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Researcher lists terror funding

Deluge of UN,
West cash for
ANC coffers

THE banned African
National Congress, has
been funded with more
than R118-million so
far this year from vari-
ous countries and
United Nationsâ\200\231 affili-
ated organisations.

This was revealed last
night by Mr Thomas Gu-
lick, policy-analyst of the
Washington-based Heri-
tage Foundation â\200\224 a pub-
lic policy research insti-
tute.

He told assembled re-
porters that, on May 4
this year, the World
Health Organisation had
supplied the ANC with
R200 000, which was sup-
posed to be used on medi-
cal supplies for refugees.

â\200\234How it was used is an-
other matter,â\200\235 Mr Gulick
said.

Also on May 4, in the
UN general budget, more
than R500 000 was set
aside for the ANC, â\200\234for

" the same purposesâ\200\235.

Other countries which
have supplied the ANC
with funds are, according
to Mr Gulick:

Â® West Germany, on
January 4, 1983 donated
R111,8 m to the ANC for

useâ\2027 at their Solomon
Mahlangu Freedom Col-
lege in Dar es Salaam,
Tanzania, on January 6, a
further R13 700 and on
January 9, R12 200;

Â® East Germany, 611
May 25, 1983 â\200\224 R47 400;

Â® Norway more than
R1-m for â\200\234humanitarian
aidâ\200\235:

Â® Sweden on May 18
this year â\200\224 R5-m towards
the â\200\234Support Victims of
South African Apart-
heidâ\200\235 fund; ;

Â® Finland, on May 20
â\200\224 R196 140 for â\200\234humani-
tarian supportâ\200\235, expand-
ing the present ANC fa-
cilities in Angola and the
agricultural project in
Tanzania; and

Â® Netherlands
R192 800 for â\200\234refugeesâ\200\235.
Mr Gulick pointed out
that the total donations
for the ANC in 1982 were
more than R30-million
_ from all sources. This
yearâ\200\231s figure, so far, was
already at the R120-mil-
lion mark and still rising.

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Swapo in 1982 received
more than R132-m from
various countries and UN
affiliated organisations.

The World Council of
Churches, for instance,
gave R237 300 while Swe-
den gave R8-m and Libya
R1-m,

â\200\234Since 1975, 116-mil-
lion dollars has been
spent to support what the
UN terms national liber-
ation movements,â\200\235 Mr
Gulick said.

â\200\234These liberation
movements included the
MPLA in Angola, Freli-
mo in Mozambique and
Zapu and Zanu in then
Rhodesia.

â\200\234Groups which still en-
joy UN support are the
ANC, the Pan African
Congress, Swapo and the

Palestine Liberation Organisation.â\200\235

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â\200\234The ' Soviet economy would be nowhere today if it was not for the exorbitant outflow of Western technology to the Soviet Union,â\200\235 said Mr Gulicks.

â\200\234The UN political trend is towards socialism and marxism. The amount of pro-Marxist states form a formidable voting block in the UN.

â\200\234The UN does not only fund the liberation movements, it gives them a great deal of political support,â\200\235 Mr Gulick said.

â\200\234The UN is a very dangerous- place ... it is probably the foremost forum for Marxist-Leninist

strategy in the 20th century.â\200\231)

Another startling fact supplied by Mr Gulick is that the UN has â\200\234on its booksâ\200\235 a R17-million donation from the UN Industrial Development Corporation for the â\200\234training of industrial managers for the future bureaucracy of Namibiaâ\200\235.

He also pointed out that the UN Relief Works Agency, which takes care of Palestinian refugees, budgeted. more than R180-million a year, of which, R20-million went to the refugee camps in Lebanon, which were used by the PLO.
