Johannes Maswangany was born in Msengi Village, Gazankulu, South Africa, in 1949.

He trained under his father who carved wooden spoons, dishes and jsuri for crushing mai ze.

In 1965 Johannes started carving on his own, making Nyamisoro (Sangoma dolls), spoons, dishes and musical instruments such as timbila and xipendini.

After working for 10 months in a brick factory in 1969, he returned to Msengi to continue

carving. His work was sold in Giyani, Zaneen and Duiwelskloof. Eventually there develop ed

a demand for his Nyamisoro amongst Sangomas in Soweto. In 1984 his work was represented

on the BMW Tributaries exhibition which began in Johannesburg and thereafter toured West Germany. This was the first time in his carreer that his work was exhibited in a gallery. Since then he has participated in group exhibitions at the Goodman Gallery and FUBA Gallery, and his work toured with the Bozz Art show to Durban, Cape Town and the Market Gallery.

Johannes's subject matter includes musicians (such as Peter Tosh and Bob Marley) ,boxer s, animals (dogs, snakes and birds), biblical figures (such as Cain and Abel and Moses)

and historical figures (such as Chaka). Johannes works chiefly in marula, hard-core

and kiaat woods. Sometimes he paints the entire sculpture, or combines the paint and natural wood, or retains the natural finish entirely.

John Muafangejo was born in Ovamboland, SWA/Namibia in 1948. He studied at Rorke's Drif t

in Natal and worked at painting, Sculpture and graphic art, but excelled at: linocuts,. executed in stark contrasts of dark and light and filled with "primitive" narrative imagery in the manner which has become associated with the Rorke's Drift school.

Later, he began to develop a more assured personal style. He taught in Oshikango, Namib

and subsequently has been represented in many group exhibitions, including 1969: Contemporary African Art, Camden Art Centre, London.;
