Mr. Cele, whose Umgwamanda Oyiso Lomuzi (the Special Civic Executive of Clermont) has been in the fore-front of the battle against the local Advisory Board, made this contention in a lengthy memorandum to the Secretary. of the Local Health Commission Mr. D. R. Dona'dson and the Bantu Affairs Commissioner of Pinetown, Mr. H. C. van Vuuren.

In the memorandum the Advisory Board — which recently recommended that a beerhall be built in Clermont

-was described as "purbouting to represent the residents of Clermont."

The memorandum consists mainly of the resolutions passed at three residents meetings in the township during June and July this year.

The first resolution recap tulates a suggestion made by the Area Secretary of the L. H. C. Mr. D. E. Foster at a meeting of the Advisory Board on August 31, 1961. The first

Mr. Cele, who was then secretary of the Board, maintains that Mr. Foster supported the Umgwamanda's feelings that the Advisory Board is "not the voice of the people."

According to the minutes of that meeting Mr. Foster is reported to have agreed that the 'public felt that the Advisory Board' was "not fully discharging its obligations" by neither visiting their Wards nor reporting to Ward Committees. Committees.

The document further re-iterates that Clermont is a "permanent Bantu Home-land" and the Commission has no right to use public

The beerhall would have to be built from public funds and the people of Clermont, according to Mr. Cele, did not consider a bierhall as "being foremost among the r needs.'

The Clermont Advisory Board has sent out invita-tions to the various civic leaders in the township to a meeting in which the beerhall issue will be dis-

cussed.
