THE clash between young black radicals and Chief Gatzha Buthelezi at Robert Sobukwe's funeral on Saturday has been described as a sign of the Government's success in dividing the blacks.

e Ftm

terday from Dr Francis Wilson of Cape Town University, one of several white-liberals at the funeral, who saw the chief's rejection. . :

Others were Dr Alan Paton, former president of the Liberal Party, and Mr Peter Brown, the party's former national chairman.

Dr Paton said: What happened puts the position of Inkatha and the new Inkatha Alliance, in question.

Chief Buthelezi is the president of Inkatha and the chairman of the newly-formed alliance between Inkatha, the Coloured Labour Party, and the Indian Reform Party.

Asked whether he considered the incident as a serious blow for Chief Buthelezi, Dr Paton replied:
