The African National Congress' military wing. Umkhonto we
Sizwe's stockpiling of arms in Angola contravenes agreements
signed between the South African government and the ANC. a
South African Defence Force spokesman said on Friday.

"These statements stipulate that the ANC was to have ceased recruiting
people for MK as well as the mining of MK personnel."

The spokesman said in a statement to Sepe that it was surprising the
ANC denied the issue of what they intended to do about these
weapons "not being in the public interest",
Weapons similar to the types stored in Angola by MK were being
used in South Africa against innocent people. Serious crimes were
being committed by people using AKAs and light rifles.

The attempt to compute the SADF with MK was unrealistic
because:

-- the SADF does not stockpile weapons and equipment in other
countries

-- the SADF does not rely on foreign funding;

-- the SADF is constituted in terms of an Act of Parliament;

-- the SADF is subject to parliamentary control;

-- the SADF is subject to the law of the country; and

-- the SADF is not the military instrument of a particular political
party or liberation movement.

60 ANC Members Arrested At Funeral Vigil

JOHANNESBURG July 13 Sept

Police allegedly arrested 60 African National Congress activists in a swoop on the Voeloonu home of a member at the ANC's combat wing; who died in convenient circumstances last week.

Mt Vuyeni Mpotu, secretary of the ANC local branch, said the group of mainly youth leaders were foot-loose; at the home of Mr George Muhele when police arrived and started beating them.

Police spokesman Col Fun: Metherhe said he had no information on the incident but was checking the report and would respond later.

Earlier, ANC regional spokesman Rennie Munoepe said the funeral vigil had been underway when the police took action. But Mt Mpotu later denied this.

Mt Mpotu said during the alleged police action the home of Mt Muhele, who died on Tuesday last week, was ransacked.

"Everything is upside down," he said, adding police had cordoned off the house and mistreated the 60 youths.

Police said last week Mr Muhele had been linked to an attack on a local councillor's home in Voeloonu. They said he died when a handgrenade he was apparently preparing to throw hit the police at his home to meet him blew up.

The ANC he denied this, saying police had opened the killing the wrong end of the stick.

Mt Munoepe said twelve people seriously injured during the police raid on Sunday night had been admitted to the Bokebu-Beneni hospital for treatment.

"We demand an explanation why the police acted in this particular fashion, particularly in the light of recommendations of international experts at the Goldstone Commission," he said.

A panel of international experts last week recommended police restraint in dealing with violence by banning the use of .38 Smith & Wesson pistols.

Two Killed In Night Attack

DURBAN July 11 Sept

Two people were shot dead and six wounded in an attack at Krwkoku near Greytown, in the Natal Midlands, on Sunday morning. Pietennuit; SA Police liaison officer Capt Henry Badman, confirmed.

A group of six and some friends had stemmed from Jhemteehur where they had fetched the body of a relative killed on the road. When they were attacked by the group met with AK-47 rifles and nine millimetre pistols. They were transported; the body to Thulmi received.

Speaking at the Confederation of Zimbabwe Industries congress, the director of the Johannesburg Institute for African Studies. Eugene Nyeti said that the country was entering into "cut-throat" trade deals with other countries in the region to isolate Zimbabwe. The Zim news agency reported on Friday.

He said South Africa wanted to humiliate President (Robert) Mugabe for his principled stand on apartheid. He said that South Africa had managed to enter into all kinds of cut-throat deals behind Zimbabwe's back.

Zimbabwe and South Africa government officials are negotiating to renew the 1964 trade agreement to eliminate trade barriers between the two countries.

Local industrialists worried at the move of negotiations and Pretoria's imposition of terms suited Zimbabwean "old" textile mills. They urged the government to speed up a new deal more favourable to the textile industry.

They fear Zimbabwe. South Africa's new attitude may mean that it could lose its traditional market to other African countries which have already included wetland areas.

Comedian; that Zimbabwe could not "buy" from South Africa: must end the opportunity to the country. Mr Nyeti said when it came to a choice between its economic survival through trade, he did not support the liberation movements. He should go for trade.

"Where you are forced to choose... (or your survival, maybe in the short term. I would rather you chose you: survival because it's extremely important for ours."

South Africa's foreign policy was to dominate the region through unequal trade arrangements, creating the basis for further economic destabilisation. Mr Nyeti elaborated.

He singled out recent trade agreements between Zambia and South Africa, describing Lunken's new policy towards Pretoria as unhelpful.

He said Zimbabwe should negotiate an arrangement which would reciprocate the elimination of duties, and the removal of visa requirements.

Zimbabwean companies should use the time during the implementation of economic restructuring to develop a competitive edge with South African companies so that they would stand their own when there was no more government protection. Mr Nyeti added.

Contradictory View: On SA Political Developments

ROBERTA FALLS July to sum

Two South Africans presented contradicting assessments of the country's political development at the Confederation of Zimbabwe Industries conference on Friday.

South African intellectual Colin Hall said he was optimistic that a just and equitable political solution would be found "quite soon" in the violence-ridden country.

Mr Hall said his optimism stemmed from the demise of communism which left the country with no option but to establish a democracy when minorities were repressed and protected. In spite of the "rude rhetoric and public peevishness" by the latter players in the negotiation process, they had a deep affection and respect for one another, he added.

Institute for African Studies director Eugene Nyoni presented a sharply different view that the South African government wanted to share power without giving away power.

He said President F W de Klerk's policy meant "nothing to do with love for the black people". A

Mr Nyoni said he was upset by the latter's hypocrisy.

"They emitted a loud lament about Lech Welele when that country's government moved towards democratic, free market change and yet showered (Mr) de Klerk, not the liberation movements, with praise when he was elected, by unethically to ineluctable political reform."

Asked about the possible outcome of the impasse in talks between the government and the African National Congress (ANC), Mr Nyoni said the ANC would resume talks without their demands being met.

Mr Nyeti said Mr de Klerk might meet only 30 per cent of the ANC's demands, which included the establishment of a new government and action to end township violence.

The liberation movement should have mobilised an indefinite stay-away by workers until Mr de Klerk blinked, he said, adding that the ANC lacked the necessary structure to do so, he added.

"The tragedy of the Convention for a Democratic South Africa (CODESA) is that the ANC and the Pan Africanist Congress have no leverage on the South African government because they misjudged the situation."

Mr Hall urged Zimbabwe not to wait for an equitable political settlement before finalising a favourable trade agreement with its neighbour.

"Competitors would get tired of Zimbabwe and take over its potential market," he said.
