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ANC Speaker's Guidelines for Freedom Day 27 April 1997

Introduction

April 27 was immortalised in South African history, when in 1994 all South Africans, both black and white, went for the first time to the polling stations and voted for the organisation of their choice. The overwhelming majority of people voted for the ANC, because the ANC was and still remains the only organisation that is able to take this country forward and create a better life for all its citizens.

It was on April 27 that we proclaimed our freedom to the world. It was on that day that we demolished one of the cornerstones of apartheid and with pride claimed our South Africanness.

Our new constitution has given April 27 formal status as a public holiday and this day has been baptised as Freedom Day.

The importance of April 27

Freedom can only be known and measured if we have ever lived in a state of unfreedom - or in a state of not being free. Gaining our freedom is therefore a victory that must never be taken for granted.

We must love and embrace our freedom and fight always to maintain it through invoking the memory of what it was like not to be free. We must teach our children and our grandchildren of that past so they too can understand the significance of the day when we became free citizens of one united country.

We must remember those heroes who lived and died so that we could be free. We must remember Dr. Xuma, Moses Kotane, Yusuf Dadoo. We must remember Ruth First, Chris Hani and Lillian Ngoyi. We must remember Mathew Goniwe, Solomon Mahlangu and Joe Slovo. We must remember with pride the fallen heroes of our struggle. Let their memory serve always to move us forward.

What we have achieved - a foundation has been laid

But political freedom is not all that we have fought for. We have fought for the reconstruction and development of our country's economy. Our struggle is to ensure that the basic needs of our people are met.

We have come a long way in achieving our goals. In the last three years since the ANC assumed the reigns of government, a strong foundation has been laid to democratise our country in all its spheres.

We cannot question the gains that have been made - from the creation of our new constitution, through the food security and nutrition programmes, to the provision of electricity, water and housing to a large number of people previously dispossessed. Today, marking the third year of our freedom, let us reassert our commitment to freedom and to the building of a strong, solid, united and free South Africa.

Additional notes from President Mandela's opening of Parliament speech

- To improve the food security and nutrition of at least the most indigent of the
 population, projects which amount to R400 million and reaching over a million people
 were undertaken last year. The Primary School Nutrition Programme now benefits
 more than 3 million children. Programmes to develop new farming entrepreneurs, to
 return land to communities and resettle others, and to start tenure reform are starting
 to change the face of our countryside.
- Over 700 000 people have already been supplied with water, and projects are under way which will affect over six million citizens.
- After two years of preparing the ground, the national housing policy is now fully operational. Today, more houses are in production than at any other time in South Africa's history. Millions now enjoy the benefits of electricity.
- Arguably; nowhere else is the fact of democratic transformation felt more keenly than
 in the area of universal access to health facilities. The building of clinics and hospitals,
 the immunisation programme and the beginnings of a new drugs policy all these and
 more are practical and new qualitative steps that have transformed the majority of
 South Africans from being neglected outcasts into beneficiaries of a compassionate
 health policy.
- For the first time in South Africa's history, citizens are starting to benefit from
 integrated human resource development represented by a non-racial education system,
 life skills training, financial support to students in tertiary institutions, supply side
 measures in industry to promote training and a sports programme based not only on
 the promotion of healthy life styles, but also on constructing facilities in areas that
 were hitherto neglected.
- With the estimated three percent growth in the economy last year, the South African economy has turned the corner towards consistent expansion.
- There are many mega projects with investments of more than half a billion rand each.
 There has been a phenomenal growth in fixed investments and improved capacity utilisation in industry.
