Harare International Airport, to the disappointment of the assembled Press corps.

The South African politician, who arrived in a light aircraft, is in the country at the invitation of President Mugabe. The two men are scheduled to hold discussions today on a variety of issues, including the on-going constitutional talks and the high level of violence.

Mr Buthelezi, chief minister of the KwaZulu homeland in South Africa in addition to being leader of millions of supporters, mostly Zulus, in his Inkatha Freedom Party, was not given an opportunity to speak to reporters who had awaited his arrival.

Before his aircraft arrived, Minister of Foreign Affairs Nathan Shamuyarira, through a ministry spokesman, told the contingent of journalists at the airport that reporters were barred from interviewing Chief Buthelezi until after he had met Mr Mugabe. 7

The spokesman did not gisclose the reasons behind the ministry's directive. However, speculation was rife last night over the ministry's move.. It was being suggested in some circles that the govern-ment did not wish to allow Chief Buthelezi, who is well-known for his outspokenness in advancing his political ideas, to disclose his agenda in advance of his meeting with the President.

Mr Buthelezi was accompanied by high-ranking officials in his party. They included Mr Frank Mdlalose, the party's national chairman, and Mr Simon Gumede, the party's

deputy secretary-general and also Minister of Works in the KwaZulu government.

Also in the delegation are: Mr Dennis Madide, a member of the Inkatha central committee and KwaZulu Minister of Finance; Lionel Mtshali, KwaZulu Minister of Education and Culture; Mr Ben Ngubane. the Minister of Health, and Mr Joseph Mathews, Chief Buthelezi's legal adviser.

This is Chief Buthelezi's first official visit to Zimbabwe, which has regarded him as a collaborator with the apartheid government. Ao

The scheduled meeting today is at the invitation of President Mugabe, who, as chairman of the Frontline States, was asked by the Ad Hoc Committee on Southern Africa in the Organisation of African Unity to help reconcile the differences among black leaders in South Africa.

The attempted bombing of a crowded Bellevue, Johannesburg, restaurant on Saturday night was part of an offensive by the Azanian Peopleâ\200\231s Liberation Army against soft targets, police said yesterday.

Thrae people were arresied at a games hall in Rockey Street on Saturday night. Police said they were in possession of a stick grenade, 250 of Russian-made TNT ex%*sive and 1kg of plastic explosive. The plastic was packed with 8-inch nails for maximum effect.

The Chinese stick grenade waz detopated in a controlled explogion by bemb disposal experts at the corner of Bedford and Hopklns streets, Yeoville, at about 9.30 pm oz Saturday.

Yesterday. police detonat-¢d the plastic explosive in front of members of the media at a2 remote shooting range near Eldorado Park. It was a huge blast, even out in the open.

Apother man wa3 arrested and more weapons were seized in a follow-up operation which resulted in a shootout in Soweto late on Saturday night.
