The first wedding in the chapel took place on June 10th, when Mr. Rossiter was married to Miss Sawyer. It was like many war weddings, rather a quickly arranged affair. At the impromptu reception, which was held afterwards in the back quad., the boys drank the health of the happy couple and enjoyed the cake, which Mrs. Rossiter cut.

On our return in August, the School was surprised to hear of Miss Evans' marriage, which had taken place quietly during the July holidays. Mrs. Odell, as she now is, remained on the staff until the end of the year. She and her husband, who has been invalided out of the army, are now living in town. We wish them all happiness in their new life.

In May, Dr. L. C. King, of the Natal University, gave us a very interesting lecture, illustrated by photographs, on the geology of Africa and Natal, especially with reference to the Valley of the Thousand Hills.

During the last half of the year, some of the boys gave

set the ball rolling by his talk on tobacco growing and curing in Rhodesia. Massy spoke about trout and fly-fishing on the Polela. Dyer and Hudson described a visit to Lourenco Marques. Dixon and Camden Smith, ma., lectured, the former on the soap and the latter on the sugar industry. Grieve and Feetham combined with a talk on China, Grieve telling us about the Sino-Japanese war and what he had seen of it at Shanghai, while Feetham gave us an account of some Chinese customs.

The collections in chapel during the year amounted to £53 19s. 11d. This amount has been allocated as follows: S. Peter's Stipend Fund, £13 15s.; S. Chad's, £5; S. Hilda's, £2 2s.; Natal Diocesan Society, £5; Chapel Fund Reserve, £9 2s. 11d.; The Bishop's Special Appeal, £19.

The Diocese of Natal has never been self supporting. It has in the past received a large annual grant from the S.P.G. Although this grant has of recent years been reduced, it still stands at the large figure of £1,700 per annum. It would be wrong to expect this grant to continue during the war, and foolish to expect it after, when Church people in England will have so much reconstruction to do. Hence our response to the Bishop's appeal.

We are indebted, as in past years, to the clergy of S. Peter's Parish for the services on Sunday mornings. The Vicar. the Rev. H. Skelton, took the majority of these services, others were taken by Mr. Herring and Mr. Bibby.

The Rector of Michaelhouse preached on the evening of November 17th.

G. M. Loly, Esq, the Headmaster of Cordwalles School, Camberley, Surrey, wrote to Mr. Besant early in the year, very kindly offering hospitality to any of our old boys who might be stationed in England.

Among the O.C.'s who came to see us this year were Ross Butcher, I. Mackenzie and Farnie Martens. All three have entered sons for 1941. A. Blair, Anthony Dorning, F. Dorning, Geoffrey Davis, Ashley Clive-Smith, Peter Franklin and David Franklin, Peter, Anton and David Hathorn, John Hickson, Frank Hooper, N. James, D. P. Jandrell, Bobby McKenzie, R. F. McBride, P. Nourse, G. Potts, O. Solomon, Kenneth and George Strachan, Clive Rawlinson, Terry Scott, P. Walker, H. Vercoe, C. Wickins and Exton Burchell. Jock Cottrell and his wife (nee D. Bosworth Smith) brought Richard and Christopher to see us, and Kenneth Lund his flance, while Kenneth Reynolds found time on his honeymoon to bring in his bride, Charlotte (sister of Charlie Jones). Shelton Bowyer came with his wife and daughter.

Miss Winch is still in England doing war work with children.

The new music rooms were started soon after the end of the term, and should be ready in February.

Following the example of the Cordwalles Chronicle (England), we give the greatest gains in height and weight during the year. Ferguson and Friend (3[‡] ins.), Forbes mi, Hall ma, Henderson mi, Layzell and Tatham, with 3 ins., Lowe. Maske ma, van Reenen, with 2[‡] ins.; van Reenen put on most weight with 17 lbs., followed by Forbes mi, 16½; Henderson mi, 14; Robertson i and Fischer, 12 lbs.; Ferguson, 11 lbs.; Randles and Cunliffe, 10 lbs. each.

Rayment was our giant, with height 5 ft. $9\frac{1}{2}$ ins., and weight 154. He holds the record of recent years.

The last half of the year was marked by an aeroplane building craze. Models were being produced everywhere. Some of the staff had difficulty in walking round their rooms, the floors being covered with budding engineers and their efforts! The best of a large number of planes were produced by Youngleson, Thompson and Woodforde.

The School War Fete was held on December 4th in the grounds. We had hoped that among the attractions would be a military band and a cricket match between two regimental teams, but these items fell through owing to the troops leaving Oribi Camp. Threatening weather caused last minute alterations in some of the arrangements, and this weather was probably also responsible for the baths not being patronised as we had hoped, especially with the advertised "Bathing Beauty" competition.

Parents responded most generously to the boys' appeal for contributions to the stall, and with these and the efforts of the staff we had some well filled and attractively arranged fancy, produce, cake and sweet stalls. In addition there were sideshows, shooting, teas in the dining room and a conjurer, Mr. Finn, who had offered his entertainment.

As a result, we sent to the Governor General's Fund £122 8s. and £20 each to the British Red Cross, South African Red Cross, Navy League and Convalescent Soldiers' Christmas Fund.

In the evening a Braaivleis—great fun, though, rather spoilt by the rain—was arranged for the boys.

Musical activities outside the School have not been so numerous this year. Our choir did, however, take part in the Combined School Concert held in the City Hall in September for War Funds. At the same concert some of the juniors performed a musical play, "The Magic Shirt." It was their first appearance in public, and they were much appreciated by the audience.

On Good Friday the Choir, supported by Miss Mullins and Mrs. Odell (altos), Mr. Williams and Mr. Rossiter (tenors), Mr. Besant and Mr. G. Pennington (basses), sang selections from Stainers' "Crucifixion" in the chapel. We had hoped to give further performances of this type, but, alas, we are now left without much adult male support.

On December 1st we held our Carol Service; mostly of a congregational nature, but the choir sang three two-part carols by themselves. Now that part singing is becoming a regular feature with us, we hope to be able to tackle more ambitious works in the future.

During the year we have studied the lives of Handel. Bach, Chopin and Wagner, and, with the aid of gramophone records, have been able to listen to some of their works.

With excitement running high over the building of the new music rooms, there has been no lack of enthusiasm amongst the piano pupils. The prize was won by Camden-Smith, major. He has set a fine example of hard work and industry.

Some of the boys are now able to play hymns in chapel; others have shewn more aptitude for the vogue of jazz playing that has crept into the School! Mercifully, there are some who still favour the classics, and we have two Bach players of no mean talent.

Senior Library Notes.

This year there are no important events to relate. Books are taken out more or less regularly by sixty boys, some of them only taking a book occasionally, while others are constant readers. Examination of the records snows that the most popular books are those of the "Biggles" series, written by Capt. Jones, which narrate the exploits of daring air fighters, and it is evident that Cordwalles is thoroughly air-minded. The magazines provided in response to popular demand also show the influence of the war. They are: Illustrated, Picture Post, Modern World. War Illustrated, Daily Sketch. In addition to these, the Illustrated London News and Punch are sent on by the Staff Common Room. The Library undoubtedly enables the boys to fill in gaps in their daily programme in an interesting and profitable manner. With a supply of new books and a little new blood among the librarians, the Library will start the new year with the assurance of increased popularity and usefulness.

In December we were glad to see Mr. M. E. Pennington, who spent a day of his leave at the School. He was looking very fit. Mr. G. O. M. Pennington has written regularly from "somewhere north"; naturally, he does not

give us much war news in his letters, but he is delighted with the animal and bird life he has seen. Mr. Rossiter found the heat rather trying at first, but seems to be getting acclimatised.

We were interested to note in the Matriculation results that J. B. Cox, E. S. W. Simpson (Chemistry) and P. J. B. Williams (Mathematics) secured 1st classes. P. M. Brown, G. M. Dorning, J. Fehrsen, D. C. Grice and C. S. McIntosh were in the 2nd class. A T. Auret, D. J. S. Haggie, J. W. Moor and D. G. Wood were in the 3rd class.

I. de Gersigny and R. Fawcett, we note, were playing for the Natal Schools side in the Nuffield Tournament. Fawcett, at the time these notes were written, was bowling well.

A month or two ago, a parcel of prospectuses was sent by request to the South African Commissioner in Nairobi. In due course a cable arrived:—

"Number 70 despatched more by shortest sea route."

The cable had been wrongly transmitted, but for some hours the Headmaster was tearing his hair in dismay, wondering where he could put 70 Evacuees!

Summary of Headmaster's Report.

Commenting on the record number of boarders, which in the last quarter had reached 129, Mr. Besant said that accommodation was taxed to the utmost. The junior library had been turned into a dormitory, two extra class rooms had to be found, and the dining room was rather crowded. He said it would be bad policy to build to meet the influx, which was probably only temporary and due to boys arriving from overseas: the only building that would be done would be in the way of increasing facilities for the normal strength: e.g., the old squash court, which had got into bad condition, was to be replaced by a block of music rooms. The court would be missed, and the Headmaster threw out a suggestion that here was an opportunity for a parent or group of parents to earn the gratitude of the School by building another.

But accommodation was not the only difficulty—there was the question of staff. At the beginning of the year Mr. Fuller, Mr. Michau and Mr. Black had joined the staff, and for a time we were extremely well off. Later all the fit members had joined up; Mr. Gerald Pennington and Mr. Rossiter are in Kenya, Mr. M. Pennington is with the tank corps. Their places have been filled by Mr. Mellor (resident), Mrs. Pyper, Mrs. Wooldridge and Mrs. Elliot (non-resident). To all these we extend a hearty welcome.

Though the actual teaching is adequately replaced, the job of a resident master or mistress in a boarding school does not end with this: there is much games' and duty supervision. We miss tremendously the coaching in games which the absent members, and Mr. Maurice Pennington in particular, gave so unsparingly. With the resident staff under strength, those remaining have had to do very much more. I cannot express too warmly my thanks to those members of the staff who have so cheerfully undertaken the extra duties.

We shall be sorry to lose Miss Evans, or rather Mrs. Odell, who has been with us five years, and wish her every happiness in her new life."

Mr. Besant also referred to the recent change made in the status of the Governing Body. The School had been founded by the Governors of Michaelhouse and by the original trust all Governors of Michaelhouse had been ex-officio governors of Cordwalles. This arrangement in the early days had been quite satisfactory, but Michaelhouse had grown and the duties of its board increased, while some of those elected to its board were not really interested in Cordwalles. This year the trust deed had been altered. In future, in order to maintain the connection, Michaelhouse would still be represented—by five nominated members—but there would now be a larger proportion of purely Cordwalles members. Under the new policy Professor Burchell, Mr. H. W. C. Hickson and Dr. E. Michel-Smith had recently joined the Board.

Considering the fact that we were left with only three members of our last year's fifteen, we have had a fairly successful season. Unfortunately, two or three of our matches were cancelled owing to the infectious diseases, which have worried most schools this year.

Cricket Notes.

Although the XI lost more matches than it won, two of those lost were against men, and the team was well up to the average of recent years. It was unfortunate that Mackenzie, the captain, could not play during the second half of the year: after his century early on, we expected him to make many runs. In his absence McBride captained with intelligence, and set a good example of keenness. Layzell was the most prolific scorer; inclined to start shakily, when set, he hit with great power on the off. A'Bear and Dougall made a good opening pair: the former had same stylish strokes and the latter usually staved in longer than his scores would indicate. Hart always batted with confidence. Henderson was the most consistent bowler and with luck would have taken more wickets. A'Bear, with his slows, was usually dangerous against school teams. McFie kept wicket soundly.

In batting, Layzell made 487 runs for 16 completed innings, giving him an average of 30.4. He was followed by Mackenzie, 246-10-24.6; Hart, 212-15-14.8; A'Bear, 189-15-12.6; McBride. 209-17-12.2. Of the others, Harwin had 16 innings for 139 runs and McFie 16 innings for 140 runs.


