THE South African government has decided to introduce a multi-entry visa for one year ~ for businessmen with effect from June 1, the South African Trade Commissioner to Zimâ\200\230babwe, Mr Nic Nel, said at the ZNCC con-* gress here. a Mr Nel said this would replace the single entry visa valid for three months, and would reduce the waiting period for Zimbabwean businessmen intending to visit South Africa.
