
#### Announcements of plans for International Literacy Year

# Arab Region Prepares for ILY

OR THE YEARS 1989 and 1990, the Arab Regional Literacy Organization (ARLO) has provided concerned bodies in Arab States with a practical guide on planning informational and promotional work in the field of Literacy and Adult Education. By the end of the year 1989 a complete series of the Pan-Arab T.V. Literacy Programme: "An el -Awan" ("It is high time") will be produced and distributed to all Arab states. ARLO has also produced a pilot series of a T.V. programme for neo-literate women. These series are directed at literacy learners, the educated, policy-

general.

The main objective in creating public awareness is to develop an atmosphere of positive attitudes towards the problem of illiteracy as a cultural problem and the need to tackle and combat it. The target audiences are decision makers, the educated, the public at large as well as the learners themselves.

In addition, ARLO plans to produce prototype visual informational and promotional materials to help concerned bodies and associations in the Arab states design and produce their materials. Many Arab states have reported that they will hold large scale meetings, T.V. interviews and produce promotional materials for ILY. An ILY poster and handout have already been created and distributed as well as booklets, films, postage stamps, press releases and radio programmes.

# Soviet Union - United States "Space-bridge on literacy"

A proposal for a learner-to-learner live television hook-up via satellite was heard at the Media Colloquium which met in Paris in May, 1989.

Plans were made to investigate the possibility of satellite linkage between literacy groups in parts of

the United States with learners in the USSR in much the same way as peace groups have been doing for several years. Prof. Yegorov of the USSR State Committee for Television and Radio Broadcasting and James Duffy, President of Capital Cities ABC Television are leading the study.

# NATIONAL CONVENTION ON WOMEN AND LITERACY

The "All India Committee for the Eradication of Female Illiteracy" is holding a National Convention on Women and Literacy on August 10-11, 1989 in New Delhi in collaboration with the Ministry of Human Resource Development. The theme of the convention will be "Women, Literacy and Empowerment". The objectives are to evolve a concrete action programme in the field of women and literacy. It is hoped that this convention will strengthen the literacy structures for women in India.

# THE ONGOING DEBATE....

about literacy in the Arab Region began in the early seventies. It resulted in an Arab

concept of literacy and is based on the belief that: "the real illiteracy is the illiteracy of society as a whole. Illiteracy is the result and cause of social development." The issues at hand are the Arab concepts on illiteracy as well as the adopted approaches. ILY will be an opportunity for promoting a debate about literacy at the national level.

Beginning in 1989 through 1991 the Arab Regional Literacy Organization (ARLO) plans to stimulate debate on "Cultural Literacy" through:

- a symposium on the role of popular arts in the comprehensive confrontation of illiteracy
- a panel of experts on the state of NGOs active in adult education
- a seminar on the concepts of literacy and adult education
- a workshop for educationally concerned media people on the mobilization of public opinion as a means of solving the illiteracy problem

# Major Research Conference Planned for 1990

The Literacy Research Center of the University of Pennsylvania has announced plans to hold an international conference called "World Literacy in the Year 2000: Research and Policy Dimensions" October 4 - 7, 1990 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, USA.

The conference, which is by invitation only, is focused on narrowing the gap between literacy researchers and policy makers. Some 50 - 60 literacy researchers and policy makers will be invited and the proceedings will be published as a special issue of the *Annals of the American Academy of Political and Social Science*.

The themes are:

Global literacy for the year 2000: myths and realities

Information gaps between policy and research

Where and how to target literacy efforts

Linkages, collaboration and communication

Imagining literacy in the year 2000


# Big Push Needed for September 8

#### What are you doing?

- In Montreal, Canada learners are meeting at the City Hall to sign the official Visitor's Book. Montreal is also launching the Book Voyage Project in Quebec.
- In Japan the Unesco Learning Centres are holding a world conference which will allow representatives from the Centres to meet and produce an action plan for future work.
- In Leicestershire, England an exhibition of world-wide literacy materials is planned for September 8.
- In Toronto, Canada, a gala play on the subject of literacy is being launched as a fundraising event for a local literacy organization.

The International Task Force of Literacy (ITFL) is a coalition of regional and world-wide international non-governmental organizations to mobilize and stimulate activities of non-governmental organizations prior to, during and after the International Literacy Year 1990 (ILY).

#### TORONTO OFFICE

• The illiteracy problem's profile is being raised and general public awareness is growing rapidly. Many people are showing an interest in International Literacy Year and the Task Force. Last month the Toronto ITFL coordinating office received about 150 letters and more than 100 phone calls. We are getting not just general information requests but more and more specific inquiries/requests from a variety of organizations and individuals, such as requests for speakers/panels/support for conferences/workshops on literacy, inquiries on specific projects/activities in different parts of the world, inquiries on employment and volunteer opportunities and requests for ILY/ITFL publications.

#### S.A./INDIA OFFICE

- Plans are underway for the 5th ITFL meeting to be held October 2-7 in New Delhi. The two main objectives are: to finalize review of plans for 1990 and to highlight activities and plans in South Asia region. The Indian Prime Minister, H. E. Rajiv Gandhi, is expected to open the ITFL meeting.
- The most famous singer in India, Ms. Lata Mangeshkar, will do a charity concert for the literacy cause on October 2, 1989, in New Delhi.
- ILY was one of the issues of the Wardha Conference on "Making Literacy a People's Movement". Indira and Lalita were able to talk to some 60 NGO representatives on this occasion.
- In New Delhi a two-day workshop is being planned to bring together NGOs interested in the Book Voyage Project. The objective is to develop a common approach for encouraging learners in sharing of their thoughts and views. Letters have already been sent to a large number of NGOs across the country explaining the concept and requesting cooperation, participation and suggestions.
- The India office has been working with the med organizations in India to develop public awareness programmes. The "All India Radio" has broadcast three programmes on Literacy at the national level since April 1989. A TV report on literacy is now ready and it is hoped that the TV Broadcasting Authority, Doordarshan, will carry it as a regular insert.
