Out of the open horrer and hidden wonder that is Johannesburg, that is South Africa, ca me African music and

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BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

SYDNEY KUMALO was bern in South Africa in 1936. He studied at the Polly Street Art Centre, Johannesburg. He has had numerous exhibitions in South Africa and is now one af the leading sculptors there.

LOUIS MAOQHUBELA was barn in Durban in 1939. He studied af the Polly Street Contre under Cecil Skctnes irom 1957 onwards. He has recently completed six murals for the Jubilee Social Centre in Johannesburg. In 1959 he won second prize in the Rembrandt Competition. He has exhibited at the Adler Fielding Galleries. Johannesburg since 7952.

EPHRAIM NGATANE was born in 1938 in Basutoland. His family moved to Johannesburg in 1942. He attended the Rooke Memorial School where he first became interested in painiing. He later went to the Orlando High School. In 1952 he went to the Polly Street Centre of Art and studied under Cecil Skotnes. He has exhibited in the Adler Fielding Galleries Artists of Fame and Promise Exhibition since 1960, and has had numerous one-mar

shows in Johannesburg, Cape Town and other cities in South Africa. He is also 3 jazz musician and has his own hand.

ANDREW MOTJUOADI was born in a tribal area in Northern Transvaal in 1935. but has lived im the Mamelodi area since he was two yeers old. His drawings have appeared \prime m the

Adler Fielding Galleries Artists of Fame and Premise Exhibitions since 1963. He was commissioned last year to do drawings for the Cornel Wilde film \hat{a} 200\234 The Naked Pre y". Several

articles have appeared shout Motjuoadi, notably one by Julian Beinart in the magazine * Classic $\hat{a} \geq 0.234$.

LUCAS SITHOLE was originally a house painter. He is not prolific but a number of South African Collectors such as Mrs. Harry Oppenheimer and the Schlesinger Organisation have bought his work. He has shown on a number of occasions in the Artisis of Fare and Pramise Exhibition and various mixed exhibitions at the Adler Fielding Galleries.

GERARD SEKOTO wes born at a mission station \tilde{n} Oar Middlebure, Transvaal in 1973. He is a self-taught artist of the Pedi people. He was trained as a teacher and taught for a jew

 \hat{A} ¥ears before becoming a professional artist. He has had several one-sian shows in Sout

Africa and is probably one of the best known African painters. His works hang in The Jchannesburg Art Gallery. He is now painting in Paris where he has been far 2 number of years. 7
