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The newspaper quoted a United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR)

spokesperson as saying initial reports seemed to indicate that at least some of them took flight after

incidents of forced conscription by UNITA forces in the Cazombo area in Angola's Mexico

Province. However, a source at Jesuits Refugee Services in Lusaka has indicated that the influx

of refugees was as a result of heavy bombing by the Angolan government forces on UNITA controlled Cazombo in eastern Angola.

The refugees will be transferred to Maheba refugee settlement in Zambia, which presently accommodates 28 200 refugees of which 24 700 originated from Angola. Zambia's Home Affairs Minister, Mr Katele KALUMBA, said on 15 November that there are now 65 000 refugees in Zambia.

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
