The Freedom Charter 1955.

The pramble of the Freedom Charter declears that "South Africa belongs to to all who live in it, black and white..." The Charter talks about land. It states: "The people shall share in the countyr's wealth; The ntional wealth of our country, the heritage of South Africans, shall be restored to teh people...The land shall be shared among those who work it:

*Restrictions of land ownership on a racial basis shall be ended and all the land re-devided among those who work it to banish femine and land hunger;

- The state shall help the peasants with implements, seeds, tractors and dans to save soil and assist the tillers;
- * Freedom of movement shall be guaranteed to all those who work on the land;
- * All shall have a right to occupy the land where they choose;
- * People shall not be robbed their cattles and forced labour and farm pri son shall be abolished"

In 1986 it was clear taht a new democratic non racial South Africawas not too far away. At this time the ANC began to work on a new constitution. A constitution is a legal document which sets out the certain rules of government. The new constitution will scarp the racist rules of teh past and start making new rules to correct the injustices.

The Draft Constitutional Guidelines For A Democratic South Africa State;
"The state shall device and implement a land Reform Programme that will include and adress the following issues:

1. Abolishon of all racila restrictions on the ownership and use of land,
2. Implementation of land reforms in cornfomity with the principles of aff
ffirmative action, taking into account the state of victims of forced
removals"

means recognising the way land is owned and used. The reason for and reform are political, cultural and economic. The economic reasons or land reform are particularly strong.

the second part of the document looks at the different ways people can of land. Within our liberation movement there are many ideas about how people get land. We still first describe each one, and then give the reasons why one may work better than another in the future South Africa.

There are also many different veiwson how land is used. Some people want land so that they can grow food and keep cattle. Some people want land they can farm if they loose jobs. Some people have strongs abouth

If we look at how land can be redistrubuted we see a difference between what people need and what they may demand. We will also have to decide what role chiefs will have in the allocation of land. In the bantustans undemocartic control over the land by some cheifs has caused many problems.

The Word For Land To Be returned To the People.

1.1. Lnad. Political Power and The National Question.

The problems we have today began with the wars of conquest. Armed whites deafetd Africans, without gans White settlers also used complicated treaties and contracts to trick Africans into giving their up their land. Whites came to own most of the land according to the rules of the settler stae. Many of these whites had no means of to farm the land, S o black people continued to live and work as labour tenants and sharecroppers. In this way they held anto the land. Very few black South Africans had money to back their lands.

But then black producers were stopped by the law from farming their lahd.
The white government passed many laws (the 1913 land act, the 1936 land
Act the prevention of illigal squating Act.)

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These law affected freeholder sharecroppers and tenant farmers. They forced many people off the land into reserves. Even black farmers who had had bought land after colonial conquest were forced off the land. The government did not respect their title deeds. Many of us know the terrible suffering of the victims of force removals. Many of us have experienced this suffering. That is why we are angry when De Klerk tells white farmers:- "Your tittle deeds are a safe". We remember with pain the time when the tittle deeds of black South Africans did not safeguard their property rights: the government is rubbing salt into our wounds!

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What is certain is that we must satisfy the strong need for tand. It is one of the most important national demands. Only when black producers get land and workers are satisfied with their conditions of employment and wages, will we know that decolonasation in the countryside has at last be begun.

1.2. The Place Of Lnad In Our Society.

When whites first arrived in our county. land did not change hands throwgh bying and selling. Some communities moved around with their heads of cattle and gathered food. Other tribal communities lived together on the same land. In these communities, each family grew food on their own peice poice of ceared land, but cattle grazed on the land used by all families together. The more powerful families usually took wontrol of the land with the better soil. Control over the land sometimes changed hands according to who had the most present political and military power. But in the end end it did not matter who had the most power because this nevr predicted to the dead of the basic rights of the people who used the land to grow food and graze their cattle. They nevr lost their land. Bying and selling land is not an issue between whites people and black people. All over the world there was time when land was not bought and sold. White people in he Europe, Black people in Africa all farmed land in their communities at one one time. Land had greate cultural importance.

The development of capitalism changed this. Even in our neiboughing count ries, such as Mozambiqeu, where the conlojilists did not write many titte deeds, people still degan to rent out their lands. This happened as towns were built and people living needed to buy food. Farming grew food for sa sale. And those with the best land and cattle were able to produce the most food. They often wanted to increase food production, but they could max only do this by renting land from poorer peasants.

In many countries the system of migrant labour stopped workers living in the cities. This means they never completely lost their links to the land. In South Africa black families remember many ties to the land. These are on the communical lands trust land and state held lands in the bantustans,

as well as through freehold land, socalled "black spots" and labour tenats in the white farm areas. Many of our people did not choose to leave this land. There is a string belief in the right to calim back land. This belief has grown stronger now taht we hope to win a non racial democratically elected government quite soon. Some people calim land for historiacl reservasons; it was stolen from them during the decades of forced removals.

Some people claim as thier birth right; it was the home of them parent and the creative grandparents—the only have they ever had. Some

and the grandfathers grandparents—the only haome they ever had. Some people claim land because they believe that as human beings they have a right to a place to live, whether this is in the towns or in twe rural areas. It is therefore for these reasons, these values and these beliefs that people have carried forward their struggles over land.

As liberation movement we have to work out how everyone who has a claim can get land. There are many thuusands of people who want land and it will be not be easy to meet thees demands needs. We need to sort out the confus confusion caused by the centuries of dispossession. This may take some years. We have to draw up guidlines on how this will be done.

1.3. South Africa ecombnic need for a land reforme

The population of South Africa is growing everyyear. 1985 we about 33milb millionpeople. By the end of the next twenty five years we expected a population of 60 million South Africans Alreadythere are not enough jobs for those who are looking for work. There are 5 million unemployed. As our population grows each year there are 250 000 more people looking for work.

Industrial growth is very important to the development of every country.

But it is not possible for industry, with all its high technology and labour saving machenary to provide employment for the majority of those looking for jobs year.

Looking at things from a national level we know it will never be easy to make a lot of money out of agriculture. We have only few rich and fertile lands. Much of our land is poor. Our rains are unreliable and there are money irrigation possibilities left. Some of the ways of commercial for farming have damaged our soil. Land reform needs to consider how we can improved our farming methods, improve damaged lands and make sure that our childern inherit a healthy land.

It is only possible to foresee an improved rural economy if we have a rural policy which gives practical support to people's demands for a productive livehood, education, health care and basic service. It is possible to create more jobs on farms and reditributers land so that more people are to farm for themselves.

Many whites say that "If the blacks get land there will be hunger in the and food prices will increase" . They say taht "black don't know how to farm " We have three responses. Firstly, they forget something taht that white farmers admit- which is thatthere are many white farmers which managed by black farm managers. Secondly, there is evadence that many black smallholders produce just as much and sometimes more than whites farmers when they have access to the same production technologically. And thirdly, there must be provision for training and support service. Otherwise the result will be that all people without skkills or or who made redundant from a sector of industry are aside will never work again. In conclusion, land reform makes sense economycally as well as politicallyl Through a land reform there can be better use of natural resourece and production can increase for the development and growth of our natioanl economy. Agriculture reform, if managed with real commitment, offers a rael possibilty of more jobs or self-employed Land redistribution and a change in labour practices is politically vital as one part of the national democratic transformation.

If a radical land reform does not make take place we can expert an outburst of uncontrolledle political anger. And as a country with a grown population we need to follow a strategy which creates most jobs. If a new government is not seen to be trying to answer the needs of the people that then land seizues and civil unrest will haunt our future.

- We need a new system of law which is based on teh land rights which go beyond the current land tittle. This should be based on values held by the majority of South Africans, including birthright, inheritance right, and rights based on occupation and productive use of the land.
 - There will be many people who want either secure access to the lans they occupy or to land they have been removed from.
- (a) Security for those whose access to land is through communal tenure. Existing labour tenents who are fearul of loosing their productive base must have their right to the land legally recognised through a new set of laws on land rights.

(b) Security for labour tenants.

The government wants a system of freehold title throughout the country. They have tried to privatise the land in some communnal ares. Communities through a new system of texat rural local government, should have power to to decide forthemselves how land should be allocated and used in the interests of the individuals and community. Following the repeal of land Acts we need a policy which ensure that exixting rights are protected (c) Reparation

The me ning of the word "reparation" is to make amends for wrong done in h the past. Thousands of people feel they were wronged. These include those who were removed from their land or forced to sell it the against thier wil will because of apartheid laws. There will have to be some form of repart paration to the people who were unfairly removed from their land. (d) Redistribution for the landless and poor.

Those who are poor, who wish to farm for their livehood, will demand access to land. The most nacdy are those who have manage no one employed in their family, who kxxx are destitute. But other families will need land land because the wage earn does not earn enough to enjoy minimal living conditions.

(e)Business enterpreneurs.

There will be many blacks who want farm as a profit making business. State State assistance must distingush between people, black or white, who do me not have enough capital to ourchase land and to start farming, and those who would never be able to get land except with state help. The state could help in various ways. It could give a land grant, it could provide land for tenants at afforedable rents, it could give credit to buy or rent land.

2.2. State Action to taxa secure land redistribution.

The ANC wants a real land redistribution. It wants to change the situation that we have now in which 80 percent of the population live on 13 percent of the land to one in which all South Africans have equal access to land. Until very recently the government has said that removing racial restric tions on the land ownership and allowing people to buy land on thefree and xxx makert will be the method through which blacks can get land. We do not not accept this proposal as there is no way moneyless people will get access to land. For this reason we with believe a carefully planned state invextment intervention is required.

(a) Land Claims.

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The task of a land Claims Court woul be to listen to peoples' history(blablackor white) about their claim to land. The court would have certain guidlines would not they take acc unt of title dees but to give respect to the birthrights, inheitance over generations, forced relocations, his torical chaims, ancestral gravesides, present occupation rights, the need to have a place to live and farm. The success of the land calims court will depend on people's organisation on on the ground on every region of the country. We need clear decision makking guidelines to make sure that the process will be quick with the minimum of bureaucracy and expense.

If people are not organised the will best serve the interet of the rich, the powerful and the educated.

Once the right to land is established for an individual of group of people the has to assistin carrying out the decision. It will have to inform the person who has title deeds taht according to values of the Claim Court they do not have the right to remain on that piece of land. Perhaps onather piece of land can be offered as compansation. It may be taht the state must get the land in order to give it to the successful claimant(s).

(b) How the state can act to get land for redistribution?

The state can ban the private ownership of land. This means taht land would no longer be bought and sold. This doese not means that the occupants on the land have changed, but suddenly the state have become an landlord this is the school book meaning of nationalisation. This is what happened in Mozambiqeu. And nace the state is the landlord it can easily decide who has a right to farm and where.

- (2) Them State can take hold of land, with or without compensation. Once the state has the land then several things can happen:
- 1. The state can give the land in the form land grants to particular categories of people (for example returning land to previous blacksort owners or evicted farm workers.
- 2. The state can rent out the land to tenants as individuals or groups of
- people.

 3. The state can allow people ti buy the land as individuals or co-opatatives possibly using special terms of ceedit.

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There has been a lot of discusion on the nationalisation and different ways of holding land. Some people think taht the answer to land problem is to nationalise the land. But this is not the easy solution that we use to think it was. In Mozanbique the government nationalised the land but people did not have tools, seeds, and skills to use it properly. In the Soviet Union, land which was state owned and has been farmed collectively is being redistributed to individuals because people have won their popular demand for land time to till as their own. The following points should also be discussed further:

1. Putting an end to high land prices.

Some people want the sttate to own all the land because this will end speculations in land prices. Other peopel say that this speculation canb be ended in other ways by state intervention in the land is never above productive value. Productive value means the price at which you can affored to pay back your loan to buy the land if you farm it efficient every year.

2. Security of land.

For other people the real issue is one of secutity. Some people think that in no guarantee that state ownership offers long term security. The other factors is a social one that people want to hold as their own. Even in the Eastern European countreis where land was nationalised for decades people are now trying to get their own plots of land.

3. Possible sanctions.

Some people say that if lad is nationalised the banks will be in crisis and forieghn investors will be scared off. The may take their money out of out of the country. We might also be faced with the international sanction.

The very same government who refused to lend money waxawed to the white government because of apartheid laws could also refuse refuse to lend us teh money we need when we have a non racial democratic S.A. in the plantif they don't favour our policies, such as land nationalisation.

Compans tion a bitter pill to swallow?

Compensatio is a problem. Whites want the market value of their land, black may claimfor dacades of loss of income and restoration of the land. Whatever compensation is given will be paid for bytch entire society.

through the taxes they pay. Money paid to the landowners in order to take over the land will be money which would have been spent on health, educate seducation, whousing or any other project.

There will have to be a process to deal with compensation claims of both blacks and whites. With regard to the white farm owners there are several considerations to take into account:

- (1) The first consideration is that the payment of foreighn exchange for compensantion is totally unacceptable.
- (11) There is a debate about wether all white farmers should recieve com pensation. There may be certain landowners who can afforda, and might be willing, to donate the land or accept modest compensation. Here we have in mind the large companies such as Anglo American. Some farmers may disqualify themselves because (a) they do not use the land and have abandoned it, (b) they are guilty of human rights violations on the farm, & (c) they refuse to abide by the labour laws.
- (111) Since society bears the cost of compensation, society must decide how to do it. Prompt cash payment will burden our state budget, limit the speed at which land can be reditributed and contribute to inflation. Compensation can be tied to certain conditions, if landowners get money in form of bonds which they had to use to invest in new industries. Our suggestion would be that compensation should be paid in part immediatly and the rest over ten years period. One propsal is to give one quater in cash, one quater in bonds to be cashed in ten years time, and half in bond bonds to be invested in South African industries.

4. Land care.

Another argument is about care for the land productivity. On state owned land where tenants farm land it is noted that because land does not belo ng to those farming on it it there is less care for the soil.

and the first own . The first of the first While we are offering all these different views for futher discusion them are certain points which need to be emphasised:

- (1) We must keep in sight our rael aim of political power and economic development which includes getting the land back. Exactly how we get the land back needs a strategy in which land is redistributed without too much disruption of production and doess not cost too much.
- (11) There must be flexiable forms-of ownership of land. Some people want to own land in their own name-thisi is the only way that they will feel secured. Some people want to own land on a communal basis and are against privattisation of presently held communal lands Workers may want to take over farms to form co-oparatives, joint ventures or state farms. Therefore the ownership forms in a mixed economy must allow for diverse

forms of ownership. What do you think of this?

- (111) There must be afforedabl land. For those who are on the land, as t tenants or workers, the issue is a legal one securing rights. For those w who want reparation or belong to the landless unemployed the state needs to intervene to make land available. But not everyone needs state's help to get land to farm. Perhaps the state's role should be to create an affor afforedable land markert so tant those who do not need state help can by buy their land.
- (1v) Land reform needs to take place at a careful speed. This speed should not only meet demand forland by three rural people but also allow the government to give the proper support service and training so that the land can be used most productively.
- (v) We may encourage but cannot impose collective ownership and production Many people want land to call their own, others may want to farm as a coop cooperative. The ANC policy of mixed economy allows for all forms of production, individuals, community, cooperative and state farms. (Vi) Affordable land reform is the real issue in both money terms and and political terms. Zimbabwe agreed that it would buy land from the whit farmers at the markert prices which it would then give back to the most needy people. Rich blacks would buy land forthemselves. Ten years later the Zimbabwe government has decided it is impossible to meet this demands of the people in this way. The free market land price are high as are the cost to resettle people on the land. They have decided to change their laws so that they will buy land from whites at a price decided by the sta (vII) Land refor can be assisted by using a land tax. The purpose of the is to make sure that the land farmed productively. Otherwise it cost nothing to leave land idle. And as a country we want our resources to be used properly. A progressive land tax maens taht those who own more land pay more and should encourage large landholders to giving up or selling land.
- (viii) What happens in the negotiations is important to the resolution of the land question. We cannot afford a constitution and bill of rights taht does not give the nwe state the power to rights that in the land and property rights in land. Without state intervension it will be economically impossible to carry out the land reform we need to create jobs, improve productivity and satisfy political demands. The way property rights are defined in the constitution and Bill of rights (and connected legislation such as a land Acquisition Act) create critical conditions which will greatly affect the land redistribution process. It is important for the peopel of South Africa to discus this matter and be very clear about the way they would like....

Conclusion.

In conclusion; the land Commission of the ANC, in its search for ajust and growth orieted policy on land reform and rural and agricultural development in a new non racial non sexit and democratic South
Africa believes that:

- 1. The constitution and the Bill of Rights must give powers to the state.
- (i) To establish a Comprehensive Land Reform Act. This Act would include I legislation enabling the state to get land for whom whatever purpose in the public interest. More specifically, it would allow the state to implement affirmative action programmes, to get land where it is needed, according to an economic formula based on productive value rather that speculative free market prices.
- (ii) To establish a land claims commission to set up procedures and criter ria for the adjuddication of land calims. These will apply equally to all South Africans and will reflect the diverses concepts of land rights existing in our country. Once established the commissin would then recieve and hear applications for land caims.
 - (iii) To recognise diverse forms of tenure and system of production.
- 2. The tights and protections extended to rural workers under labour legislation will apply with special consideration to problems pertaniang
 - to those living and working on farms.
- 3. Rural and agricultural productivity must be stimu; ated through government spornsered programmes of affirmative action. These must provide non-racial and non-sexixt access to infrastructure, resources, credit facilities, extension services, reseach and training.
 - 4. Provision should be made to meet the need of urban people for access to land for housing as well as for alhoments for market gardens.

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
