My information on Gladys Mgudlandiu is as follows,

Mgudlandlu was born in Feddie in the Ciskei in 1I925;° the daughter and grand-daughter of missionaries of the African Methodist Episcopal Church in the Ciskei. AS an adolescent she won recagnition fram the Feddie cammunity for her talents in clay modelling and mural painting. A feature of her mural designs was the use of traditional Xhosa mural imagery of trees, plants, flowers etc. executed in local clay colours with imaginative additional patterned inlays using organic components such as feathers and MAaLiZe-pips,

After obtaining a teacher's certificate fram Lavedale Training College in the Eastern Cape, Mgudlandilu moved to Cape Town in the early 1940's, where she studied nursing at Victoria Hospital. In 1944 she worked at Erogklyn Chest Hospital , and in 19498 she joined the Athlone Bantu Community School. In 1945 she taught at Nyanga West Frimary School,

From the mid 1940â\200\230s to the late 1960's Mgudlandlu lived in Nyanga. She was well known as an. artist sta: -the Nyanga Cammunity whe called her "Gladys the African Queen", She lived in a small council house where her drawings and Paintings in gouache and Gil, were executed at night by the light of a paraffin lamp. (She apparently preferred to work with her canvases flat on the floor than upright at an easel.) In the main, her subjects were taken from the rural landscape around Nyanga and Cape Town, aS well as fram recalled childhood images of Ciskei landscapes and Xhosa folk tales. (Birds are Particularly daminant as subjects, far example, Watching Bird c. 1961, No Life Without Religion

C.11902, and Eastern Cape Eagle c.1943.)

Mgudlandilu held three major ane-persan exhibitions in 1941, 1962 and 19643, Her first exhibition in 1961 took place at Roam 404, 47 Parliament Street, Cape Town, and was reputedly the first solo exhibition in Africa of a black female artist.

In 1962 and 1945 she exhibited at the Rodin Gallery in Loop Street, Cape Town. ( Jean Fuchs was the galleryâ\200\231s director.) Mast of the paintings and drawings from these exhibitions were purchased by private white art patrons, After George Femba (1912 $^{\sim}$ ), Mgudlandlu is the aniy known Gil painter to have come from the Cape in the first half of the twentieth century « (Mgudlandilu and Femba knew each other â\200\224- Pemba Painted her portrait, ) Mgudlandiuâ\200\231s works have been included in numerous group exhibitions in South Africa. She also completed mural commissions for the Department of Bantu Education sometime in the 60's,

In 1971 Moudlandiu sustained serious injuries in oa car accident. Later, illness prevented her fram continuing tea Paint. She died in Guguletu in 1979 at the age of fifty-four,
