mills, Mathematical Scholar of C.C.C., Oxford, and Mr. J. E. Ferrar, of Sidney, Cambridge. Mr. Ferrar threw himself with great energy into the cricket of the latter half of the season, and did what mortal man could do with a sadly attenuated team; Mr. Mills is taking up the mantle which has fallen from Mr. Lawrence, and with equally characteristic energy is directing the football.

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For we have also had to part with 'Sir. Lawrence. He sailed for Home 011 Easter Monday, intending, after a few weeks more study, to take his final examination for the London Arts Degree. He will be remembered here for many a long day for his example of steady, hard work,

whether in teaching, or in his own reading, or in playing football, or coaching first or second games. He was here for nearly five vears, and the school remembers with gratitude all it owes to him for his service during that period. A day or two before the end of the quarter he was presented by boys and masters with a semi-hunter silver watch as a keepsake in memory of Michaelhouse.

The vacancy caused by Mr. Lawrence's departure ha? been filled by Mr. Louis M. Van Evssen, of Victoria College, Stellenbosch, and the University of Capetown. He comes to begin the teaching of Dutch, and has quickly found a way to the hearts as well as to the understandings of his

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pupils.

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The "Chronicle" offers hearty congratulations to A. C. Thornton and Q. H. Brown on their well-deserved success in the Cape Matriculation Examination. Twelve more marks would have put Brown in the 2nd Class. This is creditable, seeing that he took the examination on one-year's reading and was under 17 at the time.

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A full report of the cricket sea-son is given below. It is not necessary to do more here than to express our thanks to Mr. Beucer J. Browne, of Durban, and to the Old Boysr Club for their gifts of the bats presented for the best batting and bowling averages, which were won this year by II. W. Taylor and D. O. W. Quin respectively.

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We fear that the change of date for the shooting competitions-for the Senior Challenge Shield and White Cupmay prove prejudicial to our chances this year. We have not been favoured with any explanation of the change of date, but the postponement of the events to the second-half* of the year means that some possible members of each team will have become disqualified by age, others will probably have left. We are not complaining, nor are we wishing to contend that October is necessarily a worse time of year than June, and if the same month is selected year by year it may possibly have advantages over Juney

but the first year that such a change is made it is likely to work disadvantageously for some teams, though we have no reason to think that we shall be worse off than others.

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We have recently changed our drill and musketry instructor. Corpl. J. A. Keith, U.M.R., left at the beginning of April, and has been succeeded by Corpl. B. Campbell, N.C. Mr. Campbell has twice represented Natal in the Inter-Colonial Competition, once at the Transvaal Bisley and once at the Natal Bisley, 011 each occasion making the third highest score for the Colony.

The prospects of the football season are promising. Our School Team are naturally not yet so experienced as last year's team, and we feel our losses more especially behind the scrums, but lack of experience is a defect that can be remedied and is already beginning to be made good. After losing three such stalwarts among the masters as Messrs. Lawrence, Lawlor, and Childe we may consider ourselves fortunate in the fact that their places have been taken by three such sound players as Messrs. Mills, Ferrar, and Van Eyssen. They, with Mr. Adair as referee, will soon coach the team into the mysteries of the game, and in club matches their help in the team will be invaluable. We cannot fail, however, for a time at least, to feel the loss of such halves as C. G. Roach and H. W. Taylor and of L. B. Jenkinson and C. W. Gibson in the threequarter line. But the recruits are doing their best to emulate their predecessors, and there is splendid keenness all through. Eccles as captain may be trusted to give his team a good lead in the field, and with him, Thornton, Goodwin, Chaplin and Walters in the scrum there is a good nucleus of "weight/ Hindson, Fleischer, and Wilson ma. are shaping well at half. Quin and A. Greene* have come into the vacant places among the "threes/ and with Janion and Welch in their old places on the wings, if Quin will learn to pass, should in time make a strong combination. There is great need of a choice of reliable "place-kicks." So many points are lost each season for want of a man who can be depended on to lift a placed ball over the bar. We commend the matter to the team generally, and should, like to see systematic practice undertaken. A capacity for taking pains is one of the essential qualities of a good "kick"; practice will mostly do the rest.

OUR NEW CHAPEL.

We are able to state that considerable progress hasbeen made in the preliminary steps that have to be taken before building can actually begin. It will be well to recall the course of events which have placed matters in their present position. News was received last June that the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, acting 011 the advice of the Archbishop's Committee for Assisting Church Schools in South Africa, had decided to make us a grant of A£1.000 for building a School Chapel, Two months later we heard that the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel had also granted a -sum of A£500 for the same purpose. Inquiry by the Bishop elicited the information that these grants were made upon the usual conditions insisted upon by the two Societies-viz., that the buildings for which they were made should be opened free of debt and should be inalienable and unsaleable, therefore built upon land free of all legal liabilities, and secured as church property for ever. We were thus met with a difficulty at the outset on account of the heavy mortffasres which

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are held on the Michaelhouse property. The difficulty, however, has been got over by the mortgagees giving their consent to the transference of . a piece of land about the size of an acre to trustees, for the purpose of a chapel site, which shall be free from the operation of any mortgage on the rest of the property.

At a Governors' meeting held in March the design for

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the Chapel prepared by Messrs. Baker & Masev, of Johannesburg and Capetown, was adopted, and they were desired to prepare detailed drawings and call for tenders. A letter received recently from Mr. Baker tells us that the plans are in course of preparation, and that they hope to receive tenders in June. Our aim is to get in the foundations and have the work sufficiently advanced for the

Bishop to lay a stone on Michaelmas Day, when we look

for a large gathering of Old Boys. In order that this

may be accomplished it will be necessary to have enough money in hand to cover any difference between the amount of our grants' from England and the total cost of the work, because, as has already been said, the grants will not be paid unless we can certify that when they are paid there will be no debt on the building. Until tenders have been received the sum necessary cannot be exactly stated, but common experience teaches that there are always extras

to be provided for, and it is estimated that we shall require at least £500 before we shall be justified in starting. An effort is now being made to raise this amount, and hitherto a very encouraging response has been made. There is at present paid into the Natal Bank a sum of £2i0 odd, and in addition we are entitled to claim £100 from the Marriott Bequest in the hands of S.P.O. if we put in our claim before the end of this year. Thus only, £190 remains, and towards this some small -sums have been promised but not yet paid.

A collecting card was issued shortly before Easter, and the Rector would be glad to forward one to any Old Boy who will be good enough to apply for one. Seven cards have up to the present been returned, bringing in a sum ol' ten guineas. By the end of the long holidays we hope this may be multiplied by ten, if not more.

The idea at present is to build a chapel capable of seating some 120 people. The building will be a complete portion of the whole, comprising apsidal sanctuary, choir and nave; but it will admit a further enlargement in the future, by the addition of an ante-cliapel on the lines of the famous Oxford ante-chapels at Merton and New College, and an aisle, the two together giving seating room for an additional 90 or 100. A porch will be built connecting the Chapel with the present north block of school buildings, but not at present vestry, sacrist}r, or organchamber. The material of the roof is still under consideration, and will be decided according to the relative cost of the various possibilities.

Besides the cost of the building there will be also the cost of furnishing, which at first must be of a simple kind: but as years pass and Michaelhouse boys join the ranks of the wealthy, their affection for their old school will doubtless find expression in gifts for the enrichment of the Chapel: choir stalls and nave seats, altar pulpit, lectern (which has already been promised, by the way), coloured windows, pictures, and so forth.

The site set apart for the Chapel is at the N.E. corner of the front, the Chapel itself will stand forward at right angles to the front block of buildings, and entrance will be provided both from the front and from the quadrangle. It only needs a healthy enthusiasm on the part of past and present boys now to carry the thing through, and we count confidently upon seeing it exhibited. A "Michael-

house Chapel Building Fund" account has been opened at tlie Natal Bank, Maritzburg, to which donations may bo paid, or donations may be sent to The Rector at Michaelhouse, or to W. L. Whittaker, Esq., 14, Timber Street, Maritzburg, Secretary to the Governors.

OXOXIEXSIS.

CRICKET NEWS.

The bright prospects with which the cricket season opened were destined to be clouded over before the end. Of the eight matches played before Christmas, four were won, three were lost, and one drawn; of the six played after Christmas, one only was won, one drawn, and four lost. Certainly our losses at the end of the December quarter were heavy, but they were not sufficient to account for the poor display made by the team in the latter half of the season. With very few exceptions, there was a lack of keenness in the field, which on some occasions was nothing short of discreditable. Xo doubt Jenkinsons experience as captain was sorely missed. Quin has everything yet to learn, and no doubt when he has a couple of., seasons behind him he may be trusted to know more about the game than he does now, and more about the way to handle a team. It would be unfair to judge a new and inexperienced captain by the same standard that might be applied to one who had had even a single season's experience. Even a tiro, however, might know that it is a mistake to keep on your two crack bowlers when they are obviously tired. It merely gives the batsmen their chance to get set, A change of bowling-even for a couple of overs-very often gets rid of a man who appears set, and alters the whole appearance of the game; while, if it does nothing else, it rests your first pair, and brings them up fresh for another attack. Then again we hope next season to see regular fielding-practice maintained. Fielding is the one department of the game in which no school eleven has any right to fail, and in more than one match: wei made a very sorry show by the side of our opponents.

At the beginning of the season we had of last year's colours, Jenkinson (captain) and Taylor; and of 2nd XI. colours, Hindson i.. Gibson i., Stainbank i., Janion, and Quin. Of these, all but Janion and Quin left in December,

Mr. Childe also left, so that the new element after Christmas was considerable.

The Old Boys brought up a strong eleven at Michaelmas, and we were not surprised at our defeat. Taylor scored 74 and 46 not out in the two innings, but had little support from the rest of the side. The unfortunate loss of the score-book at a later period in the season prevents our giving the full score and analysis. Owing to great dilatoriness in connection with the fixtures of the Northern District Union, our usual match with Estcourt on the King's Birthday, in the first round of the Christopher Cup Competition, was not played. By the time that the fix-* ture was arranged for the end of the term, Dinuzulu's affairs had become pressing, and cricket matches had to give way. The consequence was that we had to play the match with our very much weakened team in February, and Estcourt batsmen enjoyed themselves at our expense. The Christopher Cup had to travel north, and found a resting place in Newcastle, their team defeating Ladysmith in the last round.

We have found ourselves members of a new Cricket Union this season, owing to the persuasiveness of our indefatigable friend Mr. Hart Davis, whom by the way we thank very warmly for coming over one or two afternoons to coach the eleven at net-practice. Mr. Hart Davis, wishing to improve the cricket of the Midland Districts, enrolled eight clubs in a Union, including Hilton and Weenen Colleges and ourselves. The results of the season's matches, which in some cases were interfered with through the calling out of the Reserves in December, are given below. Michaelhouse stands fourth on the list.

Our best game of the latter half of the season was undoubtedly that against Hilton, when they were dismissed for 16 and 40 and we made 72 in the 1st innings, including a useful 26 by Gibson. Our worst was perhaps that against the College, when after getting 9 wickets down for 55 we allowed 44 to be added for the last wicket. A little more judgment in changing the bowling would have saved that match, but the analysis speaks for itself. However, "experience does it," and next season we shall hope to see the captain use his head a bit more. We have two useful bowlers in Quin and Janion, and a decidedly promising bowler in Browne. There is quite good promise too among the junior members of first game, and with more keenness in fielding and determined pluck in playing up hard in

all circumstances we ought to reach a better standard next season.

In the junior games there was a great deal of keenness, and many juniors turned up at voluntary nets 011 non-cricket days.

In the second game Wilson i., Curson, Millar, Worthington, Greene, mi., Brandon, Roach, and Wilson ii., and in the third game Winter i., Andrews i., Bland i., Bland ii*, Furness, Oates, and Andrews ii. showed promise.

It is to be hoped that in future School Colours, or any members of the First and Second Elevens will take more interest in the junior games, and will lend their assistance in coaching and umpiring in games while their own side is batting, or in helping at the junior net.

SPOON SHOOTS.

It is intended to hold these shoots at intervals, say, one or two each quarter. The minimum number of entries

for one spoon must be taken as 15. Therefore, all who take an interest in shooting or have the welfare of the school sports at heart will endeavour to give all support to this innovation. It is, of course, impossible for all competitors to shoot with the same class of weapon. Therefore it has been decided to give the carbine a handicap over the rifle at each range, and then to arrange all competitors in classes according to their marksmanship. When a competitor has won a .spoon in a certain class, he is placed for his next shoot in the next higher class, whereas a

scratch man is handicapped 2 points for each spoon won by him.

\\ e are glad to see that the number of entries for the first shoot, held on 3rd March, was so large that the competitors had to be arranged in two divisions allowing one spoon for each division.; In division "A," which consisted mostly of rifles, Sergt. D. O. W. Quin won the spoon with a total 32 points, while Cadet N. L. Tatham, with a carbine, in division "B," won the spoon, making a total 33 points. This wras at 200 yards with the new Gin. bull.

The following alterations should be noted: No Camp

will be held this year nor will there be a Natal Cadet Bisley. The date for the Senior Challenge Shield and White Challenge Cup is this year fixed for Saturday, 17th October. These two matches are to be shot on the respective school ranges of the five selected teams. The Schools of the Empire Shooting Competition may take place on any date between 1st June, 1908, and 1st March, 1909; the programmes have not yet come to hand, but are expected to arrive shortly from England. Two new matches have been instituted: the "Roberts Trophy," to be competed foi annually by one team of eight schoolboys, under 16 years of age, on 1st July of each year, to represent each British Dominion, Dependency, or Colony, ranges 200 yards and 500 yards. This year the Natal team will shoot at the Cadet Range, Mountain Rise, Maritzburg, on Whit Monday. 8th June. Also the "Imperial!\Jatch"-miniature rifleto be competed for annually by one team of eight schoolboys, under 16 years of age on 1-st July, distance 25 yards positions kneeling and prone, seven rounds and a sightei in* each position. The Natal team will shoot at Maritzburg on Monday, 25th May, this year.
