WASHINGTON â\200\224 Bishop Desmond Tutu will be
receiving regrets from many of the prominent
Americans he has invited to his inauguration is
. Archbishop of Cape Town on September 7.

Among those who will not be attending the
ceremonyâ\200\230y are Senator Ted Kennedy, Senator
Gary Hart, Congressman Howard Wolpe, Con-
gressman Walter Fauntroy, Mayor Ed Koch of
New York City, Mayor Andrew Young of Atlanta,
Mayor Wilson Goode of Philadelphia, Mayor
Marion Barry of Washington DC, Mayor Col
man Young of Detroit, entertainer Harry Belafonte
and comedian Bill Cosby.

notable gathering of American liberals and
aries in a country that has been a focus of their
attention in the past year. â\200\230

The press secretaries of Mr Koch of New York and Mr Goode of Philadelphia noted that their chiefs regarded Bishop Tutu as a friend. scym Keunedy's representative said that the United States Senate would be dealing with important matters at that time â\200\224 including a confirmation vote on Mr William Rehnquist as Chief Justice of the US, which Senator Kennedy will oppose.
