 Egypt. We are sure that the candidate we send must  
 be suitable and able to perform the tasks decided by the  
 importance role that Egypt plays not only in the region but  
 also in the world.  
 I must also take this opportunity to express our thanks to you  
 for inviting Mr Mbeki to visit Cairo. We regret that this has not  
 materialised. Mr Mbeki is deeply involved in the negotiations  
 process and the possibilities of him leaving South Africa  
 presently are very limited. However we will make every effort to  
 honour your invitation.
