EDITORIAL

The past few months from December '86 served as torch lights for our advance to people-s power, closing the past year with the historical celebrations of the 25th Anniversary of the formation of UMkhonto we Sizwe, the people's army, and opening the year with the marking of the 75th Anniversary of the formation of the ANC in 1912. What does this mean to the general membership of the organisation nothing more or less, but high morale, morale superiority over the enemy.

NEWS SOUTH AFRICA AND THE WORLD

Archbishop Desmond Tutu said in Lusaka that although he had always denounced violence, if attempts to use non-violence fail "then you have to use something else and that time violence becomes justified."

Speaking after talks with the leaders of the African National Congress, Tutu said he was hopeful of peaceful settlement of the problem in South Africa, saying "that is why we have

been pressing for sanctions." The Archbishop held talks with President Kenneth Kaunda during which he briefed him on his talks with the ANC leadership led by Cde President O.R. Tambo.

President Kaunda hailed Archbishop Tutu for his efforts in seeking a peaceful settlement to the problem in South Africa. He told the bishop that the ANC and its leaders, including the jailed ones, stood for non-violence but that the liberation movement had been forced to take up arms because of the oppressive nature of the racist regime.

Escalation of armed struggle

Cde President Tambo has said that the armed struggle was forced on the ANC and that it constantly reviewed its policy.

Speaking in Lusaka with Archbishop Tutu, Cde President reaffirmed that the armed struggle would go on as it was the only way to a democratic solution in South Africa. For a negotiated settlement the ANC demands the release of Cde Nelson Mandela and other political prisoners and the lifting of the ban on the organisation.

In appreciation of the ANC position, Tutu said, "These are not blood thirsty vampires but people who love South Africa...it saddens me that in this country are not given the opportunity to encounter the ANC as they really are."

ANC on the turf

Cde Lindiwe Mabuza, the Chief Representative in Sweden, has recently been taking interest in the race course. The reason is that the ANC has a half share in a Scandinavian racehorse.....No the ANC did not buy the share.

The half-share was donated to the children of South Africa, care of the ANC, by a Swedish computer expert Bengt Nordenbrand. Nordenbrand had been outraged by television coverage of the State of Emergency and the terrible toll being taken by the children, whose spirit he admires tremendously.

Cde Mabuza contacted the ANC Head Quarters in Lusaka for the "okay" to accept the somewhat unusual donation and it came. Appropriately the horse is called, Never Despair.

Never Despair winnings are forwarded to the ANC school at Mazimbu in Tanzania, SOMAFCO.

Nordenbrand who Cde Mabuza describes as "warm" and "amusing" pays all the stabling and training fees. Never Despair is not yet racing in ANC colours, Black, Green and Gold. "But we are working on it," says Cde Mabuza. Until then Never Despair's present colours are red stars on a white background - will suffice.

Betting stakes for ANC

The owner of Never Despair, a racing horse yesterday left Mazimbu after a brief stop over on his working visit in the complex. Bengt Nordenbrand, a Swedish computer specialist held talks with the Chief Administrator, Cde T. Maseko, Head of the Treasury Department, Cde V. Khaya and the Head of Projects, Cde T. Kotsoe, on the possibility of computerising our departments.

Cde Nordenbrand told News & Views that Never Despair is presently recuperating from a fracture and is undergoing physiotherapy exercises in a swimming pool. Last year Never Despair won a first place win in a prestigious Derby in Sweden and has so far ran seven races with one win, third and fifth places. Never Despair is rated among the best horses in the Scandinavian countries and is in the top ten, he said.

The fighting horse earned its name from a story by an American author who loved horses and eventually bought one to raise funds for her lame daughter's medical treatment and its jockey named the horse Never Despair. It is expected that Never Despair shall take on the turf at the beginning of May after a full recovery. Plans are underway to have this gallant steed competing in the Royal Ascot in June in England. Cde Bengt musingly added that he would want the prize of the Ascot, should we win, be received by Cde Leader Nelson Mandela. He added that this venture is for the children of South Africa who defiantly face that enemy in everyday of their lives.

Purifying the Nats Mouthpiece-SABC
SABC officials yesterday asked their chief radio news sub-editor Mauritz Moolman to resign shortly after he was chosen as the PFP candidate in Maraisburg.

Norway's oil ban in force.

The Norwegian Government has adopted several economic boycott measures against the South African regime and the Namibian SA-backed Namibian regime.

In a statement issued in Dar es Salaam by the Norwegian Embassy the act was aimed at increasing international pressure on South Africa to abolish apartheid.

The Norwegian Act on economic boycott against South Africa and the regime in Namibia, which was presented to parliament on November 14, last year, came into force last Friday. Provisions of the Act which will take effect on July 20, include a general ban on imports into Norway of goods originating in SA and Namibia and exports of goods from Norway to the two countries.

The ban includes transportation of passengers or cargo to or from South Africa or Namibia by Norwegian aircraft and the transportation of passengers or cargo into Norway by South African or Namibian aircraft. The statement pointed out that the Norwegian Government "sees an economic boycott of South Africa and Namibia as one of several instruments to dismantle apartheid. Norway attaches great importance to positive measures in the form of humanitarian assistance to the Black population in South Africa and Namibia and assistance to the neighbouring countries.

"The Government intends to increase this form of assistance in the time to come," the statement asserted.

Zimbabwean Information Minister, Shimuyarira, has called on Zimbabweans journalists to join the government in its effort to make the world aware of the importance of sanctions against South Africa.

In a written speech, he told delegates to the first annual general meeting of Zimbabwean journalists on Saturday that only sanctions can weaken the SA regime.

Our role in exposing South Africa's evils will go a long way in convincing those governments which keep the regime going that they are on the wrong track, the minister said.

Warm welcome for Cde Nujoma in Peru

The leader of SWAPO, Cde President Sam Nujoma met Peruvian President Alan Garcia last Thursday and announced that SWAPO would open an embassy in Lima.

Cde President Nujoma received a warm welcome at the presidential palace. He received the presidential Guard and walked up a red carpet into the building where he was greeted by President Garcia.

President Nujoma and Garcia talked privately for about an hour before Cde President Nujoma emerged to tell the reporters that he had thanked the Peruvian leader for his efforts to aid the cause of liberation in Namibia.

FLASHES THROUGH MY PEEH-HOLE

In Rome, Cde Leader Nelson Mandela and the Archbishop of South African Anglican Church Desmond Tutu, were made honorary citizens of the Italian town of Florence on Monday.

In a letter of thanks, Nobel Peace Prize Winner Desmond Tutu said the award meant condemnation of apartheid and for the struggle of the people of South Africa for freedom and justice.

Ossewa's last trek

In Johannesburg, racist South African President P. W. Botha hit the "election trail."

The 71 year old fascist travelled to the Northern country town of Lichtenburg to make his first speech in a "Whites Only" election battle.

Anglican Bishop D. Tutu who is a strong critic of Botha said this week the racist

president must be wondering whether he was wise to go to the polls.

In Johannesburg, a Black shop owner was beaten to death with a spade in the latest eruption of violence in troubled Black townships. There has been an upsurge of protests in Durban area townships with repeated clashes between our death defying people and the Inkatha collaborators.

Last week seven pupils were hacked to death by the Inkatha blood mongers and shot dead in the township of Kwamashu.

At the weekend police fired teargas and birdshots into a crowd of about 1 000 in Clermont. No casualties were reported.

A stabbed and burnt body of a Bantu collaborator constable was found in Port Elizabeth township, KwaZakhele, the Bureau for Misinformation said.

The Bureau said "according to reports received, collaborator Ungise Mbana and a friend were apparently on their way to deliver a death notice when they were attacked by approximately 25 Black youth." The friend managed to escape. UPI reports that at least 57 policemen five of them White, have been killed since September 1984.

There have been Skorpion attacks in Soweto in the past month and the police cannot establish whether the same weapon had been used in two separate incidents where two men are said to have died. Police are offering R1 000 reward for information leading to the arrest of members of the Skorpion Gang as the members are not known.

Political violence claimed 39 lives during the month of February, bringing the total to 2 365 since September 1984. This makes the average daily fatality rate 2.68 since the unrest began, according to the Institute of Race Relations.

South Africa:
Several hundreds of people in Soweto township of Johannesburg, have demonstrated in protest against forced eviction of the residents, for not paying rent. According to the latest report in the last two months more than ten families were evicted from their homes.

Harare:
Prime Minister Robert Mugabe of Zimbabwe has voiced concern over the escalation of conflicts involving many states of the Non-Alligned movement. Speaking in an interview Mr Mugabe who is also the chairman of the non-aligned movement, called for the end of conflicts between Iran and Iraq and also called for peace in Afghanistan, the Middle

East, Kampuchea, the Mediteranean and Central America. He called on the international community to exert greater pressure on racist SA to abandon apartheid. Mr Mugabe also expressed concern over the decision by the US to provide the South African backed UNITA bandits in Angola with sophisticated weapons to destabilize the country.

Lusaka:

The Zambian Leader Dr K Kaunda has appealed to African countries to send more troops to Mozambique to assist in fighting South African backed bandits of the MNR. Addressing a meeting in Ghana, President Kaunda said only Mozambique and Tanzania have so far committed forces to help Mozambique to take on the bandits.

He also said that the armed struggle has succeeded in Angola, Mozambique, and Zimbabwe and it would succeed in South Africa.

Nairobi:

The African Hockey Federation, (AHF) has resolved to expel South Africa from the international Hockey Federation as a move to combat racism and apartheid in that country. The AHF president, Raefat Mohammed of Egypt said Africa succeeded last month at the AHF Congress to block SA from being elected into the federation's Council and presently they want the boers expelled from the International Hockey Federation.

Latest News

The UDF patron and active opponent of the apartheid regime, the Rev. Allan Boesak told White South African students that they should not be forced to die on the borders and to kill black children in the townships. Rev. Boesak was addressing 2 000 students in the Cape Town University at a meeting called by the End Conscription Campaign. Opposition against military conscription has increased since 1984 when many young whites were deployed in the townships to maintain the so called law and order.

A young South African who was detained under the country's infamous state of emergency has "committed suicide".

Police statement allege that the 20 year old man, Benedict Mashuki, hanged himself with a shirt in a prison

cell in Eastern Transvaal. Earlier this week two other young black activists were said to have "committed suicide" in separate incidents.

London:

The London Newspaper, "The Independent" has reported that US arms supplies to UNITA terrorists in Angola reach the bandits through South Africa. It said the arms are being flown to Johannesburg via Honduras. The paper said arrangements were made for the transportation of the arms to UNITA as early as November last year. This is violation of arms embargo against South Africa.

Tel Aviv:

The Israel Foreign Minister has been having talks with the South African Opposition leader, Collin Eglin. The minister has explained his country's decision to reduce ties with racist South Africa. He said that the decision was taken because there could not be a compromise on many issues.
