In his report, Mr Tillet outlines several recent attacks on IFT supporters in Natal. He says 55 IFP members have been killed in 3 spate of attacks since August.

Despite evidence of a distinctive pattern of genocide emerging in Natal and the purging of {FP supportâ200\231 in some areas, the statistics have failed to stir global of even domestic public outrage, says Mr Tillet

He claims the ehmt-

Quoting the most recent massacres, the report says the modus operandi of some of the attacks â lightning mobility, â ordained preci-

saiants

sion, and rapid exit indicate a high degree of professional<sup>ism</sup> and sophistication<sup>the</sup> trademark of MK combat<sup>.</sup>

Of major significance is the use of counterfeit security force uniforms and police appointment cards. This is a strategy employed by MK, which has dual functions. Mr Tillet alleges.

By posing as security force members, the as-surreptitiously gain the confidence of those targeted for assass-ination and bogus uml-forms are a useful propaganda tool to chs-credit the security forces and exoperate the ANC from invoivement.

This strategy also undermines confidence in the security forces, the neutral role is questioned and they are mistrusted. This ultimately leads to aparchy and a total breakdown in law and order.

Focusing on MK, Mr Tiller reiterates the (FP's allegation that Transkei is being used

as a springboard for cross-border incursions by ANC soldiers into Natal.

He alleges members of the Transkei Defence Force are reportedly training MK cadres and trafficking illegal arms into Natal, leading to the upsurge in violence in the Midlands and South Coast.

MK hitsquads then eliminate key or leading IFP leaders.

The most disturbing element of this strategy, says Mr Tillet, is the marginalisation of traditional leaders with the ultimate aim of destroying tribal authorities

A rural destabilisation programme is also used to sabotage the IFP's power base in rural Natal. To this end, the report alleges youths are strategically deployed in these communities. Through politicisation, intimidation and other strategies, they ultimately break the affected communities' threshold.

As a result, the community is demoralised and drained.

Consequently, the community resignedly succumbs to its impending fate. After this process, all resistance to the ANC is brutally crushed

Mr Tillet says the government appears to be reluctant to act against MK.

The IFP demands the immediate and unconditional disarming and demobilisation of MK cadres, surrender of the MK arsenal, and

IAKPP request to carry  
7 weapons in Jhb refused

POLICE yesterday tum-  
ed down an application by  
the Inkatha Freedom Par-  
ty for its supporters to  
carry weapons during a  
protest march in Johan-  
nesburg today

Participants in the  
march will commit a  
crime if they are in pos-  
session of traditional  
weapons during the  
march, Witwatersrand  
regional commissioner  
Major-General Gerrit  
Erasmus said in a state-  
ment

He also said IFP sup-  
porters travelling by train  
to the march would not be  
allowed to carry weapons.

The IFP is staging the  
march to police head-  
quarters at John Vorster  
Square to protest against  
the recent agreement be-  
tween the government

and the African National  
Congress that secured the  
release of scores of politi-  
cal prisoners.

It must be emphasised  
that past experience has  
shown that protest mar-  
ches of this nature, in the  
volatile climate which  
prevails at this time, have  
led to unnecessary viol-  
ence and bloodshed, Erasmus said

Permission is refused  
to participants of the  
march to be in possession  
of dangerous weapons  
while on their way to the  
march, should they make  
use of trains as a means of  
transport.

Gen Erasmus rejected  
the application in terms of

notices gazetted in February and March prohibiting the carrying of dan-

gerous weapons dulu.;  
ma(c\200\230es and at mlwa\stations.

He said o KwaZulu representative had applied for permission to carry traditional weapons during the march.

It was clear from an IFP Press release that the march was a political gathering, and traditional weapons would therefore not be allowed, the regional commissioner said.

In addition to the prohibitions, Gen Erasmus called on other groups or people not participating in the march, not to provoke violence

The ANC had expressed concern over plans by the IFP supporters to carry weapons during the march. 200\224 Sapa

THE leader of the Inkatha Freedom Party of Alexandra, Jotham Xaba (37), and IFP member Peter Mncube were gunned down on

Thursdays, the minibus did not drive away, but con-

tinued to be driven around the area after the attack. The SADF patrol did not interfere.

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Thursday night in view of a SA Defence Force patrol, the IFP claimed yesterday

Three other IFP members were wounded in the attack

The SADF rejected the IFP claim of action by the patrol

According to IFP spokesman, Mr Themba Khoza, the attack occurred about 8 pm in the IFP squatter area. !

Shots were fired at IFP members from a minibus which had driven around in the area for some time.

Both Mr Xaba and Mr Mncube were killed instantly

The three wounded were taken to the Alexandra Clinic and later transferred to an undisclosed hospital. Their condition was described as serious
