ADAMS - Lt. Col. G.P.D. Adams, O.B.E., late Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire

Regiment (3271: 0.22-27), who died on 24th March, 1979, joined the Regular Army from the Supplementary Reserve in 1930. He retired in 1957 and became Personnel Manager, Borax Consolidated, London.

BADDELEY - Sir John Baddeley, Bart. (2596: 0.14-18), died on 27th January, 1979.

BANBURY - F.B. Banbury (3443: G. 24-29), who joined the London Stock Exchange in 1932, died on 26th November, 1978. During the war he served as a Lieutenant in Queen Victoria's Rifles, K.R.R.C. and was taken prisoner at Calais in 1940.

BINGLEY - R.F.E. Bingley (3272: F. 22-26), died some years ago.

CARPENTER - Professor E.M. Carpenter (4069: Se. 31-35) died in Spain

on 24th August, 1978. He graduated from St. Edmund Hall, Oxford in 1939 and entered the Economics Department of Harper Adams Agricultural College. After the war he worked at the West of Scotland Agricultural College moving to the farm economics branch of King's College, Newcastle-upon-Tyne in 1948. He held the chair of Farm Economics at Newcastle University at the time of his death.

COLEY - G.H. Coley (2848: Sa. 17-20), died on 21st April, 1977. He serv ed as a Flight Lt. in the United Kingdom and West Africa.

COWARD - E.N. Coward (2754: 0.16-19), died on 4th April, 1979.

COWBURN - R.E. Cowburn (3303: G. 22-27), a double blue at Cambridg e.

died on 18th July, 1979. On leaving St. John's College he worked in Argentina but returned home in 1940 to join the Intelligence Corps, becoming a Captain, and serving as Assistant Military Attache, Madrid, from 1942 to 1944. After the war he took up dairy farming.

DAVIES - O.W. Davies (3775: 0. 28-31), was murdered at his home in Jamaica on 13th September, 1978. On leaving school he became a mark et

gardener at East Preston and during the war served as a Flight Lieutenan t,

Ŕ.A.F.V.R. in Coastal and Transport Commands.

After the war he became a banana and coconut planter in Jamaica, wher e

he became a driving force in promoting the interests of cricket and cricket

umpiring, achieving excellence as an umpire and officiating in Test matches

He was for several year a member of the Jamaica Cricket Board of Contro I.

DOWRICK - D J. Dowrick (4681: Sa. 4144), died suddenly on 22nd March .

1979. Following National Service as an Ord. Seaman, R.N. he graduated in chemistry with First Class Honours from New College, Oxford and entere

the plastics division of I.C.I. He rose to be Marketing Manager and invented and developed many new plastics when a research chemist with I.C.I.

ELY - E.J.W. Ely (2150: N. 07-10), died on 26th August, 1978. He served

with the Public Schools Bn., Royal Fusiliers and the Royal West Kent Regiment in the First World War, being wounded twice and taken prisoner in 1917. He spent all his working life and some years past retirement in the Civil Service and eventually retired completely in the early 1960's.

EVE - R.D.E. Eve (2849: G. 17-21), who entered the R.M.A. Woolwich on

leaving Lancing, died on 18th January, 1979. He was commissioned into the R.A. becoming an instructor at the School of Signals from 1926-29. He

resigned his commission in 1929 and became a solicitor but was embodi ed

for service as a Captain in the T.A. when war broke out in 1939, reaching

the rank of Lt. Col. He practiced in the City of London after demobilisation .

GORDON-WALKER - B.T. Gordon-Walker (3792: Se. 28-32), died sudde nly on 16th July, 1979, at his home, Highfield School, East Grinstead.

HARDISTY - R.W. Hardisty (2838: Sa. 17-18), who left early for the King' School, Canterbury, died some years ago.

HARKEY - T.R.G. Harkey (5272: F. 49-54), a chartered accountant, had died.

HILTON - The Revd. Christian Hilton (4035: Sa. 31-35), died very sudden in April 1979. He was awarded a Sankey scholarship, proceeding to Kebl College, Oxford and later to St. Stephens House, His training for the ministry was interrupted by the war in which he served as a Lieutenant R.N.V.R. Ordained in 1947 he was appointed Eton College Missioner moving to Holy Cross. Greenford, in 1952 and two years later became the College Missioner at Camberwell. He was Vicar of Wimborne St. Giles,

Dorset for many years and had only recently moved to St. Margaret's. Leytonstone.

HOLT - SK. Holt (2603: F. 14-18), died on 8th February, 1979. He obtained a certificate in Agriculture at Reading Agricultural College in 1921 and became a tea planter in Ceylon, retiring in 1950. During the war he served as a rifleman in the Ceylon Defence Force.

INSOLL - E.L. Insoll (2723: Sa. 15-20), a company director, died in August, 1978.

KING - Dr. G J.G. King (3514: G. 25-29), who was at St. Catherine's College, Cambridge and St. Thomas's Hospital has died. In 1939 he obtained a Diploma in Bacteriology from London University and became Director, Public Health Laboratories at Poole, Dorset.

LAWSON - Sir Henry Lawson, M.C. (2415: Se. 11-16), who died in December, 1978 was the first salaried solicitor to become President of the Law Society. He served on the Western Front from 1917 to 1918 with the 10th Bn. Manchester Regiment, being severely wounded and awarded the Military Cross shortly before the armistice.

After the war he attended Trinity College, Oxford, before taking articles as a solicitor at Linklaters. He became chief legal adviser and deputy chief general manager of Lloyds Bank and helped to establish the College

of Law, becoming a Governor of the College.

Sir Henry was a most distinguished solicitor and among his other distinct was the discovery of an important hoard of Upper Palaeolithic flint tools now lodged in a collection bearing his name at the British Museum.

LOVELL - The Rev. I.R. Lovell, Vicar of Minster Abbey, Sheppey

(4159: F. 32-37), died on 7th November, 1978. He graduated from Keble

College, Oxford in 1940 and trained at Cuddesdon. He was appointed curate of St. Giles, Cambridge from 1942 to 1945, and of St. German's, Cardiff 1949-1953. Vicar of St. Columba's, Sunderland from 1953 to 1965 he was then appointed Rector, Dogura Cathedral, New Guinea, becoming Dean in 1968.

MERCER - C.E. Mercer, T.D. (2990: 0.19-23), died in Jersey on 31st December, 1978. During the second World War he served as a major R.A. (T.A.) in North Africa and Italy, being mentioned in despatches,

1944.

Lunchtime Concerts have been introduced to provide a platform for experienced

a further five in the Lent term, 1979. Two exchange concerts took place in 1978

and 1979 where pupils from Lancing and Hurstpierpoint joined together in a friendly and informal atmosphere to entertain each other with a wide varie

ty of

music. The school orchestras gave a concert in Great School on 3rd De cember, 1978

and despite a frantically busy music department the Concert Club had one of the

most successful seasons for some time with an audience of approaching four hundred

attending the last concert.

The 1978/79 drama season of four different plays in which nearly 200 pupils were

involved reinforced the urgent requirement of a theatre at Lancing. While a Lower

School play (A Long March to Jerusalem) provided opportunities for lots of younger

boys to become involved in a production and, incidentally, to give good e ntertainment

to two substantial audiences, a variety of other plays were exercising the talents of

senior actors, actresses and producers in many ways. After Magritte saw a XL boy

producing his contemporaries with very little adult help and The Philanthr opist a

20

group of sixth formers putting on a difficult, sophisticated comedy all by themselves; giving two polished performances to large audiences and inspiring others to think of similar ventures. At the same time the debutantes

of the Manor, wishing to establish themselves put on a play more rehear sed

and prepared than would ever be possible in a week's festival of one act house plays.

\* \* \*

Statistically this was Lancing's worst cricket season for many years and it must

be a rare event for an XI to fail to win a single match. However, statistics never

reveal all for this XI was probably the least experienced fielded by Lancin g for

many years. Only three had any previous experience of this level of crick et and

towards the end of the season the side contained one fourteen year old and

several who were barely sixteen! At least the outlook is very promising a nd the

experience gained invaluable.

The batting rested mainly in the hands of D. Fuente (left-hand) who had as

good a season as most previous Lancing batsmen scoring over 450 runs and

M. Calvert-Lee who scored over 350. However, when Fuente and Calvert -I ee

were both dismissed the side was prone to catastrophic collapse as in the

matches against Eastbourne, Christ's Hospital, Charterhouse and Tonbridge.

On other occasions, when set runs against the clock, the batting lacked the

know-how to chase runs effectively. An older side might have made more out

# FRIENDS OF LANCING CHAPEL

While superficially the year may seem to have been one of relative inactivity, even of anticlimax, after the stirring events of last year, the Committee has been as busy as ever and works are still going on. The return stalls have now had their canopies fitted and these now cover what seemed a rather stark west wall under the pulpitum. The remaining eight canopies for the side stalls are now nearly complete. The work is of outstanding quality and it is impossib

to distinguish what is new wood from what is the old restored. We can n

ow see more clearly how right it is that the stalls should be placed between the piers and not against the aisle walls, for this emphasises the collegiate nature of the building. All the chandeliers have been ordered at a cost of £500 each and subscriptions have been given for some of them. Two more will be hung in the near future and the rest will be installed in pairs as they are made over the course of the next two years.

The number of visitors to the chapel broke all records last year and receipts from the chapel boxes were over £3000. At the moment it looks

as if there may not be so many visitors this year because we are not so much

in the news. Some attractive handbills have been delivered to the majority of

hotels, libraries, tourist offices and so on in the neighbourhood, and these

are drawing in quite a lot of people who otherwise would not have visited us.

We are very sorry that Mrs. Kentell is retiring this year. She has acted as Verger for some time and she worked for the chapel for many years befor

that. She has been the perfect host for welcoming visitors and showing them

round and we shall miss her very much indeed. We wish her a long and happy

retirement. She has been helped by Mrs. Feist, who gives of her time not

only to showing visitors round but also to helping in other work for the chapel.

There are some changes in the Committee too. The Secretary is retiring from Lancing, and although he will continue to act as Secretary, Mr. RJ. Tomlinson will act as Assistant Secretary to deal with matters which need

attention at the school itself.

In regard to the activities of the Committee, our immediate concern is with the debt of some £30,000 which still hangs over us. It will be remembered

that this money was lent to us to enable us to complete the west end before

inflation overtook us; but it must all be paid back in the near future. Thus we

urgently need more subscriptions to cover it, and we also need to add to our

numbers to bring in more money. But, at the same time, the Committee h

been looking beyond the present problems because we still have available the

enthusiasm and expertise of our craftsmen; and we are also aware of further

rising costs. Thus, Mr. Dykes Bower has been asked to go ahead with the

designs for the east window of the Lady Chapel so that they will be ready

when the time comes to put the window in, perhaps when the present temporary glass finally disintegrates. Again, Mr. Cockburn, for the love of

it, has made all the architectural designs for the ante-chapel, and we are now initiating a feasibility study to consider whether the working drawings

should be made straight away and what would be the best method of tack

ling

the job. The cost of these operations should be considerably less now than in

a few years' time. But we are not losing sight of the priorities. There is much

to finish in the building as it now stands. These are such things as comple ting

the lighting scheme, plastering unfinished walls in the crypt aisle, going ahead

with the glazing of aisle windows as it becomes possible to do them, and installing new paving where necessary.

# ENDOWMENT AND DEVELOPMENT APPEALS

The Development Appeal has now collected £79,000 and approximatel y £23,000

should be received over the next three years. There is now an almost continuous

programme of development at Lancing and much new work is at or beyon d the

planning stage, including a swimming pool, extension eastwards of the n ew block,

modernisation of the groves and a theatre.

Whilst some of these new developments can be funded by the school the

Development Appeal still has an important part to play in helping to finance the

work and has therefore been extended to seek support from the parents of boys

now at Lancing with the object of providing a new swimming pool.

The Endowment Appeal has now reached A£100,000 with most of the capital

on interest-free medium term loan to the school against termly repaymen ts. The

appeal was launched over 20 years ago and all but a few of the renewed

deeds of covenant are now expired. The Appeal Committee, in considering the Endowment Appeal in relation to the Development Appeal decided that the objective had been met and it would no longer seek renewal of expiri

ng deeds of covenant. Administration of the Endowment Fund has therefore

been handed over to the Bursar and the committee would like to express

its thanks to the many OLs and other friends of the school who have contribut-

ed so generously to the appeal since 1959.
