young women were actively involved throughout the year with a myriad of other tasks which indicated their loyalty and dedication to the School that nurtured and protected them.

Natalie has gone on to study Engineering at the University of the Witwatersrand; Christine is studying Actuarial Science at The University of Cape Town and Kerry-Ann and Deborah are also at UCT in the Faculty of Medicine. Vindana Chibabhai achieved 6 distinctions and was immediately accepted into Wits Medical
