your respective glass ceilings, and you

This daily sharing of pain results in a cathartic strengthening of the partners $a \ge 00 \ge 31$ bond, or turns the relationship into an existential, Beckett-like purgatory.

So given the special havor the rat race can visit on the lives of black couples,

According to the London Sunday Times, for the Mandelas the miracle may be encountering turbulence or, worse, may have already crashed to earth, rolling along a cornfield. The paper quotes African National Congress sources saying the Mandelas will soon end their 33-year marriage.

If the news about the split is true, it's likely that marital friction was brought on by Winnieâ\200\231s ongoing legal difficulties. Last year, she was implicated in a kidnapping case and sentenced to six years (sheâ\200\231s appealing). What a cruel joke. Convicted for kidnapping. During Nelsonâ\200\231s incarceration, Winnie was once quoted as saying: \hat{a} \200\234I canâ\200\231t help thinking of all these years of our lives that have gone down the drain, our best years. \hat{a} \200\235

Tuesday, The Associated Press quoted a statement from Winnie saying simply that her marriage $\hat{a}200\234$ has endured. $\hat{a}200\235$

Black upliftment plan picks up the pace

THE Independent Development Trust (IDT) had to run the gauntlet of a whole series of sniper attacks when it seemed to be slow in waving a magic wand that made poverty and deprivation vanish at a single stroke.

Launched two years ago with R2-billion from Government funds, the IDT was hailed as a main standard-bearer in a post-apartheid march across the debris of apartheid to seek solutions to black socio-economic problems.

Waves of oi:timism spread about an instant tidal wave of new low-cost houses, new schools, new clinics and health services.

When the wait for a start of actual construction work dragged on into weeks and even months, the snipers started to draw aim. Had the Government merely scored a few political points $\hat{a}\200\224$ and tucked its promises away in the filing cabinets of yet another expensive but ineffective bureaucracy?

Was the IDT dawdling because it was making a mint out of the investments it had made with all its cash $a\200\224$ more interested in expanding its fortune than in making a start?

Former high court judge Jan Steyn, drawn from the Urban Foundation to head the IDT operation,

CRITICS accused the Independent Development Trust of dragging its heels when it was first launched with R2-billion from Government funds two years ago. JOHANNESBURG, South Africa â\200\224 Millions of black workers joined one of the largest protest strikes in South African history Monday, shutting down dozens of factories and stores nationwide in an attempt to pressure the white government to end violence and relinquish power.

. At least 12 black people were killed in strike-related violence on the first day of the two-day protest.

An 11-member U.N. team called in to monitor the strike fanned out across the country during the day,

visiting potential trouble spots and helping to avert a confrontation between police and protestersin at least one township.

The African National Congress,

which called the strike with its union allies, praised the discipline of the strikers.
