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sighted to abandon all existing external projects because the process of negotiations could be protracted and there could be a dramatic reversal in the white power structure in South Africa. The latter would affect legal oppositional work and necessitate once more external facilities for struggle. It is not yet absolutely clear that the historical changes in South Africa are irreversible. The movement, therefore, considers it necessary to continue to bear responsibility for its membership, particularly with regard to training and development. The continuing education crisis caused by Bantu Education and the high unemployment in South Africa increases this responsibility. Thus projects such as SUMAFCD and the Dakawa Development Centre should remain operational, for some years to come. It is possible to provide education and skills training externally for 1500 out of school youth from South Africa.

Most donors including our traditional supporters have already
indicated that they wish to provide assistance within the country
and not outside, particularly as regards capital investment. Their
This creates a dilemma for us because ANC Departments (except
DAC and NW8) are not yet in a position to be definitive about what
projects they will wish to set up in South Africa In spite of two
memoranda to departments there have been no responses from
departments

A H8 was being manned for
late July; in Johannesburg, with the participation of about 100
ANC, MDH and other people concerned with Projects.
