TREHOLT GRANTED CLEMENCY

Convicted spy Arne Treholt was granted clemency by the King-in-Council on 3 July. He had appealed for clemency on 19 June and heard on 1 July that his application would be successful. He has served 8 1/2 years of the 20-year sentence imposed on him in 1984 for passing information to the then Soviet Union. With maximum remission Treholt could have been

Vreleased on parole in 18 months. He had failed in several previous applications for release.

Justice Minister Kari Gjesteby says that the Government took the view that the ending of the

Cold War meant that Treholt's health assumed decisive importance in the decision and that he

had served a further 6 months since his last application was turned down. She explains th at

the decision was taken in the light of all the circumstances of Treholt's case and that h is

wife's suicide 5 weeks ago was taken into consideration only to the extent that it had affected Treholtls own health. VG revealed over the weekend that at least half of the mem bers

of the Starting had put their signatures to a letter to Ms Gjesteby urging her to agree t \circ

Treholt's release and threatening that the weight of Storting opinion would be made public if

she did not. VG suggests that this may have been the reason for the exceptional rapidity of

the decision. All parties think the decision a good one except for the Progress Party's representative on the Justice Committee and the Young Conservatives, who think it a concession
