- 1. Descrigtion of sub-Sector:
- A large number of South African children among those whose parents are engaged in the ANC in South Africa or those having lost their parents are obliged to ask asylum in neighbouring countries in Southern Africa. These young boys and girls are at different stages of their education and have to be admitted to different classes in the receiving schools. The educational authorities of the ANC have established speCial programmes for their schooling to meet their needs. Arrangements have been made with various primary and secondary schools in the 8 following countries: Kenya, Lesotho, Namibia, Mozambique, Swaziland, Tanzania, Uganda, Zambia and Zimbabwe.
- 2. African National Congress Strategies: the ANC is providing primary and secondary education facilities to those exiled children until conditions within South Africa have improved politically and socially to enable the children to find appropriate places in South African schools. It is assumed that this situation will be reached by the end of the project. It must be noted that presently the Bantu system of education which is limited in scope is still operative in Black South African schools. This is the reason behind the ANC decision to provide' education outside the country. Added to this is the fact that many of the Black South African schools are presently overcrowded.

 3. Institutional Framework: the countries mentioned above have agreed to receive the children in their schools under the
- 3. Institutional Framework: the countries mentioned above have agreed to receive the children in their schools under the same conditions enjoyed by the nationals. These conditions include school fees, transport arrangements, boarding school, meals etc...
- B. PROJECT JUSTIFICATION : -
- 1. The problem being addressed is related, to the education of the children of the ANC members most of whom were working outSide South Africa. Recently as a result of the new political situation, many ANC members have returned home. However schools conditions for Black pupils in South Africa still suffer from a number of defects. Classes are overcrowded and the Bantu education system still operates. Under this system the child is given a limited form of education in which certain subjects such as Mathematics and Science are omittea.
- 2. Expected end of the Qroject situation:
 The number of children who will benefit from the project is not expected to diminish until 1996 when it is hoped that the political and socio-economic Situation will be such as to enable the children to join South African schools at the level they have reached in the project schools outside the country. In principle the project will end in December, 1996.

3. Target benegiciazies :

The beneficiaries of the project will be South African children who require primary and secondary education. The total number of children will be approximatively 266 boys and girls enrolled in the Southern African neighbouring primary and secondary schools. Subject to request by the ANC, the number oft beneficiaries could be increased.

4. Project stgategy agg institutional arrangemegts:
The ANC education department is responsible for the selection and placement of the students in the various schools. The list of names together with the complete study grant forms are submitted to the executing agency.

Payment of the school fees is effected through the UNDP Office in the country. Yearly monitoring visits are made to the individual schools before the end of the academic year to assess the performance of the students in view of the progress report which is discussed during the tripartite review meeting.

5. Reese s for assista ce rom UND UNE CO :

The ANC being' a national liberation. movement has only limited resources. The neighbouring African countries which involved in the fight against Apartheid have always been ready to help the National Liberation Movement and have in this case agreed to receive the ANC students in their schools.

In the same context of assistance to a National Liberation Movement, funding is provided by UNDP until.such time as peace ful conditions will have been restored at the end of Apartheid in South Africa.

The project contributes to the development. of skilled manpower for the country after Apartheid.

UNESCO's assistance is given in the framework of its programme of aid to the African National Liberation Movement within its field of competence.

6. SQecial considegation :

The beneficiaries of the project are equally divided between boys and girls. The education thus provided to girls will be an important element to be taken into account when the role of these young people in future nation building is considered.

7) Co-ordination Agrangements

The project will be executed by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) in collaboration with the Organization of African Unity (OAU) under the responsibility of the ANC Dar es Salaam Department of 4

Education. The ANC Department of Education also liaises With the Government' of Tanzania and the neighbouring QEeteSt in the Southern region of Africa acting as hosts to ANC adherents. The UNESCO Education Adviser based in Dar es Salaam maintalns close liaison with the ANC and with the host countries' gevetnments and gives assistance in the monitoring and. backstspplng Of the: '3) pupils.

C) DEVELOEMENT OBJECTIVES :

The long term objective is to develop a gorps 0f well educated and trained cadres capable of filli\$5 respons1ble positions in the civic, administrative and managerial occupations without regard to race, colour or creed on return to their . country .

- 1. Immegigte Objectives

To support 266 primary and secondary school pupils placed in schools in Lesotho (13), Mozambique (18), Zembia (130): Tanzania (40), Zimbabwe (10), Swaziland (1), Namibia (2), Kenya (2) and Uganda (50). Please see Annex 1 for scn8015 where the pupils are enrolled.

Outputs :

- 1.1 The project will enable 266 ANC pupils in various schoels in Kenya, Lesotho, Namibia, Mozambique, SwazilQndr Tanzanla, Uganda, Zambia and Zimbabwe to continue with their primary endt secondary educations through 31 December 1996. the following . table shows the completion dates of the beneficziil'l-es (With the. exception of 60 pupils from Uganda and Zimbabwe):

Activities :

- 1. The ANC: THE ANC Department of education based in Dar es Salaam will be responsible for:
- collecting all the study grant forms ;
- endorsement of these forms to be sent to UNESCO's education adviser office in Dar es Salaam ;
- collecting the progress report of each students for their submission to the executing agency ;
- monitoring visit to each school where the ANC pupils are doing their studies.

The entire UNDP input will consist of allowances of schoolfees, transport, medical expenses, uniforms, book allowances for the 266 pupils for subsequent admission fo the period 1 July 1992 to 31 December 1996.

3. UN CO:

The UNESCO education adviser in Dar es Salaam will assist the ANC Department of education in the evaluation, monitoring visit and backstopping of the pupils.

F. RISK\$:

The risks involved in implementing the 1project. concern mainly the reduction in the number of beneficiaries due to dropouts and to repeated failures. Another factor - less serious this one - would be the case of pupils abandoning their studies in the. country of asylum to follow their parents returning to South Africa.

The regular monitoring exercise included in the project and progress reports should provide information about the trends as they occur and measures could be taken to minimize their effects.

G) PR;OR OBLIGATIONS AND PREREQUISITIES:

For the project to operate effectively, it is essential that the pupils'progress must be followed by the ANC Department of education and the study grant forms duly endorsed by their education Department. The latter will also inform the executing agency about drop-outs and pupils' failures. Progress reports should be submitted to UNESCO for information and possible action.

- H) PROJEQI REVIEW1 REPORTING AND EVALUAE; ON :
- 1. The project will be subject to tripartite review (joint review by representatives of the ANC, UNESCO and UNDP) at least once every 12 months the first such meeting to be held within the first 12 months of the start of full implementation. The ANC project co-ordinator and the UNESCO Educational Adviser shall

prepare and submit at least 3 months before each tripartite review meeting a Project Performance Evaluation Report (PPER), Additional PPERs may be requested, if necessary, during the project.

- 2. A.project terminal report.will be prepared for consideration at the terminal tripartite review meeting. It shall be prepared. in draft form sufficiently in advance to allow review and technical clearance by UNESCO at least four months prior to the terminal tripartite review.
- 3. The project shall be subject to evaluation 4 months prior to the scheduled termination. The organisation, terms of reference and timing will be decided after consultation between the parties to the project document, plus any associated UN agency.

I- LEOAL OOHIEKI :

Since assistance to the project is not provided under the terms of a Standard Basic Assistance Agreement with a recognized government, the following should be noted :

The assistance extended by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), to the National Liberation Movements of South Africa and recognized in its area by the Organisation of African Unity (OAU), is governed by the relevant decision of the Governing Council on the subject. It is of a strictly developmental character and is intended to assist the African National Congress (ANC) of South Africa and the Pan Africanist Congress (PAC) of South Africa, to prepare themselves through proper training of their respective followers, for full and responsible participation in the administration and developmentt of their countries when conditions will have improved sufficiently for them to return there. It takes into account the consideration that beneficiaries sponsored by the NLM's live in countries of asylum within Africa, that the assisted NLM's are not sovereign states capable of meeting the full range of counterpart obligations and, in this regard, the stipulation that efficiency and flexibility within the mandate and operational norms and procedures of the UNDP are paramount.

The Project Budget:

The Project Budget covering the UNDP contribution is shown in the attached budget schedule. By cable MISC 111 dated 22 April 1992 UNDP authorities requested that the budget should be for an initial period of only one year. It is understood that after each tripartite meeting the budget for the next academic year will be agreed between UNDP and ANC.
