New Civic ... arts for all

WHEN the new Civic
Theatre opens in
September, it will give the
city of Johannesburg an
entertainment and cultural
complex of international
stature.

The theatre will be launched with the prime objective of being accessible, a place which "belongs" to all of the people of Johannesburg and its environs. As a vibrant new cultural force in the city, the spirit of the new Civic is reflected in its line-up of inaugural productions designed to appeal on all levels.


The new Civic, which is being compared to the Barbican in London and the Lincoln Centre in New York. comprises four performance venues, fovers and state-ofthe-art stage facilities in which a host of activities will be presented. The Civic will host anything from dance theatre, a Broadway musical, opera, ballet, pantomime, educational programmes for youth and workshop theatre to cabaret. exhibitions and product launches.

After five years in the dark, the controversial R132-million complex will show its new face to the world in September and will, it is hoped, live up to that part of its mission which says it will "provide worthy servants for the performing arts".

Civic executive director
Micheal Grobbelaar and the
Board of Governors of the
Johannesburg Civic Theatre
Association have given their
assurance that the new
Civic will be fully
representative with
participation by the widest
spectrum of the community.
To this end, a Joint Working
Group (JWG) has been
formed representing various

performing arts organizers, among them Christopher Till (Johannesburg's Director of Culture), members of the Board of Governors.



Main auditorium

The showpiece of the theatre is undoubtedly the main auditorium, which retains its original shape out front, but has been entirely refurbished and can seat 985 or 1, 085 people, depending on the posititioning of the orchestra pit, which has been redesigned to accommodate 100 musicians. For acoustic reasons the ceiling has been raised by 3m. A specially commissioned work by acclaimed Ndebele





including Cecil Bass (chairman of the Recreation and Culture Committee), and representatives of PAWE (Performing Arts Workers' Equity), SAMA (South African Musician's Alliance) ACAC (Association of Community Arts Centres (ACAC) and Dorkay House. The JWG will formulate a view on the role and position artist Ester Mahlangu forms
the fire curtain in front of the
stage, creating a visual
focus from the auditorium.
The combined stage area is
the size of half a rugby field
and is at least as high as a
10-storey building.
Everything is fully
mechanised and computercontrolled, enabling all
scene changes to be
directed at the touch of a
button from a control panel
11m above the stage.

Restaurants

A "five star" restaurant overlooking the city, a buffet and a light refreshment venue — open day and night — are being planned.

Function rooms

Five quality function rooms cum VIP dining rooms are being sold on a "timeshare" basis to the corporate sector. **Dressing rooms**

There are eight "star" dressing rooms, five of which have en suite facilities (the big names require this!) and an additional eight dressing rooms catering for 160 artists.

The Tesson Theatre
This theatre, with its
own entrance and
foyer, seats
approximately 200 and
boasts a sprung-floor
for ballet or modern
dance productions on a
smaller scale. It can
double as space for
theatre-in-the-round,
supper theatre,
experimental theatre or
a rehearsal venue.

Pieter Roos Theatre
This venue has been
upgraded into a
performance venue for
cabaret and drama,
seating about 120.

Youth Theatre
This little theatre, which seats 160, is the most versatile of all. Together with its adjacent studio, it can be used for puppet theatre, chamber music, cabaret and children's shows. Its presence reflects the commitment of the Theatre's management to providing facilities for youth and developing audiences of the future.
