Mr PW Bothaâ\200\231s visit to Europe and | conscientious objection in South Africa were among the wide-ranging issues discussed by Bishop Desmond Tutu, the South African Council of Churches (SACC) general secretary, in his annual report to the national conference yesterday.â\200\231

Bishop Tutu, who called on Zimbabwean Prime Minister Mr Robert Mugabe to release detained Bishop Abel Muzorewa, who has been in custody since November last year, also outlined the councilâ\200\231s response to the Eloff Commission of Inquiry into the SACC.

The Commission $\hat{a}\200\234$ did not boast a single professional theologian in its membership and could therefore not be expected to pass fair judgment on an organisation whose very reason for existence is theological, from beginning to end $\hat{a}\200\235$, he maintained.:

The SACC had not declared apartheid to be wholly immoral and unbiblical because of ailegiance to any i political ideology, but rather because it was impelled to do so by the teachings

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of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. . Questioning the morality of the US invasion of Grenada, asked: $\hat{a}\200\234$ In what way is this invasion different from the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan? $\hat{a}\200\235$. Bishop Tutu went on fo say there was an oversupply of food in some parts of the world but the market could not be glutted because this would cause prices to drop. .

And 450 million in the world are starving, â\200\235 Bishop Tutu said.

 $\hat{a}\200\234$ We must, as churches, insist on the right to conscientious objection to participate in war and therefore ask the authorities to provide alternative forms of national service which need not be less demanding in effort and courage than military service, $\hat{a}\200\235$ Bishop Tutu said.

Referring to the Prime Minister's recent visit to Europe, Bishop Tutu said Mr Botha had scored a victory when he was able to visit so many heads of government in Europe and to secure an audience with the Pope. However, this was â\200\234a slap in the face for the victims of apartheidâ\200\235.
