REPORT ON THE ANC STUDENTS' STUDIES IN THE ACADEMIC YEAR 1987 - 1988,
SPONSORED BY THE "WITHOUT HOMECOUNTRY" PROJECT

WANDILE NKANKULA:

Wandile came to Finland in October 1985. This has been his second year studying adult education at the University of Tampere. Being the first ANC student in Finland, Wandile has taken good care of the other ANC students. He has also been responsible for the ANC information activities in Finland. Wandile has studied hard and done fairly well. He has now 57 points (corresponding to 57 weeks of full-time studies). (After two years of studies an average Finnish student has 60 - 70 points. To get an academic degree you need 160 points.)

GERALD MOHLALA:

Gerald came to Finland in October 1986. He had now finished his first year at the Department of Education at the University of Jyväskylä. He has taken not so many exams but on average his grades have been good. Gerald has an occasional drinking problem which in turn has caused some breaks in his studies. In addition, he is not used to handling money and has therefore got into dept (he still owes 2000 Finnish marks). Since Gerald is open sympathetic and active, the sponsors believe that he will gradually get used to the Western life style and get on better with his studies. Gerald has now 14 points (at the Department of Education the average is 23 - 30 points in the first year of studies).

LOUISA NCWANA:

Louisa came to Finland with Gerald in 1986. This academic year she studied communications theory and mass media as well as Finnish at Sirola Folk High School. She has not studied as hard as the others and it seems that she has not been interested enough in her studies. She has had problems with her husband, Sisa Ncwana, and apparently this has greatly affected her achievements. Louisa has also had some problems with her health.

According to a test, which was carried out by psychologists, Louisa does not have a good command of the English language and her ability to form concepts is insufficient. These two factors will make her academic studies even more difficult. She has learned only a small amount of Finnish. At Sirola Folk High School she passed her exams, which are not very demanding, satisfactorily. According to the sponsors, Louisa can study communications theory and mass media at the University of Tampere for one more year. But if she does not succeed in her studies, we will recommend to the ANC that she would attend a sixmonth course at an international journalist school where more practical training is available. This type of schools can be found, for instance, in Berlin, Bulgaria and Hungary.

CYNTHIA BOOM:

Cynthia came to Finland in 1987. She has studied social subjects and Finnish with great success at Viittakivi International Centre. She speaks Finnish fairly well. She has shown a lot of interest in her studies. On the whole, she has been a very active student. She has also taken an intensive class of Finnish at the University of Helsinki in June 1988. Next autumn she will continue her studies at the Department of Education at the University of Jyväskylä.

Cynthia is in every respect an excellent representative of the ANC. She has visited several schools with great success and got new sponsors for the "Without Hometown" project.

BARNEY MOGANE:

Barney came to Finland with Cynthia in October 1987. He, too, has studied social subjects and the Finnish language at Viittakivi International Centre. In addition, he has taken the same intensive class of Finnish as Cynthia. His studies in Finnish are already well under way. Barney is hard-working and shows great interests in his studies. He is also an active and excellent representative of the ANC, especially when visiting schools.

Barney is a godson of the Finnish organization, High Technology Professionals for Peace, together with the "Without Hometown" project.

Barney will continue to study Finnish for the autumn term in Pohjola Folk High School and after that he'll study electronics in Raahe Technical Institute.
