A.N,C. SCHOOL PROJECT SUB COMMITTEE.

ADMINSTRATION. '

Since the Morogoro school is an A.N.C. (S.A) project, it follows that its highest adminstrative authority is the National Executive C ommittee of the A.N.Q (S. 9, through the office of the Secretary General, whichhis located in Lusaka.

But Since the school, project is located in Morogoro, Tanzania, it is deSirable that a sub-oommittee whose members are in Tanzania, be contituted. Such a sub-committee must be directly responsible to the Secretary Generai. vaiously, the sub-committee must be composed of A.N.C. members or of individuals who understand, agree with and sgpport A.N.C policy and programmes. Such a sub-committee goes presently eXist, and its membersiare mrades Mengi Msimang, Dan. and mhdsell O'meare, Harold Wolfe, Bethukiletabudere, Eli Weinberg, W.K. KgotSisile, Patricia MaCcfadden and M.M. Mlonyani. '_

It must be stated that there is a need to expand the sub-committee, not only because some members, eg Harold Wolfe and Eli Weinberg may not always be available, but because more individuals make for better and efficient pooling of ideas. As such, the sub-committee should, wheneve; the need u arises, co-opt more members to its ranks. Concerning suggestionsoanq contributions from other quarters other than the suh-committee, it is also deSirable that these be forwarded to the above mentioned sub-committee. iAlso, the sub-committee hasAaexpresged a strong desire f0: a qualified pedagogue, to be apPOinted by the Secretary General, to Sit on the sub-committee.

At this stage, the sub-committee is charged with two tasks. Firstly, to plan, in conjuction with proffesional people (educationists, land surveys and architects) the setting up of the structures that are necessary to _ satisfy the functions and aims of the 80001, as envisaged by the directive from the Secretary General's office. In this connection, some progress has been made with the of ComredeDennis and a Norwegian land surveyor and tlgrchitects s;oonhed to the Ministry of National Education .1n Tanzania. With the help of these three, it is hoyed that very soon, it sheuld be possible to reLOmmenQ to the Secretary-General the planned phaSing of the buildings, as well as their estimated costs. .

Secoany, the sub-committee must recommend a curriculum that Wili serve the aims and asyirations of the school project. For the time being, Dan and L. O'meare, are co-operitind on this task. In this connection, it is perhaps pertinent to mention that the sub-committou should start Gosserning itself with the task of recruiting manepower for the school, reading material, teaching aids and so on.' L .

As for when the project is functional, an administrative structure Wlll be sot-up for the day-to-day running of the school. Whilst it is premature at this stage to go into oetails it is desirable that such a structure must include representatives of the Secretary-General, the teaching staff and last, but not least, the students themselves.
