Attached you will find a copy of a school project presented by the ANC(SA) for funding. I have indicated that we will do what we can to distribute it for funding.

I met Joe Saloojee of ANC(SA), Toronto Office, when he was in Lusaka, and he mentioned that during the ANC(SA) Women's Tour of Canada they had met with a senior politician in the Manitoba government (I believe the Attorney General) who had expressed his government's interest in providing a match grant to funds raised by organizations in Manitoba for a project of this nature. It is aimed at assisting the ANC(SA) to deal with the continuous exodus of young people who leave South Africa and come under their care. The exodus continues and although many are found places to study in friendly countries, many must remain in Morogoro for extended periods of time. For this reason, a school is seen as important in contributing to the development of these young cadres and preparing them to take their place in a new society which will replace the racist minority government in South Africa.

I am told that the CUSO Manitoba office and other groups which assisted with the tour would be interested in working on such a project. Since there is virtually nothing built as yet and so much remains to be done, any funds raised are sure to go to building and expanding the school.

Administratively, I understand that in order for CUSO to assist in fundraising and channeling funds for projects, they must be approved by the Region, in this case ECSA, as part of a country plan. ECSA has no further funds available to commit to more projects. Hoever, if groups such as Manitoba are able to fundraise for the school, I think we should be in a position to facilitate both the fundraising and channeling of funds.

I am asking the ECSA region to accept the introduction of this project to the Liberation Support Plan, to allow funds raised by Canadian organizations/be channelled to the school in Morogoro. The CUSO office here and in Tanzania are in frequent contact with the ANC(SA) and could assist in providing further information or reports as needed.

SCHOOL PROJECT OF THE AFRICAN NATIONAL

CONGRESS OF SOUTH AFRICA

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Title assistance to build and furnish school buildings and residences for student refugees from South Africa.

BACKGROUND AND SUPPORTING MATERIAL

It is very nearly a year now when the name Soweto was splashed far and wide through the world. To be precise it was on the 16th June 1976 that school children in South Africa protested against the introduction of Afrikaans as a medium of instruction in subjects like Mathematics and Science. This would mean lowering standards in an already inferior education under the infamous Bantu Education.

Although the upr sing overtly was against Afrikaans it was essentially against the cumulative effects of oppression, exploitation, white minority domination and police brutality that they were protesting.

The fascist regime reacted violently by shooting into the crowds killing many hundreds and maiming many more. A large number have been arrested and tortured. Many are still languishing in prison.

Because of the brutality and intimidation a lot of children were forced to flee from their homes and their kith and kin to seek refugee in neighbouring states. Some thousands are now scattered all over the world - the bulk being in Africa. Some of the fortunate ones were able to get scholar-ships whereas a large majority especially the younger ones are left without schooling. To overcome the problem of educating, housing, clothing and feeding these young people, the African National Congress of South Africa proposes to establish a school with boarding and welfare facilities in Morogoro, Tanzania.

OBJECTIVES

- To provide Junior, middle and upper Secondary schooling facilities;
- 2. To provide a clinic for health care;
- 3. To provide boarding and lodging facilities;
- 4. To provide recreational and library facilities;
- 5. Finally to set up small agricultural projects linked ith its training programmes in animal husbandry, and management and also rural development.

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ENDORSEMENT AND ORIGIN OF THE PROJECT

- The project is proposed by the ANC(SA) who will provide some of the professional staff required such as teachers, administrators, nurses and other clinic staff.
- The government of Tanzania has endorsed the plan by providing two houses with enough land for building and improvements and for agricultural projects.
- The ANC(SA) will undertake and supervise the building programme and will provide builders and carpenters, labour, etc. from amongst its many members
- presently stationed at Morogoro. They will also make periodic reports on the progress of the project as and when required. It would also enable participation of other members of the ANC(SA) at the training level in building constructioon, etc.

IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

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- Construction: Two wings of four classrooms each to be built urgently provided funds are available.


