The hospital staff in Mazimbu should be able to give us information concerning new cases registered during 1990. The camps will also have information if they have bornades who may or are needed to be seen by a psychiatrists.

According to Cde. Nkobi Dakawa/Mazimbu complexes will continue to function for another five years. This will mean that those children of half South African parentage can remain there until proper arrangements are made for them to be received and absorbed into the country.

Most of the comrades returning to the country should receive consultation/counselling and evaluated before integration. Emphasis should be placed on independent solution of daily life problems.

It would be of vital importance that NEC members receive returnees and brief them about the realities of conditions in the country so that comrades working with their needs are not held responsible for delays or inadequacies.

- ON FEBRUARY THE 2ND 1990, STATE PRESIDENT DE KLERK MADE A MAJOR ANNOUNCEMENT AFFECTING THE UNBANNING OF POLITICAL ORGANISATIONS INCLUDING UMKHONTO WE SIZWE (MK).
- 2. FOLLOWING FROM THE ABOVE, IT STANDS TO REASON THAT AS FROM 2ND FEBRUARY 1990, UMKHONTO WE SIZWE IS A LEGAL ORGANISATION IN SOUTH AFRICA.
- HOWEVER, THIS BEING THE CASE, SOME OPERATIONS OF UMKHONTO WE SIZWE HAVE BEEN EMBARGOED AGAINST BY CERTAIN STIPULATIONS OF THE PRETORIA MINUTE. IN THIS REGARD, CADRES OF UMKHONTO WE SIZWE HAVE STRICTLY ADHERED TO THE TERMS OF THESE PROTOCOLS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE DIRECTIVES FROM OUR POLITICAL LEADERSHIP.
- 4. FOLLOWING THE UNBANNING OF THE UMKHONTO WE SIZWE WE HAVE HAD AN EXPERIENCE WHERE OUR NATIONAL OFFICE, REGIONAL OFFICES AND PRIVATE HOMES OF OUR LEADERSHIP NOT MENTION THOSE OF OUR ORDINARY MEMBERS IN THE STREET WERE INUNDATED WITH DEMANDS BY PEOPLE WISHING TO IDENTIFY WITH UMKHONTO WE SIZWE. MANY PEOPLE WERE SUPPOSEDLY DISAPPOINTED BY THE LACK OF DIRECTION FROM OUR STRUCTURES IN THIS REGARD.
- IN ORDER TO REDRESS THIS SITUATION, WE ADVICE ALL REGIONS, TO ALSO INTURN INFORM THEIR RESPECTIVE BRANCHES THAT WHENEVER INDIVIDUALS WISH TO MAKE ENQUIRIES ABOUT THE MK, THE FOLLOWING DETAILS SHOULD BE OBTAINED FROM SUCH PEOPLE, WHO IN TURN SHOULD BE ADVICED TO LEAVE OUR OFFICES AS THEIR ENQUIRIES SHALL RECEIVE ATTENTION.

I have also visited the clinics which can do follow ups and admit to hospitals if necessary. The chronic cases can be intergrated into the existing services without cost. Those P.T.S.D cases requiring long term therapy can also receive treatment form psychiatrists and psychologists.

Dr Raetemane who is a child psychiatrists, attached to Baragwanath hospital is willing to offer his expertise when needed.

In Mazimbu/Dakawa areas Tax Rantao who knows about all psychiatric patients seen by us within the last ten years. The hospital staff in eximbu should be able to give us information concerning new cases registered during 1990. The camps will also have information if they have comrades who may or are needed to be seen by a psychiatrists.

According to Cde. Nkobi Dakawa/Mazimbu complexes will continue to function for another five years. This will mean that those children of half South African parentage can remain there until proper arrangements are made for them to be received and absorbed into the country.

Most of the comrades returning to the country should receive consultation/counselling and evaluated before integration. Emphasis should be placed on independent solution of daily life problems.

It would be of vital importance that NEC members receive returnees and brief them about the realities of conditions in the country so that comrades working with their needs are not held responsible for delays or inadequacies.
