DEVELOPING POLITICAL PARTIES OVERSEAS

Abstract

This talk examines how the Westminster Foundation for Democracy promotes the development of political parties overseas. The rationale for WFD's engagement with political organisations arises from the reasons for the establishment of the Foundation in 1992. Whilst support to political parties is only one of WFD's areas of work, it is a key and distinctive area. The talk explores how WFD works with British political parties represented in the House of Commons to develop political parties overseas.

The rationale for developing overseas political parties is examined. Whilst active political parties are not, of themselves, guarantors of democracy, a democracy cannot function without them. The existence of vibrant and diverse political organisations is an important indicator of a healthy democracy. WFD's work aims to ensure that political parties are not only effective in vote gathering, but that they themselves behave in a democratic way and that they function effectively and responsibly in both opposition and Government.

A brief overview of the characteristic features of the party political scene overseas leads to a discussion of the type of interventions undertaken by WFD to develop the capacity of political parties by giving them the 'tools' which will enable them to grow and develop independently of external support. Examples will be given of WFD's method of working, including training, consultancy and advice and how work is undertaken, both with individual parties, and on a cross-party basis. WFD's extensive non-political party work ensures that an holistic approach is taken to developing the capacity of individuals and organisations to participate in and promote the democratic process.
