re: A note of protest against the police raid carried out on our premises on Friday 7th January, 1977.

May I premise this note by thanking His Majesty, King Sobhuza II and the Government of the Kingdom of Swaziland, for according our organisation - the African National Congress - the honouroff representing the interests of our people in the Kingdom of Swaziland.

As I remember correctly, the arrangements of our relationship were first mooted during a visit paid to the Kingdom of Swaziland by the President of the African National Congress, Mr. Oliver R. Tambo, in July 1975. In a subsequent meeting held at the desire of His Majesty, King Sobhuza II, on the 14th May 1976, the matter of our relationship was finalised. My presence in the Kingdom of Swaziland was a direct result of arrangements arrived at the latter meeting — His Majesty himself sanctioning my presence in Swaziland. Thus I consider and regard myself a guest of both the King and the Government of Swaziland.

It has been my desire to meet you for some time in order that through you His Majesty, King Sobhuza II, may know of my stay in his Kingdom. Briefly, my stay has been characterised by hospitality, kindness and courtsey on the part of His Majesty's Govern—ment. For all this I am sincerely thankful. However, in the period of my stay here, i.e. after the arrangements between the King and the A.N.C. President I have experienced disturbing treatment from certain quarters in government, the latest of which prompted the writing of this note. The manner of the treatment does not befit the representative of an organisation recognised by the State; equally it is contrary to the spirit of the "arrangements". An example of this treatment is experienced each time I return from abroad—I am subjected to a thorough search at the borders

posts of the Kingdom of Swaziland. This is done in spite of even the Diplomatic Passport I use for travelling. To my thinking, and I say this with all humility, this treatment does not befit the representative of a respectable and respected African organisation. I would have thought that if have violated any of the term of the arrangements arrived at between Mr. Oliver R. Tambo, the A.N.C. President and His Majesty, King Sobhuza IIthe government has the right to call me and draw my attention to such transgressions on my part. I may mention at this stage that I have drawn the attention of the Deputy Prime Minister, the Honourable Mr. Zonke Khumalo, as well as the Foreign Ministry, to this matter - so far to no avail.

The latest incident which, as I mentioned earlier, prompted the writing of this note concerns a raid on our premises on Friday the 7th January 1977 at six o'clock (6 a.m.) The raid was directed by a Mr. Mthimkhulu, Station Commander, Royal Swazi Police, Manzini. A search warrant for arms, ammunition and political material was given to me. I am prepared to concede that I may not quarrel or question the right of the State to search for arms and ammunition; that is a matter of State security. But I wish to say that I regard the confiscation of A.N.C. documents and reports as absolutely wrong and contrary to our arrangements; I would understood the arrangements arrived at between His Majesty, King Sobhuza II, and the President of the African National Congress prescribed a working relationship based on a complete understanding of the nature of our organisation, the A.N.C. And thus I must regard the behaviour of the police in confiscating A.N.C. documents as a breach of the "arrangements" and an indignity to the A.N.C.

I cannot recall violating the terms of the "arrangements" since coming to the Kingdom of Swaziland. And concerning political literature I am certain it is known that I am a politician; all and as my life has been involvement in political activity. My very appointment to represent my organisation in Swaziland was a political appointment. Thus, if certain quarters in the Swaziland Covernment, are going to treat me in a non-political light, then it was a waste of time on the part of all those who were involved in the "arrangements" that culminated in my presence in Swaziland.

In the course of the raid, the police took from my possession a confidential report intended for the A.N.C. President, Mr. Oliver R. Tambo. I am accordingly requesting, through your good offices,

the immediate return of that document. Were that report/document to fall into the hands of the enemy I am certain many of our people in South Africa will suffer untold torture. As I would not like the future generations to have even the slightest thought that the Government of the Kingdom of Swaziland had a hand in the suffering of our people as a result of that document. I say this with the greatest concern and fear for our people.

I must also express thee hope that the treatment meted out is not intended to make us feel that we are not yet a free people in our own country - Africal I must further state that it as one who is in this part of Southern Africa I have a duty to report to my President all information - public and confidential - on gwill Kindly request observations I make as part of my mission here, and that such reports must be rendered immune from the police by the Government of Swaziland. In, fact, I must intimate to you that in future, I might be compelled to refuse surrending documents to the police should I fail to obtain any relief in these matters.

In conclusion 9 am vegu to Kindly raise these two those matters Tothe officially with His Majesty, King Soffwar II and his sort 9 also duclose for your pternsal a document alveady Albuitted to the Foreign Affairs de partment. 3. Hank you Moses McBHida
